Caprock's Night Move Cowboys..

BOVINA, Texas - It's 4 A.M. and 47,000 cattle slumber and stir softly in the crisp air of an October night in the Texas Panhandle. Then the hush of the night is pierced by the rebel yell as seven cowboys on horseback enter a pen.

"Yee-hah!" "Up-ah, up-ah!" "Heyheyheyhey!" Lumbering to their feet, the 100 cattle in the pen shuffle, then trot away from the riders, who advance side-byside to direct the cattle out of the pen into a 16-foot-wide alley.

In the alley, the cattle start moving faster. Lightcolored steers flash by a pool of light from one of the buckles on leather chaps as

rider lets out a yell. "Let'sgolet'sgolet'sgo! Yah!"

The early wake-up call occurs a few times a week at Cargill's Caprock Feedyard No. 5 here in Bovina, a metropolis of cattle on the scrub-covered High Plains of Texas. The cattle are headed on trailers to the Excel plant in nearby Friona, just a dozen miles up the road, where they will be processed soon after sunrise.

The inconvenient hour is carefully chosen, notes Lonnie Busch, feedyard manager. Excel can start its production line right on time, maximizing its efficiency. And the cattle are processed promptly, which is better than having them stand around for hours at the packing plant getting nervous and losing valuable weight.

In fact, while the industry benchmark for a steer's weight loss between leaving a feedyard and processing is 4 percent of body weight, Bovina's night-shipped cattle shrink less than 1 percent, according to cattle scheduler Mickie Herring at Excel in The Bovina Friona. Feedyard's percentage of "dark cutters" - beef discolored by a flush of stress-induced hormones - is also quite low, ensuring more potential for premium beef. Dark cutters represent a loss of \$200 per

> "A calf has a brain, a horse has a brain and you have a brain - and you've got to work it all out in the pen," says Darren Newton, the cattle manager who oversees Caprock's night shipments. "It's easy to get frustrated, and it's intense. This is the hardest thing I've ever had to train someone on."

> Back in the feedyard, rider Clyde Jenkins follows 16 head into "the box" - a curved, solid-walled steel pen about 20 feet square swinging a heavy door shut behind him. His horse snorts a cloud of steam in the night air, then Jenkins moves his mount toward a steer he has determined is the leader. The leader trots through a curved chute called "the snake" and clatters up the ramp to a transport trailer. Most of the other cattle follow.




Shredded trash blows around and makes the cemetery less holy and less inviting. A cemetery should be a place for loved ones to be able to go and enjoy.


when Speedy Nieman died. He also worked as a Brand sportswriter and advertising manager at the paper.

But one steer balks, and Jenkins and his horse begin dance that has been performed in feedyard pens on the High Plains for more than a century. The horse steps to one side, trying to nudge the steer toward the shoot. The steer fakes left, then bolts straight at the horse's chest. The mount shifts aside with surprising grace, then wheels around to face the startled steer. The steer tries one or two quick feints, then yields and moves into the snake.

At about 1,250 pounds, the steer weighs more than the horse and rider combined, without brawn on their side, cowboy and horse play a game of mental chess with the cattle, executing moves in split-second time.

"You pick out the leader and start working on him, says Jason Floyd, a veteran cattleman who spent two years as a night shipper before hiring on full-time with Caprock as yard manager. You get to where you can tell what he's going to do before he even makes his move.

Despite all the advances in technology, loading cattle still comes down to a cowboy and a horse. "We've got fourwheelers and ATVs, but you can't turn around an ATV in a tight space," Floyd notes. "And you can't make an ATV step to the side."

As he speaks, horses and cattle dance in the pens under the brilliant stars of the big Texas sky.

Another recipe that can be found on the site is for skewered cantaloupe, which calls for lightly grilling chunks of the fruit and serving them with a honey sauce.

Melons have a natural sweetness that makes them a perfect addition to salads, desserts, drinks or even salsas. Halved cantaleupe, honeydew and watermelon provide great bowls for filling.

