

Visitors Welcome


The middle school and cafeteria construction project is currently well under way at the Brackett ISD campus. The foundation has been poured and the metal framework is going up this week. The pictures show the site at various stages of construction. The slab foundation required 374 yards of concrete. The slab was poured in two sections and required nine hours. The work was aided by a truck which was equipped with an 88 foot boom and pumped concrete to all sections of the foundation.

The architect, Don Legge of Salado, is projecting a completion date of December 20, 1991. The district plans to move into the building during the Christmas Holidays and occupy it for classes during the Spring Semester.

This project is the first of several scheduled for completion within two years as part of the bond issue voted on March 26, 1991. Other projects include remodeling Mittie E. Jones Elementary, construction of a new vocational building, acquistion of new instructional technology, and other projects.

I have repeatedly asked Mr. Andrew Sanson, the executive director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, to hasten development of Kickapoo Caverns in Kinney County and the Devil's River Natural Area in Val Verde County. But I regret to say we still don't know when they will be open. I'll continue to ask questions about our new parks, and will let you know what I hear.

Kickapoo Caverns will be hunted this year. Department staff said that 48 muzzle-loader gun permits are to be granted the first two weekends in November. Regular hunts will be allowed for 175 permits for antlerless deer November 6 - 8, 13 - 15, 18 - 22, and 25 - 27.



Those interregnums emenate reserve and calm reflection - for no one can catch fish in anger, or in



SKILLET CHICKEN—GRAVY 3 lb. fryer-broiler

cut into portion-sized pieces 1½ cups flour ½ cup white corn meal 1 Tea. salt 1/4 Tea. pepper

1 Tea. Accent 1/2 cup vegetable oil 1/4 lb. butter 31/2 cups warm water

Wipe the pieces of chicken with paper toweling. Mix the flour, corn meal, salt, pepper and Accent in a paper sack. Place several pieces of chicken in the sack at a time and shake up and down until they are thoroughly coated with the flour mixture. Place the vegetable oil in a large skillet with a tight-fitting

Brown the chicken on all sides. Remove from the skillet and pour off all excess oil. Put the butter and warm water in the skillet and heat until the butter is melted and just beginning to boil. Place the browned chicken in this mixture, bring to a slow simmer, cover tightly and cook for about 35 minutes, or until the chicken is real tender, and the gravy is thickened. Serve at once, piping

Every year at the same time, there is a great event that takes place in Kortman County.

I call it the annual livestock show, rodeo and fist fight. The only event during all of these events that hasn't caused a fist fight is the parade. That is until last year.

The communities in Kortman County all have some kind of a float and all honor some kind of old pioneer type person or family. And for the first time ever, all the civic leaders agreed on something.

They decided to award prizes for the best float in the parade and give special treatment to the oldest or most valuable pioneer in Kortman County. They had judges for the parade, but how was the most valuable pioneer going to be selec-

Since I have been a citizen of Querecho Flats for the better part of twenty years, I have been selected to help select a pioneer from our little area of the world.

I was selected because nobody else wanted to get involved with the three old bats from The Better Than Thou and Pert Near Perfect Peoples Society. And I took the position just to be ornery.

There was going to be a problem selecting the pioneer.

The cause of this problem was the fact that all the pioneers had been used up or just plain died.

Karl and Garlan had gotten together and with the help of a couple of cases of beer and some helpful residents (of the male gender) built the float to win first place in the first (and probably last) annual

float judging. I met with the ladies at the community building three weeks before the dead line to select our communities pioneer. Talk about a

Each one thought some of their kinfolks should be honored and none would listen to the other. I found out right sudden that I was the token male. And what I thought wasn't gonna make any ground. Like I said, I was the token male.

I knew who should be the honored pioneer, but they wouldn't listen.

Juan Padillo was my choice. He had come to the area with a herd of sheep that belonged to one of the big ranchers, in 1935. He was fourteen year old at the time and he stayed. He had worked for this same rancher for over forty years and then retired. During his employment, he had managed to marry, raise four boys and two girls, keep the coyotes in check and do anything he could to help anyone. He had also managed to purchase and get clear title to a section and a half of pretty good grass land that just happened to have a big lake of oil under the top soil. He also got all the mineral rights with the land.

