

On July 29 and 30, 1991, Alamo Village provided the setting for a Drinking While Intoxicated (DWI) training film for the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. Filming at the Cantina and throughout the western town was done by the Richard Kidd Production crew from Dallas, Texas.

The 49th Armored Division of the Texas Army National Guard will be visiting Fort Clark, Brackettville, Saturday and Sunday, August 17th and 18th, 1991, while conducting a "staff ride" by helicopter through

West Texas. Beginning Sunday at 8:30 a.m., visitors are invited to Fort Clark to get a close-up look at the Army's UH-Blackhawk and Huey helicopters and to enjoy a Sunday Breakfast Buffet at Las Moras Inn restaurant. Air crew will be available to answer any questions and explain the various functions of each aircraft. The helicopters will be displayed on the old Fort parade grounds, now the 9-hole golf course, from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m.

As part of an ongoing military education program these 45 Texas National Guard members will be retracing and studying Lt. John B. Hood's 2nd Cavalry regiment ride and actions in 1857 that began at Fort Mason and ended at Fort Clark. By studying a campaign or battle in detail the Army can discover why events unfolded as they did; giving them insight for future defense situations.

In addition to the 49th Armored Division, their commander Major

General Don Daniel, and their aircrew, several distinguished Army generals will also be participating in

Major General William Wilson. from Commerce, Texas, Texas Adjutant General (he is the Military Advisor to the Governor); Major General Renaldo Sanchez from El Paso, Texas; Brigadier General William Murphy from Lubbock, Texas; Brigadier General David Heuer from Houston, Texas; and Brigadier General James Delk, who will be their guest speaker at Fort Clark Sunday morning. 

budget usual during workshops each year we hear claims and counter claims of overspending, 'pet projects," and plans for reducing the budget while at the same time increasing the services provided the public by the county government.

Well Folks, as the old saying goes, "that ole dog won't hunt!" There is NO WAY to provide MORE services to the public by ANY department while at the same time DECREASING operational expenses and anyone who tells you different either does not know anything about operations or is lying to you, probably both.

True, the commissioners court has a very difficult time each year trying to work up a balanced budget while at the same time satisfying the various department heads, special interest groups, and the taxpaying public. I for one do not envy them their position. We have only so much coming in each year to use on

the various county projects, duties, and responsibilities.

County

And, each year we hear the same old rattling of dead bones about how much it costs the county to operate the Sheriff's Department & County Jail. And, each year I try to work my way through the purple haze and demonstrate the fact that though the Sheriff's Department does have the largest operating budget in county government we also provide 24 hour a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year law enforcement service and protection at a very reasonable cost to the county taxpayer. We are able to do this primarily because of the federal prisoner care program developed and enlarged over the past 10 years by this writer.

So, for the information of any of you who might be interested enough in your tax dollars to be informed of the TRUE facts as to how they are spent on county law I have listed a couple of options available to the Sheriff's Department and the taxpaying public that should prove beyond any reasonable doubt that the federal prisoner care program is of tremendous value to Kinney County, saving thousands of tax dollars each year. Therefore I have summarized 2 operations plans, Plan A with a federal prisoner care program and Plan B without a federal prisoner care program. Please note the decrease in budgeted expenditures under Plan B that would, at first glance, indicate a less costly operation. But also take note of the ACTUAL cost to the county and compare this figure to that of Plan A. Anyone that can add 2 plus 2 and come up with 4 must see that the federal prisoner care progam DOES WORK for Kinney County and DOES save money for the Sheriff's Department, the county, and most importantly, the tax-



America) set for its first representative assembly in America in Jamestown. Its decisions were subject to approval by the Virginians. In the same month, 20 African Blacks were brought to Jamestown on a Dutch ship and brought as indentured servants. This led to the introduction of black slavery in North America. The Spanish had already brought African slaves with them to Central and South America.

August 27, 1650 - Abraham Wood, Commander of Fort Henry, which Perhaps you could suggest a day the British established near the mouth of the Potomac River led a small party to the unknown lands to the southwest, penetrated only about 100 miles, and brought by word of mouth the possibilities of fur trading and a new land.

August 1699 - An English vessel from the Carolina Colony made its way some 100 miles up the Mississippi River before it was warned to turn back by the French.

August 9, 1754 - England countered the "Plan of the Union" with a proposal that the colonists be united under a commander-in-chief for colonial affairs and a separate commissioner for Indian Affairs but nothing became of the plan.

