# PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION <br> MAY 1, 1993

Information on the proposed constitutional amendments was compiled by rustees of the League of Women Voters of Texas Education Fund, and arguments for and against are not necessarily those of the League.
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## Amendment 1

## Wording on the Ballot

The constitutional amendment allowing lim authorizing the legislature or local districts to se minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts.

## Explanation

Texas public schools are funded through a combination of state and local revenues, and a small amount of federal dollars. At present, the ocal share of funding is roughly $54 \%$ of the total amount spent on public education. This local share comes from ad valorem (property) taxes levied by local school districts. The amount of money per student a school district is able to raise a a given tax rate depends on the district's property wealth, and property wealth varies significantly from district to district. Thus a wealthy district may raise the same amount of dollars per student at a much lower tax rate than the tax rate necessary in a property-poor district. The Texas Supreme Court has held, under the efficiency tion, that if Texas chooses to rely heavily on the local property tax to fund its public schools, then all property must be taxed under a schooo finance system that provides similar revenue per studen has set a June 1,1993 deadline for the legislature
to adopt corrective measures. If the deadline is not met, school funds will be frozen
Proposition 1 is designed to meet the court mandate by redistributing a portion of the tax dollars raised by the wealthiest school districts. The proposed amendment has three parts. First it would authorize the legislature to redistribute among other school districts a portion of the property taxes raised by a school district. Second the legislature would have the option to create county educational districts (CEDS in one or more counties and to allow the CEDs to levy axes. The legislature could set a minimum tax rate or could authorize ine schoor distars EDs to sel he rare, provided haine tax rae dir notexceed $\$ 1$ per 100 otvaluationumess rine CED appropty tax, whether statewide edistributed propery tax, wintion of the two whin the CEDs, or 75 per cent of the combined coula nol exceal revenues for public schools extudi any state revenues from an ad valorem ( (s) fo the provision of free textbooks, and the contributions to a retirement system.

## Arguments For

The amendment would allow limited redistribution of property taxes from the wealthiest disricts to other school districts in Texas but would trimits such redistribution to $2.75 \%$ of the total state
and local dollars for education. Thus, passage of this amendment would enhance the level of educational funding in the property-poor districts, while not significantly impairing the ability of the property-rich districts to provide high quality public schools.
By limiting the percentage of funds that could be redistributed in order to equalize funding to the schools, the amendment would protect local disHicts from and ied stare access to the local property tax base as seresorcelormeeting the obligation to provide an efficient public school system
This proposition would be a preferred solution to the difficult task of funding public schools equitably. Alternatives include massive consolidation of school districts and resulting loss of local control, or major restructuring of the state tax system, with additional and/or new state taxes possible.

- Passage of this amendment and its implementing legislation before the court deadline of June 1, 1993 would keep Texas schools in operation and allow orderly planning for the opening of the new school year in the fall. The cut-off of state funds for public schools would be disruptive to students and teachers and to local economies and would create bad publicity for the state in national and international business communities.

## Amendment 1

## Arguments Against

- Taxpayers in school districts with high prop erty wealth per student would be involuntarily forced to send local tax revenues outside their districts, which the constitution currently prohibits. Local property taxes in these districts could rise as
a result.
- This amendment would continue the state trend of depending more and more on the loca property tax to fund public education in Texas, rather than drawing state education dollars from a statewide tax.
- In spite of the court threat to cut off state funding to Texas schools, the schools do not have to be permanently closed if this amendment does not pass. Rather, the legislature will have the opportunity to come up with an alternative plan during May.
- Sending additional money to the public schools, as this amendment would provide, does not al


## Amendment 2

## Wording on the Ballot

The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates.

## Explanation

Because public education is the responsibility of state government, the Texas Legislature creates many of the rules and regulations by which the schools are run. Legislatively imposed obligations on school districts can place additional tax burdens on these districts when the legislature does not provide state revenues to cover the cost of implementing its mandates. School districts sometimes find it necessary to raise property to meet new mandates.

This proposition would prohibit educationa mandates enacted after December 31, 1993, unless the state fully funds the obligations. Exceptions to the requirement of full funding by the state would be state mandates imposed in compliance with the state constitution or federal law or where the legislature has enacted the mandate by a twothe legislature has enacted the procedure for determining if an obligation is fully funded would be set by general law, but in the absence of such proce the state comptroller would make the determination.

## Arguments For

This proposal would result in fiscal accounta bility at the state level by prohibiting the legislature from placing educational obligations on local schoo districts after December 31, 1993, unless the legislature provides the state revenue to fund
these new mandates.
This amendment would prevent legislators from passing mandates that greatly increase costs to local districts.

## Arguments Against

This proposal could increase the likelihood that all educational reforms would be challenged bringing new stalemates into the system.

The proposition would reduce the state's abil ity to set standards and improve the quality of public education

## Amendment 3

## Wording on the Ballot

The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of $\$ 750$ million in state general obliga tion or revenue bonds to assist school districts in to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for $\$ 750$ million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanen school fund.

## Explanation

The state shares the costs of operating public schools in Texas with local school districts. Re sponsibility for providing school buildings and capital improvements, however, rests solely on local districts, although some state assistance is provided for debt service taxes levied by eligible districts. Property-poor school districts and those districts with rapidly expanding student populations can have difficulty providing adequate schoo facilities for their pupils. This lack of state assis-
tance for facilities is a major issue in the current lawsuit

In 1989 voters approved a constitutional amendment that provides for using the Permanent School Fund and its income to guarantee revenue bonds issued by the state for the purpose of aiding school districts. Partly because of restrictions in federal tax law, no bonds have been issued under the 1989 authorization.

This proposition would amend the constitution to allow state issuance of general obligation or revenue bonds in an amount up to $\$ 750$ million for the purpose of making loans to or purchasing the school construction bonds of local school districts. The amendment would allow the state to forgive payment of part or all of a loan made to a school district to partially finance a school building, and the amendment would continue to allow the use of the Permanent School Fund and its income to guarantee bonds issued by school districts.

## Arguments For

School children in Texas would be given a better opportunity to attend school in decent facilities through passage of this amendment. The proposition would allow the state to help financially strapped or fast-growing school districts with their building needs.

State participation in equalizing funding for onstruction of school facilities could help resolve the current lawsuit.

## Arguments Against

The limitation of $\$ 750$ million in assistance would not go far in addressing current unmet facilities needs and in providing for expected student growth over the foreseeable future.
The proposal would add to the state's debt burden.