Consumers who choose to include melons in their diets are also reaping the health benefits of eating these lowcalorie, no-fat, no-cholesterol fruit. Most melons are also a great source of vitamins

Texas is a leading melon production state with a \$152 million market having a statewide economic impact of \$298 million. Texas ranks third in the U.S. production of cantaloupes and honeydew melons and second in watermelons.

Last year, nearly 50,000 acres of melons were harvested to produce a billion pounds of melons. The first domestic shipments of melons originate in South Texas in May and June with peak output occurring through September.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION SEPTEMBER 13, 2003

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 68, Section 1)

HJR 68, Section 1 would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use excess receipts in the Veterans' Land and Veterans' Housing Assistance funds for payment of revenue bonds, and use excess assets in those funds to provide veterans

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide veterans homes for the aged or infirm and to make principal, interest, and bond enhancement payments on revenue bonds."

PROPOSITION 2 (HJR 51)

HJR 51 would expand from six months to two years the period in which the former owner of a mineral interest that was sold for unpaid property taxes may buy back the mineral interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to establish a two-year period for the redemption of a mineral interest sold for unpaid ad valorem taxes at a tax sale."

PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 55)

HJR 55 would authorize the legislature to exempt from taxation land owned by a religious organization that is leased for use as a school or that will be used to expand or construct a place of religious worship that yields no revenue.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property owned by a religious organization that is leased for use as a school or that is owned with the intent of expanding or constructing a religious facility."

PROPOSITION 4 (SJR 30)

SJR 30 would authorize the legislature to allow conservation and reclamation districts to use taxes to develop and finance certain parks and recreation facilities. Also, the amendment would authorize the legislature to allow local elections for the issuance of bonds to improve and maintain parks and recreational facilities in the Tarrant Regional Water District or a conservation and reclamation district located in whole or in part in Bastrop, Bexar, Brazoria, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Montgomery, Tarrant, Travis, Waller or Williamson County.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the provision of parks and recreational facilities by certain conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 25)

SJR 25 would authorize the legislature to exempt from all property taxes certain tangible personal property, which could include a travel trailer not substantially affixed to real estate and not used as a residential dwelling.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 23)

HJR 23 would authorize a qualified homeowner to refinance a home equity loan with a reverse mortgage loan.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting refinancing of a home equity loan with a reverse mortgage."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 44)

HJR 44 would reduce the number of persons who make up the jury in a district

court criminal misdemeanor case from

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a six-person jury in a district court misdemeanor trial."

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 62)

HJR 62 would authorize the legislature to permit a person to assume office without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that office and the election is required by the Texas Constitution. This proposition applies to state and local political subdivisions, whereas Proposition 18 applies only to local political subdivisions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a person to take office without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that

PROPOSITION 10 (HJR 61)

HJR 61 would authorize municipalities to donate surplus fire-fighting equipment, supplies, or materials to the Texas Forest Service, which would be authorized to distribute based on need the equipment to rural volunteer fire departments.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate surplus fire-fighting equipment or supplies for the benefit of rural volunteer fire departments."

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 85)

HJR 85 would authorize the legislature to regulate the operation of wineries in Texas, regardless of whether a winery is located in an area in which the sale of wine has been authorized by local option election.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "A constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to enact laws authorizing and governing the operation of wineries in this state."

PROPOSITION 12 (HJR 3)

PROPOSITION 16 (SJR 42)

SJR 42 would amend the Texas Constitution to allow home equity lines of credit and allow refinancing of a home equity loan with a reverse mortgage loan.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a home equity line of credit, providing for administrative interpretation of home equity lending law, and otherwise relating to the making, refinancing, repayment, and enforcement of home equity loans."

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 21)

HJR 21 would prohibit an increase in school property taxes on residence homesteads of disabled persons.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit an increase in the total amount of school district ad valorem taxes that may be imposed on the residence homestead of a disabled person."