August 1756 - In the opening battle of the French and Indian War, Montcalm destroyed the English forts at Oswego and George (Aug. 14). The English yielded the Mohawk Valley to the French and the settlers fled to Schnenectady and Albany. Many returned later.

August 1758 - New Jersey established the first Indian reservation in America at Edge Pillock in Burlington County for the Unami

You don't need to sink a fortune into high-priced cleaners in your war against stubborn spots and stains because ordinary products can outdo them at half the cost.

Toothpaste is great for removing furniture stains; yogurt makes piano keys shine; a tiny bit of mayonnaise on your house plant leaves gives them a boost plus shines the leaves like they're waxed; and Grandma's Efferdent makes the toilet bowl sparkle as brightly as the old lady's





### **States seek solutions to new AIDS alarms**

Concerned about recent reports of doctors and dentists infected with

the HIV virus, many states are considering - or have passed controversial laws to address the issue

States that have passed bills

Arkansas: 1989 law requires patients with HIV to notify doctors and dentists.

Florida: Legislature passed and governor is expected to sign law that would set guidelines for health workers on HIV testing and notifications of patients.

Maryland: Legislature passed and governor is expected to sign law allowing for testing of health care workers or patients following exposure to body fluids.

Missouri: 1988 law requires patients with HIV to notify health

Oregon: If patient without HIV has "substantial exposure" to infection from health workers, patient can request that worker be tested. If worker refuses, mandatory testing can be sought through courts. Legislature is considering bill to make health workers with HIV or AIDS tell patients before performing invasive procedures. Virginia: If patient is exposed to body fluids of health care worker, worker must be tested for HIV and

West Virginia: 1988 law allows state health chief to require HIV test if, in emergency medical care situation, caregiver or care recipient is exposed to blood or



Pecans Require Special Summer Care: Like many trees, pecans need special attention in the summer. That mean taking time to apply zinc sprays to control aphids and scab and pruning and irrigating as well.

To overcome the problem of pecan scab, use fungicide sprays of Benlate, Topsin or Super Tin. Scab can develop on pecan trees in any part of Texas when the weather is wet and warm.

Pecan growers also have had to worry about sticky, sugar-covered eaves each summer due to aphid infestations. Malathon sprays can give homeowners good control.

Summertime drought is a sure bet for part of the state every year, and pecans will suffer if they do not receive from one to two inches of water per week each summer through September. A mature pecan tree will use more than 100 gallons of water per day. If pecan trees go more than three weeks without

water, serious crop loss can occur. Weeds and grass also use soil moisture, so keep competitive vegetation to a minimum under pecan trees. With shallow soil and vegetation under trees, a weekly irrigation will be needed.

Owners of young pecan trees should be aware that weeds slow down growth more than anything else. It is best to use a contact herbicide such as Roundup to keep the limb-spread area weed-free.

All pecan trees less than four years of age should have only one main trunk. If there are two, three or four trunks developing simply cut the weaker ones out and leave the strongest one.

Young trees also should receive zinc sprays every two weeks of the summer to insure maximum growth.

# **Hunting Fatalities Drop**

AUSTIN - It's too early to tell if hunter education is responsible for a 33 percent drop in hunting fatalities and accidents in Texas in 1990, but hunters who have completed the course have always shown up as a minor percentage of the accidents.

Although not proven as the reason hunting accidents decreased, a good case can be made for the emphasis placed on hunter education the past few years. Anyone born during the period of September 2, 1971, to August 31, 1975, must complete the hunter education course to hunt legally in Texas. It would be a good idea for all hunters to take

### Chili Cook-Off

this year's chili cookoff! Several teams have already entered and are working on their team's theme. There have been challenges made and secret recipes are in the making. A \$25.00 entry fee will be charged to each team with cash prizes coming from that pot. Cook setups can start at 8:00 a.m. and there will be a cooks' meeting at 10:00 a.m. Showmanship judging will go on between 11:00 a.m. and 1:00. Chili must be turned in at 2:00 for judging. Awards will be given around 4:00. First, second, and showmanship awards will be given with more places possible depending on the number of entries.

Here are some tips on making prize winning chili from preparing competition chili by the Chili Appreciation Society International (C.A.S.I.). "Competition chili is a combination of finely cut meat, seasonings, and spices in a smooth liquid gravy. It contains no beans or other "fillers." Cut meat is preferred to ground meat. The chili contains very little or no grease. Winning chili must look good, smell good, and taste good. Because the judging process takes awhile, chili must retain its color, consistency, aroma, taste, and afterbite while hot, warm, lukewarm, and cool in a styrofoam judging cup. The chili should be free of grease and the meat and gravy also must look good in the small plastic teaspoons used for judging.

