Trees are often considered to the May Democratic Primary almost a luxury on the High Plains where they grow few and far between naturally. Residents have helped to change that situation, though, and most homesteads are adorned with trees of some kind. Often the trees are not only decorative,

but provide windbreaks as well. A news release this week from Gary Batte, district conservationist with the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, says, "Windbreaks will make life more comfortable for many West Texas farm and ranch families this Spring."

Trees can make a big difference when they are planted as windbreaks, Batte goes on to point out. This is especially true during the Decemberthrough-May period when housewives dread the clean-up chores which are necessary following a windstorm.

Batte says it is estimated that a good windbreak can reduce a 30 mile per hour wind to 10 to 15 miles per hour. Also, at 10 degrees, the chill index, which is the combined effect of wind and temperature, is changed from a minus 33 degrees to a minus 13. This, Batte says, makes a windbreak of value near a home, feedlot or other structure. "The best time to plant trees | County dedicated service for the

for windbreaks," says Batte, advancement of the economic, "is February through April. Chinese elm, Honeylocust, Hackberry Eastern redcedar, Ponderosa pine and Rocky Mountain juniper all make excellent windbreaks.

"Additional information on windbreak planting is available at the SCS Work Unit office in Friona and inquiries on how to obtain seedlings may be made to the Texas Forest Service at College Station,"

Federal Program --

Commissioners Court Opposes Food Stamps

The food stamp program, ordered by the Federal Government, has been opposed by Parmer County Commissioners Court, according to County Judge Archie Tarter.

The opposition was recorded at a meeting of the court in

Counties were given 60 days from Jan. 5 to voluntarily inaugurate the food stamp program in Texas. The order was issued by Federal District Judge W. M. Taylor of Dallas on Dec. 30. If the 89 Texas counties have not complied with the order in 60 days, the Federal Government will step in to administer the program by July, Tarter said.

Government figures show that 91 families and 62 children in Parmer County are receiving welfare assistance from Federal sources, the commissioners were told in an Amarillo meeting. However, these figures are inaccurate, accord-

ing to Parmer County officials. The Federal figure includes all persons who are receiving Social Security benefits, who do not want or need welfare, according to commissioners. These persons are not currently on welfare.

Tarter says the records in Parmer County show that no more than five persons receive county welfare assistance on a year-round basis. Sixty persons in the county have received occasional assistance from county welfare, with 12 listed as the greatest number receiving aid at any single time.

During 1969 the county spent \$6,562.52 to assist persons in the county. These funds were used to assist in securing staple groceries, for emergency hospital care, and to transport several patients to and from the hospital for care. It also included assistance in paying for funeral expenses under certain circumstances.

The food stamp program in Parmer County would not eliminate emergency welfare assistance for county residents, the commissioners say. They believe it would cost the county more to administer the program than any benefits received.

The Commissioners Court met with two other courts from Bailey and Castro counties recently to discuss the program. Bailey County Commissioners Court has also gone on record as opposing the food stamps.

Inspection Slow For Parmer Co.

"With approximately three months left until the April 15 deadline for obtaining inspection stickers, only 10 per cent of the registered vehicles in Parmer County have been inspected," stated Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public

"This will be the last year for an April 15 deadline as the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Program has gone to a yearround inspection program. The new stickers will display the number of the month in which the vehicle was inspected and will be valid through that month of the following year," added Major Bell.

Two items have been added to the inspection list -- the exhaust system and the exhaust emission system. A car must now have a muffler and it must be free from leaks. All cars manufactured in 1968 or later coming from the factory equipped with the emission system (commonly known as the smog device), still must have the device connected and in working order.

Parmer County now has four official inspection stations that are ready and capable of handling the inspection of vehicles in this area if owners will not wait until a few days before the deadline.