PROPOSITION 18 (HJR 59)

HJR 59 would authorize the legislature to permit a person to assume an office of a political subdivision without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that office and the election is required by the Texas Constitution. This proposition applies only to local political subdivisions, whereas Proposition 8 applies to state and local political subdivi-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a person to assume an office of a political subdivision without an election if the person is the only candidate to qualify in an election for that office."

PROPOSITION 19 (SJR 45)

Department of Transportation to issue SJR 45 would repeal the legislature's

authority to create rural fire prevention districts. Effective September 1, 2003, all existing rural fire prevention districts will convert to emergency services districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the authority of the legislature to provide for the creation of rural fire prevention districts."

PROPOSITION 20 (SJR 55)

SJR 55 would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds in a total amount not to exceed \$250 million that will be used to provide loans for economic development projects that benefit defense-related communities in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds or notes not to exceed \$250 million payable from the general revenues of the state to provide loans to defense-related communities, that will be repaid by the defense-related community, for economic development projects, including projects that enhance the military value of military installations."

PROPOSITION 21 (SJR 19)

SJR 19 would authorize current and retired faculty members of a public institution of higher education to receive compensation for service as a member of the governing body of a water district.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a current or retired faculty member of a public college or university to receive compensation for service on the governing body of a water district."

PROPOSITION 22 (HJR 84)

HJR 84 would authorize the appointment of a temporary replacement officer to serve on behalf of a state, district, or local public officer who is called into active military duty for longer than 30 days.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the appointment of a temporary replacement officer to fill a vacancy created when a public officer enters active duty in the United States armed forces."

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

Despite weekly export sales, as reported by USDA, that exceeded industry estimates, cotton futures on the New York Cotton Exchange closed lower for the third consecutive day on Thursday and at their lowest point in seven sessions.

As expected, export figures were healthy in USDA's weekly report. Some market observers expected a good week of solid export shipments in light of the recent high Step 2 payment, but thought sales might be slim. Part of their reasoning was the transition between the old and new crop year and a lack of demand on the cash market in response to current higher prices.

The week's export sales were considerably higher than the previous week, but shipments decreased. However, the current marketing year will draw to a close at the end of July, and the latest export figures have traders saying USDA's 11.5 million bale export target for the year will be met.

For the week ended July 10, USDA reported net upland exports reached
230,000 bales. The figure was 7 percent
below the previous week and four percent lower than the four-week average.

In other news, market observers kept an eye on Hurricane Claudette which made landfall along the Texas coast on Tuesday. With Texas, the top-producing cotton state, having been battered by bad weather already this year, traders expressed some concern about Claudette and its possible impact on the cotton crop.

Market anxieties were alleviated when it appeared the storm would miss the bulk of the Texas cotton crop. Claudette struck the Texas Upper Coastal Bend and moved inland north of Corpus Christi. Gusty winds and heavy rains of as much as three inches per hour were reported in some areas and caused flash flooding. However, most of the Coastal Bend remained dry, and some rainfall would have been welcomed to help boost crop development. Elsewhere in the state, hot and dry weather prevailed on the High and Rolling Plains with above-average temperatures recorded. Hence, cumula-

creasing water demand. In fact, many farmers have begun irrigating to ease heat stress and to reduce boll shed. Some non-irrigated stands already have blooms at the top due to shallow root systems, and light boll shed has been reported. Therefore, a general rain is needed soon to prevent premature "cutout" and excessive shedding.

Overall, U.S. cotton crop conditions improved as of July 13, according to USDA. The department's data showed 53 percent of the U.S. crop was in good to excellent condition while 16 percent of the crop was in poor to very poor condition. The crop remains behind schedule with squaring progress at only 71 percent compared to 84 percent one year ago and the five-year average of 84 percent. Additionally, boll setting was at 28 percent compared with 38 percent the previous year and the five-year average of 39 percent.

On the spot cotton scene, online sales by Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas producers decreased in the five trading