You can use beef or venison. But high quality lean beef usually makes the best chili. You need to end up with about one quart of finished chili for the judges and you will be able to sell or give your chili away during the day. With that in mind start with enough to meet your needs. Use cut meat for the judge's chili and ground meat if you intend to make a large amount for the crowd. Neutral cooking surfaces work best and black pots are not recommended as they taint the chili with their seasoning. Trim meat of fat, gristle, and connecting tissue. Regular missible, but complete commercial chili mixes are not permitted. All from scratch on site the day of rather than soup or stew.

On the day of the cookoff there is a checklist prepared by C.A.S.I. some of the things you'll need are:

1. Cooking table, chairs, etc. 2. Stove, such as a two-burner coleman stove (and fuel) and/or a propane campstove (and fuel). Check the stove out ahead of time to be sure that it works!

3. Camera to get pictures of you getting your trophy

4. Cook pots and lids, stirring spoons, measuring spoons, can opener, paper towels and matches. 5. Chili meat, chili spices, tomato sauce, and salt.

6. Water-take a bottle of perrier, it wows the crowd.

7. Libations for participants.

Arrive approximately 4 hours ahead of turn-in time to allow you to set up and to attend the cooks' meeting. Don't start cooking too soon. You will only need some 21/2 hours to cook your chili. For a 2 PM, turn-in, light your fire around 11:15 to 11:30 a.m.

1. There are five criteria (color, aroma, consistency, taste, and aftertaste) that key off the basic good rule that competition chili must look good, smell good, and taste good. Explanations of the five criteria follow

Color: Chili must look good. Reddish -reddish-brown, or brown are good. Not so good are shades of gray, black, yellow, pink, greenish, or camouflage. Color often gives a clue as to what follows. Excessive grease mars appearance.

Aroma: Chili must smell good. A good aroma is a tipoff to good taste. Foreign aromas also give a clue as to what follows for example, a stale beer aroma indicates too much of

Consistency: Chili must be a good meat/gravy combination. It should not be dry, watery, grainy, lumpy, or greasy--just good and smooth. Taste: Chili must taste good above

all else. Although individual opinions vary, a really good taste will stand out.

Aftertaste: More properly called the "bite" or "afterbite". It's that glow that develops in the mouth and chili to be judged must be prepared throat that says that this is chili

The day dawned hot and clear for Mindy Reid in the Nueces Canyon area near Barksdale, Texas. The surrounding hills overlooking Glennloch Farms have been likened to the hills of the Middle East where camels and Arabian horses have

This fact was one of the qualities Douglas B. and Margaret Marshall were drawn to when they decided to move their Glennloch Farms from the Houston area. Glennloch Farms is a world-class Arabian Horse Farm devoted to the propogation and

On this hot July day, Mindy was ground working a young gelding without halter or rope in the round pen. The energetic young horse had kicked up a lively dust storm and

Mindy was teaching the gelding to come to her and follow her at a command without a lead of any

kind. About thirty minutes into the session the horse knew what was required of him and obediently followed Mindy as she moved about the ring. She explained that this was one of her first training techniques. This technique would be used later as the basis of other commands. Ground tying and spooking in place are two basic elements of a well trained saddle horse that would follow in later training sessions.

Mindy has an unenviable schedule. She rides six horses every day and ground works two more. Each one of which also gets groomed, bathed and put on the walker or treadmill. She works five to six days a week and every third week-end. If special events come up, she handles them as well. She also travels with the show horses and shows them herself at shows all over the United States.



WORDING ON BALLOT: The exemption of 20 per cent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxation in (name of the county education district).

FOR If locally-granted homestead exemptions are completely eliminated, homeowners in the local school districts that have been granting homestead exemptions are likely to face large property tax increases. This proposed exemption could cushion the impact of expected in-

**AGAINST** In districts with substantial commercial property, this proposal would shift the tax burden from residential property to business. Districts that are largely residential would suffer losses of tax revenue and would have

to raise tax rates to generate the required amount of local funding.

WORDING ON BALLOT: The exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is 65 or older from ad valorem taxation in (name of the county education district).

This proposal: would alleviate the impact of higher school taxes on those most likely to be adversely affected by them.

AGAINST

Property taxes are alreadry frozen for individuals 65 or older and for disabled persons; this proposal would create an even larger exemption. This proposal is not need-based and would exempt many individuals who can afford to pay the higher taxes, increasing the burden on other taxpayers.

