## City Employees Receive $10 \%$ Raise

| The City Council met in a special 1992, at City Hall. Mayor Pro-tem Diane Bravo and Councilmen Ralph Gonzalez, Bernie Cervantes, and Richard Terrazas answered roll call to establish a quorum. Visitors were acknowledged. <br> Jean Faulkenberry offered the invocation and Mrs. Bravo led the pledge to the flag. <br> City Secretary Cordelia Mendeke reported that Debra Bland had completed the six-month probationary work period as of January 29, 1992 . Ms. Mendeke said Mrs. Bland had been evaluated and received a more than satisfactory rating. Councilman Gonzalez moved to transfer Mrs. Bland from probationary status to permanent, full-time status. Councilman Terrazas seconded the motion which carried. <br> Councilman Gonzalez stated that a wage increase up to $10 \%$ had been that the increase be granted to all full-time employees, divided into seventeen pay periods and paid on the next pay period (February 7) with the exclusion of one full time employee who had received a raise in October. Probationary and parttime employees would not receive wage increases. The motion was and carried. <br> Mr. Gonzalez moved that David Martinez be granted an additional 50 cents per hour because of the nature of his responsibilities. He had received no increase when he was named superintendent seven months ago. Mr. Martinez has seventeen years of service with the city. Mr. Terrazas seconded the motion and it carried. <br> Councilman Gonzalez moved to 13 meeting in naming a Jouruary Authority Board. Appointments had been recorded as being made for a term when actually appointment could only be made to fill vacancies until the end of the terms. Texas school property tax law "We realize that the schools need

"We are committed to supporting
