## Developing A Coaching Philosophy

| When developing a coaching made is the importance you place on winning. To decide that winning is less important than student-athlete development is one thing, but to walk the walk and truly make walk the wakk and decisions to reflect this is another <br> It is easy to say that striving to win is more important than winning, even during the course of the season, do you play only your best athletes or athletes who have erred when trying to perform? If so, you're probably not acting in the best interest of all your students. <br> Society in general and communities specifically place a lot of we award those who win. When has a Coach-of-the-Year ever been a coach with a .500 season? On the other hand, we say that sports are very important, they enhance the development of the student. We maintain that sports are an extension of the classroom, to help develop leadership skills, build character, build a team concept and stress the importance of discipline. but they are sometimes evaluated on their win-loss record, not what they have brought to the team, or how they developed the students on the team. <br> With the start of a new school year, take a minute to evaluate your philosophy. If you place winning ahead of all else, regardless of the price, you need to change. Rainer Martin, PhD , suggests that coaches adopt a simple objective: Athletes first, winning second. This means that every decisions made and every behavior displayed should reflect first. what is best for your athletes and second what may improve the athletes or the team's chances of winning. winning second does not mean winning is unimportant. Martin states that the immediate short-term objective of any contest is to win. the objective or striving to win within the rules of the game Michael Novak in Joy Of states that to play sports without striving to win is to be a dishonest competitor. In the next six months 11 million people will suffer an episode of depression, but only one-third of those will seek derstand that depression is a treatable illness.