To say Juan Padillo was well off would be somewhat of an understatement.

Most everyone in Querecho Flats liked Juan and his family, but he was still a Mexican and was still treated like it was the 1930's. I had worked with the old man several times and I had sat at his table on a number of occasions. I learned pretty early that he was more man than most of the clowns I lived around and his wife was a sure nuff good old gal.

Our little committee met a couple of more times and each time was the

Prejudice and arguing. Finally at the last meeting, just before we had to call the news paper and tell them who was our pioneer, there was a major fight. And the lovely ladies decided that this year there would be no honored pioneer from Querecho Flats.

Wrong. As soon as everyone was out of sight, I called the news paper and told them that Juan Padillo would represent Querecho Flats in the parade this year.

If you're gonna have a reputation for causing trouble, you just as well

I broke the news to Juan, and he was tickled to death.

I didn't realize just how tickled until the day of the parade.

It was such an honor to Juan and his family, he completely rebuilt his old sheep herder's wagon and brought it to the parade. He had kept it in a shed for a lot of years and as his wife told me, he would sit in it every once in awhile just to remember and appreciate his humble beginnings

Of course Juan didn't have a team to pull the wagon with, so he trailered it to town and tied it to his 1990 El Dorado to be pulled down the main street of Logaville.

I wasn't all that worried about what I had done, because all the Querecho locals would just think that Juan and his family decided to get in the parade. I had called the paper just a hair too late and his name wasn't in the paper, but the parade people knew about it.

If he hadn't of had such loving and proud children not to mention grand children, hardly anyone would 'ave known that he was the Querecho Flats Pioneer Of The

But his kids did a number.

They not only told all of their Mexican-American friends but they told all their friends kinfolks. And then to all the proof positive, they built a banner to hang from the

It was a grand sight. Right behind the Logaville fire departments newest fire truck came a baby blue El Dorado pulling an exceptionally clean old sheep herder and about 30 grandkids. And one gringo.

Juan seemed to think I needed to be in charge of the canteen full of Tequila and lime. He handled the limes and the salt.

It was the first time in the history of the Kortman County Parade that a fist fight broke out.

Juan got best float (maybe it was parade he was really floating). And the husbands of the three ladies from The Better Than Thou Society thought each of the others had done this to 'em. The nerve of them putting a lowly sheep herder in to represent Querecho's pioneer people.

The Little Woman and me stayed away from the people of Querecho for a few days, but things got back to normal or semi-normal in about a

But the good people of Querecho Flats will never forget old Juan, even if they try. Juan donated his wagon to the Kortman County Hall Of Fame. And on the plaque in front of it, it very plainly states "Donated by Juan Padillo, Querecho Flat's Pioneer Of The Year, 1991.

Control Fruit Tree Disease Now! Sometimes fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected in the fall, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

By applying a copper fungicide now, can stop or help reduce three of the major diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker.

The puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were the result of peach leaf curl fungus. The time to control this disease effectively is in the fall by use of a copper-containing fungicide.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Unless applied correctly, copper, a metal, may cause severe defoliation

Stopping Winter Weeds and Grasses Most annual winter grasses and weeds that plague lawns in late winter and early spring are ready to germinate now. The best way to stop them in the lawn is to apply a preemergence herbicide promptly, before their seeds germinate.

One of the worst pest plants that needs to be targeted now is henbit - a common lawn invader that brightens up the lawn with blue, but seldomappreciated blossoms in late winter and early spring. Winter grasses, including winter rye, also germinate now. Most of our most beautiful spring wildflowers also sprout in the fall and need to be targeted now if they are considered to be "weeds" in a well manicured lawn.

Preemergence herbicides are chemicals that kill weed seedlings as they germinate. They are ineffective

against weeds and grasses once they grow beyond the seedling stage. Apply a preemergent herbicide as a uniform, broadcast treatment to problem areas of the lawn. At least 1/2 inch of water--irrigation or rain-is needed after application to move the herbicide into the soil where it is

Labeled preemergence herbicides for lawns include XL, Betasan, Balan and Princep. All of these materials will do a reasonably good job of stopping winter weeds and grasses if applied accurately and in time.