WORDING ON BALLOT: The taxation of all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes, in (name of the county education district) that is not held or used for the production of income.

This would spread the tax burden over a wider base by generating revenue from non-income producing personal property such as boats, cars,

AGAINST

Appraisals, verification of property, and collection of the tax create costs to taxpayers that may offset the income generated. Many local governing bodies do not collect this tax because it has a high delinquency rate and is difficult to enforce equitably.

Two proposed constitutional amendments, as well as three county education district propositions, will be on an August 10, 1991 statewide ballot. To prepare Texas citizens for this constitutional election, and in its continuing effort to Make Democracy Work, the League of Women Voters of Texas Education Fund has researched and prepared unbiased, nonpartisan pro/con material on all propositions, with the assistance of information from the House Research Organization.





# **Kinney County**

PROPOSITION #1 (SJR 42)

WORDING ON BALLOT: The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property.

**EXPLANATION** 

The school finance law approved by the 72nd Legislature created 188 new county education districts, composed of single counties or groups of counties. These districts have the limited purpose of levying the required local first-tier tax to raise the equivalent of 72 cents per \$100 of assessed market value and redistributing the proceeds among local school districts within the county education district.

This proposed amendment would authorize the new districts to hold elections to allow voters within the districts to decide whether to grant an exemption on a percentage of the assessed value of residence homesteads; whether to grant an additional exemption on the homesteads of elderly and disabled persons; and whether to impose taxes on certain types of personal property. In the enabling legislation that was passed during the regular session of the legislature, the amount of the homestead exemption was specified as 20 per cent and the exemption for elderly and disabled persons was set at \$10,000. These exemptions would be in addition to the existing \$5,000 homestead exemption, the \$10,000 exemption on homesteads of elderly and disabled persons, and the freeze on property taxes for elderly and disabled persons.

The enabling legislation also directed the county education districts to present the propositions to their voters in an election to be held on August 10, 1991. The wording of the proposals on local ballots will be identical across the state, but the order may vary. Decisions made by voters in a district would apply in that district only, contingent upon the decision of voters statewide on the proposed constitutional amendment which authorizes these elections.

Thus, voters who go to the polls on August 10 will be asked to vote simulatneously on a constitutional amendment and to vote on the local tax options authorized by the proposed amendment. If voters approve the proposed amendment statewide, the locally adopted options would go into effect without delay. This is being done in order to enable the new taxing districts to implement voter decisions in the property tax bills scheduled to go out in October.

1. Trustees of the new county education districts are appointed by local school board rather than being elected by voters, and thus do not have the discretionary authority to decide whether or not to grant these exemptions or impose these taxes on personal property. Therefore, the power to make these decisions must rest with voters in the county education

2. This amendment would make it possible for homestead exemptions and personal property taxes to be continued, but at the option of voters rather than by action of the county education district board.

**AGAINST** 

1. Passage of this proposed amendment would shift the tax burden from residential property to businesses. It would effect county education district across the state very differently. Those that are dependent primarily upon residential property would be forced to raise residential property taxes more than those that rely on commercial property.

2. Tax exemptions for some property owners would result in higher taxes for others. Only 259 of the more than 1,050 school districts in Texas currently grant homestead exemption. This amendment could result in a large increase in property tax exemptions statewide, narrowing the property base that must provide the local share of public school funding, which contributes approximately half of all school funding. This would mean higher taxes for the remaining taxpayers in order to maintain the required local funding.

**PROPOSITION #2 (SJR 5)** 

WORDING ON BALLOT: The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans

**EXPLANATION** 

The proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to allow the Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to Texas students attending Texas colleges and universities. The maximum interest rate would be set by law. An interest and sinking fund would be established to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds as they mature. The legislature could provide for the investment of bond proceeds and establish the interest and sinking fund. The state cannot issue bonds to finance student loans without this constitutional amendment because the Texas Constitution prohibits the legislature from lending the credit of the state without specific authorization in the constitution, and prohibits use of public funds for grants and loans to individuals. Previous amendments authorized issuance of \$85 million for student loans in 1965, \$200 million in 1969, and \$75 million in 1989.

1. These loans are urgently needed to meet the fall 1991 demand for loans to financillay needy students. If this amendment is not approved, approximately 15,000 Texas students (the number who received loans last year) may be unable to attend Texas colleges and universities this year. These loans go only to financially needy students who otherwise could not afford to attend college.

