get done, whether some of us like it or not. Yes, there are groups who try to persuade legislators in behalf of

also powerful lobbies that represent also powerful lobbies that represent
the interests fighting health care reform, resisting legislation for long-

## ALR Will Save Lives Prevent Injuries

"Laws presumably express the

Administrative License Revocation bill (ALR) by the 73rd Legislature curtail needless deaths and injuries caused by drunk drivers.
According to the National High-
way Traffic Safety Administration way Traffic Safety Administration
this bill, which becomes effective on January 1, 1995, could save up to 100 lives a year,
Currently, wh
Currently, when law enforcement
officers deternine officers determine that there is
probable cause to stop or arrest drober for drenk driving, they ad-
minister a field sobriety test. Drivers minister a field sobriety test. Drivers
who perform poorly are arrested for
DWI and taken to the who perform poorly are arrested for
DWI and taken to the police station for chemical tests to measure their blood alcohol concentration levels.
Under ALR, officers will issue a Uotice of license suspension to notice of license suspension to
anyone who fails or refuses that test,
but will not but will not confiscate the license at
that time. that time.
Drivers will have 15 days from the date they receive the suspension test the suspension. Administrative law judges from the State Office of
Administrative Hearings will conduct the hearings to determine whether reasonable suspicion or probable cause existed for officers
to stop or arrest drivers and if they to stop or arrest drivers and if they
were operating a motor vehicle with were operating a motor vehicle with
an alcohol level at or above the legal limit of 10 .
Drivers may appeal hearing of-
ficers' rulings to a county court atficers' rulings to a county court at-
law or county court. Suspensions law or county court. Suspensions
will be effective on the date the
judge makes judge makes a final decision or on
the 40 th day after notice is served the 40th day after n
whichever occurs last.
Suspension periods vary from 60
days to 1 year, depending
days to 1 year, depending on
whether a driver failed or refused a test, and on the type and number of previous offenses. Drivers who fail a
BAC test will have their licenses suspended for 60 days for first of
fenses; 120 days, repeat offenses; fenses; 120 days, repeat offenses;
and 1800 days, previous convictions for DWI or invountary man-
slaughter. Drivers slaughter. Drivers who refuse to
take the test will have their license suspended for 90 days for first of
fense; 180 days, repeat fense; 180 days, repeat offenders;
and 1 year, offenders previously
convicted of DWI or involuntary

Offenders who attend school counseling and rehabilitation
programs approved by the court and who show an essential need for the
license may reques license may request occupational
licenses. These would become effective immediately for first offenders, 90 days after the suspension's effective date for repeat offenders, and
180 days after the suspension's effective date for drivers previously convicted of DWI or involuntary Because ALR is a civil remedy,

from day to day, of any house in which he lived remaining his own fo any length of time.
This arose partly from the fact of there being an insufficient number of quarters, but mainly from the
position of the post being such that roops were sent there to be held in
readiness for any emergency - which was generally supposed to be impending war with Mexico.

the darkness, a number of soldiers stormed the jail. The jail was well stormed the and the thick woors seemingly impregnable, they affected an entrance.
At Fort Clark the garrison was greatly alarmed, for the town was so near they could hear the firing and
umult. The ladies were doubly frightened, because each one's
husband had been summoned to march at the head of his troops and quell the disturbance.
The jail had been forced before
the arrival of the troops from Fort Clark; but the soldiers, though carefully searching every cell, had
been unable to find the prisoner, and, after vowing vengeance on the authorities for having removed him, assembled outside, where they ven-
ted their wrath and disappointment by firing against the heavy stone by firing against the heavy stone
building. When the Cavalry reached the scene, and in their turn began to fire, every man disappeared, escaping under the cover of darkness and
confusion. They found their way back to the Fort, where at roll-call all answered to their names as in-

cause of dementia (loss of mental powers) in the elderly. Symptoms include changes, impaired judge. changes, impaired judge-
ment, impaired ability to understand and reason, disorientation to surroundings. impaired language skills, and hallucinations.
The onset of symptoms in
Alzheimer's Alzheimer's disease is most often a gradual process, but
it can appear suddenly after stress or illness. Persons suf fering from dementia may at tempt to conceal their symptoms initially, by denying their problems, by blaming others, or by using lists or other means with which
to iog their memory. As the
disease progresses, increasing agitation, wandering, depression, apathy, and bel-
ligerent behavior may make caring for the Alzheimer's. patient more difficult You mentioned your aunt
has Alzheimer's disease, and how you are concerned nabout your mother. The risk of developing Atzheimer's
disease is higher in close reladisease is higher in close rel tives of affected persons,
