ministered by Judge Isaac c. ministered by Judge Isaac c.
Parker, the "Hanging Judge" of
Fort Smith, Arkansas who administered tough justice to convicyears ago.
years ago.
Judge Parker's jurisdiction was
comprised of western Arkansas and comprised of western Arckansas and
the nearby Indian Territory (later he nearby Indian Territory (later
Oklahoma) and his supporters cried out loudly for "tough justice", a cry
that he swiftly responded to whenever violent felons were
brought before him and convicted of heir crimes.
The average law-abiding citizen which was populated by transplaned Native American tribes. Their pockets of poverty in deseat part were largely empty and remote.
As such, that area constituted a collective haven for law breakers on the run from Arkansas, Missouri, Appointed to the bench President U.S. Grant, "Hanging
Judge" Parker served from 1875 to 1895, during which time 88 convicted felons were publicly hanged on
his order (out of 175 so sentenced). Sometimes they were hanged three, four, five, and (once) even six at a ime. Parker's conviction ratio was
some 8,600 convictions to about 1,700 acquitals, or an usually high (especially when compared to today)

County Agent News

I apologize for the absence of this I apologize for the absence of this
column the last couple of week. For
those of you who have not been up. those of you who have not been up-
stairs in the county courthouse
lately, we have been going through lately, we have been going through
some changes. My office is now
located on the east side of the
courthouse behind the coutron courthouse bens now beginning to return to normal operation. It is time to start tninking about
firewood for those cold winter
nights that will be her long.
Although green wood will burn,
seasoned wood has more heat value seasoned wood has more heat value
and will not deposit excessive
creosote in chimneys and creosote
stovepipes.
Any mois Any moisture in wood reduces the
recoverable heat. The heat must fir st dry the wood so it will burn. So, wood cut in late fall or winter
doenn't have time to dry adequately. doesn't have time to dry adequately,
Thus, you may want to cut, or hav Thus, you may want to cut, or hav
wood cut, in spring and summer Split wood will dry faster tha wood not split. Stack wood loosely
in piles on a couple of rows of brics in piles on a couple of rows of bricks.
This keeps wood off the This keeps wood off the
ground and prevents decay while a gre same time allows faster drying.
Stacking firewood in Stacking firewood in a sunny.
location and covering it with clear location and covering it with clea
plastic also helps moisture evaporate, thus speeding up the
drying and seasoning evaporate, thus spe
drying and seasoning.

Since vapor will condense on the
plastic, adequate ventilation is also necessary. Keep plastic off the ends
of the firewood to allow air to flow of the firewood to allow air to flow
and to keep condensation from wet ting the wood.