2. The student loan program usually operates as a revolving, selfsupporting fund. Because changes in federal loan programs have created large increases in the demands for state loans, and because most of the many loans made in recent years are not yet due, the bonds to be issued are necessary to fund the program until payments on recent loans begin to come in. The bonds will be paid back, plus interest, by borrowers, not


1. The state does not need to incur any more debt. The bonded indebtedness of the state now totals \$7.5 billion. General obligation bonds, which account for \$2.3 billion in debt at the end of fiscal 1989, reached \$2.8


2. This proposed \$300 million debt will not stand alone. The legislature should undertake a comprehensive evaluation of overall state debt before voters are asked to add to it.

### **Coast Guard Day**

August 4th is Coast Guard Day in the United States.

The Coast Guard is an armed force as well as the chief National Agency for promoting maritime safety. Its work includes enforcement of the navigation and other maritime laws of the United States, the rendering of assistance to vessels in distress, the saving of life and property, the destruction of derelicts, the removal of obstructions and menaces to navigation, and the maintenance of an extensive

Merchant Marine safety program. It also maintains the International Ice Patrol in the North Atlantic and the Bering Sea Patrol, and gives medical aid to deep-sea fishermen and the natives of Alaska.

The Coast Guard is our country's oldest continuous seagoing service and traces its history back to August 4, 1790, when the first Congress, at the request of Alexander Hamilton authorized the construction of ten vessels for the collection of revenue.

In the earlier days as the Revenue Marine and later as the Revenue Cutter Service, the Coast Guard received its present name on January 28, 1915 under an Act of Congress combining the Revenue Cutter Service with the Life Saving

Service of the Department of Commerce was consolidated with this unit. The Coast Guard is one of the oldest organizations in the Federal Government.

# **Aviation Day**

Aviation Day is usually celebrated by honoring the Wright Brothers.

They made the first powered flights on December 17, 1903. Wilbur and Orville Wright of Dayton, Ohio made their flights on the flat sand at Kill Devil Hill, near Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. The world paid less attention to the success of the Wrights than to the failures of the attempts of others.

The Wrights continued to perfect their airplane and gain skill as flyers. In 1904, they flew the first full circle and figure eights; in 1905, they flew a flight of 24 miles in 13 minutes and 3 seconds.

In 1905, they offered their inven-

tion to the U.S. Government "for use in war." The War Department was not interested so they went to Europe but didn't succeed in interesting any one there.

By 1908, the climate had changed in view of political developments, and the Wright Brothers obtained a contract for demonstration flights and the sale of an airplane with a French syndicate and with the U.S. Signal Corps. These public flights on two continents changed the entire outlook on aviation

The Wrights were acclaimed as the conquerors of the air and made further demonstration flights in 1909 in Rome and Berlin.

From the Wrights first flights to present day, aviation has been one continuous triumph after another and more is yet to come.

### Texas Texile Industry Tremendous And Untapped

When it comes to cotton and mohair, Texas is the leading producer in the country and one of the top producers of these natural fibers worldwide. The economic potential of the textile industry in Texas is tremendous and largely untapped, and the time to capitalize on it is now. That's the belief of a group of state officials and industry leaders who have joined forces to develop and promote the Lone Star state's textile and apparel industry.

Under the leadership of the Texas Department of Commerce, the Texas Textile and Apparel Development Committee was recently formed to improve efforts between private business and statesupported organizations, including Texas Department of Agriculture, the Texas Food and Fibers Commission, Texas Tech University, the University of Texas, Texas A&M University, and Texas Women's University. The committee will develop ways to attract new textile and apparel manufacturing to Texas, monitor the natural fiber industry on both a domestic and international scale, and encourage state-

wide cooperation between tex-

tile/apparel production processing,

marketing and design operations. Through the activities of the committee and other programs, the Department of Commerce hopes to establish an integrated, value-added processing network for the state's textile and apparel industry which should result in increased economic development for Texas. 'Texas is the largest producer of

natural fibers in the U.S., and Dallas is one of the largest market centers for apparel and home furnishings fabrics, yet Texas has only two percent of the nation's apparel and textile assembly plants and only six percent of its textile mills," notes committee member David Huff, who is spearheading the textile effort for Commerce. "Governor Ann Richards has asked us to formulate strategies to increase opportunities to add value to the state's natural fiber production through the recruitment and expansion of processing and manufacturing facilities. Thus far, the state's underdevelopment of these industries almost classifies us as a Third World nation, because our economy is still based on our raw materials. We need to retain the value-added income of our natural resources to

bolster our economy and increase




