Kinney County Commissioners Approve Roof Project Cost Covered By Insurance

At a special meeting of the Commissioners Court at 1:30 p.m. on Friday, October 2, 1992, Commissioners Alvin McClure and
Plunker Sheedy were present with Judge Tim Ward presiding.
No library contracts needed to be

right on time, and right on budget. One bid from York \& Hall for paving was opened and read and

Approval was given for Belding Approval was given
Roofing, who had submitted the
lowest cost, to repair roof damage to lowest cost, to repair roof damage to
county buildings caused by wind county buildings caused by wind
and hail on March 16. Belding Roofing will guarantee all their work, and all costs will be covered by insurance re-imbursement. Although not an agenda item,
Judge Ward shared information he had just received from the Texas Department of Transportation
regarding a second traffic survey regarding a second traffic survey
conducted August $13-20$. They indicated no traffic signal was warranted (as did their earlier report) but they did indicate a stop sign could be
moved 15 feet south from its present location at the intersection of Hwy. 334 and Hwy. 90. A 4 -way stop
sign was justified for the intersecsign was justified for the intersec-
tion at 5 -Corners but the respontion at 5 -Corners but the respon-
sibility rested with the City of Brackettville.
A third count is scheduled for

the act occured is that only one drug case was made in Kinney County by undercover agents AFTER the
serious breach of security reportedly serious breach of security reportedly
occurred.

evidence that it did, is an act unforgiveable by the law enforcement
profession and is under inprofession and is under in-

low character, dishonesty and total low character, dishonesty, and total
disloyalty to the law enforcement disloyaty to the law enforcement profession and to the officers who
lay their lives on the line in any un-
dercover operation such as the one dercover operation such as the one
just completed. One must wonder just completed. One must wonder
just how such a man can live with himself and face other law enfor-
cement officers who are now aware cement officers who are now aware
of his most treacherous act. A man of his most treacherous act. A man
such as that does not deserve to be a
law enforcement officer in any such as that does not deserve to be a
law enforcement officer in any
capacity anywhere!

Though we did not make cases
against all the suspected drug against all the suspected drug
dealers and users in Kinney County, we did put them all on notice that
they deal and use illegal drugs in our community at their own rus. risk.
Another benefit of the intensive un Another benefit of the intensive un-

swered several questions related to
iilegal drug dealing and use in Kinillegal drug dealing and use in Kin
ney County. The most important
assessment is assessment is that illegal drug
dealing and use in our county is on a
small scale and appears to be consmall scale and appears to be con-
tained within a loose group of small tained within a loose group of smal
time dealers and users who sell an
use illegal drugs among theme use illegal drugs among themselves.
There was NO indication of any
large scale illegal drug operation in large scale illegal drug operation in
Kinney Countr. There was very lit-
tle indication of illegal tle indication of illegal drug use of
drugs other than marijuana, with in-
dications of very limited use of dications
cocaine.
The intensive undercover drug
pperation joined by the use of drug
sniffing dogs at our local schools leads us togs believe our hat thal schore are no
drugs directly in our schools. Ther drugs directly in our schools. There
are some suspected users on a small
scale attending our schools but not ocale attending our schools but not
one indication that any drug dealers
are waiting are waiting outside the
schoolgrounds to sell drugs to our
young people. There are no "crack young people. There are no " "rack
houses" nor street corner dealers in
Kinney County. Kinney County.
No, the job No, the job is not over, and
probably never will be. But all in all
we feel good probably never will be. But all in a
we feel good dabout the operation, we
feel feel a reassurance about the
questions answered by the operation, and we believe that we at
least have the drug situation in Kinney County under control. We will
continue to the best we can in a combined cooperative effort with
TRUSTED law enforcemen ficers and agencies to wage war on
drugs in Kiney drugs in Kinney County and

ved by the Amistad Area Narcotics Trafficking Task Force.