All of these herbicides are available in granular formulations while Betasan, Princep and other preemergence herbicides labled for lawn use also are formulated for spray application. Most home gardeners can do a more accurate job by using a granular formulation and broadcasting it as they would fertilizer. Spray application of a preemergence herbicide should be attempted only if you have a sprayer that is capable of applying a unifrom, blanket spray (a hand pump-up sprayer is not acceptable). The sprayer also must be accurately calibrated.

Read and follow herbicide label directions carefully. Under application can result in no weed control while over application may risk damage to the lawn.

Remember that preemergence herbicides can't distinguish "good seed" from "bad seed." Don't use them in a lawn or garden where you intend to plant seed this fall or next spring. The rate of the herbicide breakdown varies. Balan deteriorates rapidly and seed can be planted within two months after application, while XL deteriorates slowly and can prevent seed germination as long as a year after application.

Guidelines For According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast can-

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, before it can be felt.

Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

I. 35-40 years of age -One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age -A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental xrays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Boat-Motor Tax

AUSTIN--Texans who buy a taxable boat or motor must pay a 6.25 percent sales or use tax. This new law went into effect Oct. 1.

Part of House Bill 11, passed during the second special session of the Texas Legislature, imposes the sales tax on all sales of taxable boats and motors. Also, new residents who bring a boat registered in another state to Texas must pay \$15 for the boat and \$15 for the motor.

A taxable boat is a boat other than a canoe, kayak, rowboat, raft, punt or other vessel designed to be propelled by paddle, oar or pole. A taxable motor is an outboard motor with an internal combustion engine.

BISD Holds Steady On Property Taxes

Most citizens of Brackett Independent School District will experience a decrease in their school tax bill for 1991. The school district maintained a rate of \$1.04 per \$100 of value, while exemptions for over 65, handicapped, and resident homesteads increased. The net result should be a reduction in the amount of school tax owed. The representative tax bill below illustrates this:

Although school taxes remained steady or decreased, the local taxpayer will probably pay more property tax this year than in 1990 due to increases by the county and the city of Brackettville. Both entities increased property taxes for 1991. The county set a total rate (including road fund of \$0.06848 X additional rate for bonded debt.

\$100 for 1991) an increase of four cents (.0470) over the 1990 total. The city set a rate of \$0.6616 X \$100 or an increase of nearly two cents (\$0.01840.

While Brackett Independent School District held steady in 1991, local taxpayers can expect steep increases in the school rate over the next four years, if the current school finance plan remains in effect.

Superintendent Bob McCall predicts that all school districts in the state will be taxing at a rate of \$1.45 X \$100 by 1995, if the legislature does not change the structure of school finance. One dollar and forty-five cents is a minimum figure. A district is allowed this amount for Maintenance and Operations and may add an



One time he was captured by hostile Blackfeet who challenged him to a six-mile run for his life. Colter happened to be a distance runner. He got away from the Indians and hid for half a day under the driftwood in a rising creek while the Indians prowled on the banks looking for

Three years later Colter returned to civilization. In St. Louis, he told of his experiences in Yellowstone, and of the strange country. He said there were majestic, colored waterfalls and canyons. He told of bubbling potholes, hissing, roaring geysers, streams that were cold on top and hot on the bottom, and pools of boiling paint."

Because Colter was a rough, illiterate man no one believed his tales. A St. Louis newspaper jokingly referred to the "imaginary region" of his travels as "Colter's Hell" and was called that for several decades.

When John Colter first saw the Yellowstone area, he was a 32 year stories either.

old hunter, guide, and veteran of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. He was a daring plainsman noted "for hardy endurance of fatigue" and perils on a dangerous 500 mile journey across Montana Indian lands and Wyoming mountains, and through the untrac-

ked Yellowstone country to survey trade possibilities. In the later years, the trappers who explored the Yellowstone area were not all illiterate, but they were noted for tall-tale telling and especially their stories of "natural boiling fountai-

ns" were considered to be a fairy tale. In 1827, a Philadelphia newspaper received and printed without comment a letter from a "beaver man" telling of the Yellowstone area.

In 1834, a fur trader and clerk for the American Fur Company named Warren Angus Ferris accompanied by two Indains wrote and described the Yellowstone country.

Warren Ferris was called "the first tourist" to visit Yellowstone since he went only to find out if the tales were
