WHAT EVER HAPPENED to trust? It seems to be in short supply these days.

Bill told me an amazing story the other day. He said that when he was in grade school at Oklahoma Lane in 1947, electricity first came to the farm in Parmer County. Once each month the electric company would send out cards instructing their customers to go out and look at the electric meter. You were asked to write the meter numbers in the blank space on the card, which then went back into the mailbox, was picked up by the rural mail carrier and in a few days, here came the bill for your month's electricity.

The amazing thing is that people in rural areas are still reading their own electric meters. Well, it probably isn't amazing to anyone but me...I was raised a city girl. But it certainly proves my point that rural people do show a lot more trust and faith in one another than city people do.

Across the country, the violent crime rate is down 20 per cent since 1980. The National Crime Survey of the Bureau of Justice indicates that men are victims of robbery, assault and other violent crimes twice as often as women. That may surprise you, because we hear more about women being the victims of crime.

Another surprise coming out of the survey is the fact that members of families in the lowest income categories (less than \$3,000 a year) had the highest overall rate of victimization of any income group. And unemployed persons were victimized more often than those who had jobs. So the people who can least afford to lose their belongings or to be cared for in hospitals are the ones who are being hit on. Like animals preying on the weak!

Across the country, states which spend the most on law enforcement, criminal investigations and justice, have the highest crime rates. This indicates that states are spending in response to crime rather than in hopes of preventing it.

In times of depressed economy, the incidence of crime rises. The proportion of young men, ages 16 to 21, to the general population is also a large factor in crime rate. During World War II, there was almost no unemployment, and very little crime. The young men considered to be the violent-prone segment, were all in uniform or were otherwise employed in assisting the war effort.

In my opinion, there would be less crime if each individual was instilled with more honesty, compassion, trust and respect for others. I have always thought these were values which should be taught in the home. But look what has happened to home life since WWII. Both parents working, some holding down two jobs while trying to make ends meet; worry and stress are constant; divorce rates rising. It is nearly impossible for parents to give children the quality time that teaches proper values. No one is exactly to blame. Society has just grown so complex that day-by-day existence gets more difficult with time.

One step in the right direction would be for the toy makers to get rid of ALL violent weapon toys. There was a time during the late 60s when Sears took all toy guns out of their stores and catalogues. They would do it again, if enough consumers indicated they really wanted it done.

Well, there is a ray of hope in all this. We stopped at a roadside produce stand over in Castro County a few weeks ago and discovered there was no one manning the stand. A sign told prospective customers to take what they wanted from the display of pre-bagged and pre-priced veggies and drop their money or checks into a little metal box beside the door. So there is still trust left among people in this area of America.

Mustangs Score 57-18 Homecoming Win

Bovina High School's Mustangs scored a 57-18 win over Amarillo Christian as a highlight of Homecoming activities at BHS last Friday.

The Mustangs exploded for 29 second-period points to coast to their third win of the season against a single loss.

"Everyone did their job. The substitutes who don't usually get to play saw a lot of action, and that should help the team down the line. Some of the subs played well," Coach Bill Talley said.

Bovina took the lead in the first

quarter when fullback Todd Ware capped a drive by running a yard for a touchdown. The kick failed, for a 6-0 score.

In the second quarter, quarterback Scott Scaff connected with Gabriel Mancini on a 35-yard pass play for a score. Ware ran for two points, and a 14-0 lead.

Later in the quarter, Albert Espinosa ran 12 yards for a touchdown, Bud Venable kicked the point, and Bovina was ahead, 21-0.

Venable then scored on a 65-yard run from scrimmage for a 27-

0 Bovina lead, and before the half was over, defensive back Denver Riddle intercepted a pass and ran it 65 yards for a touchdown. Bovina enjoyed a 35-0 halftime lead.

"That's the first time we've been able to go in at halftime, have a Coke, and just relax. It was a good feeling," Coach Talley said.

To begin the third quarter, Venable scored on a four-yard run to stake Bovina to a 41-0 lead, and Talley inserted his reserves into the game.

Although they were anxious to see action, the Mustang reserves turned the ball over two or three times, which allowed the visitors to score their touchdowns.

In the fourth quarter, Venable got his third touchdown on a 61-yard run, and Scaff ran the two-pointer for a 49-12 Bovina lead.

After the Amarillo team scored again, Espinoza finished the scoring for the night with a four-yard run, and Venable ran the points for a final margin of 57-18.

"We played well defensively. We had played 20 minutes of clock time before Amarillo Christian made a first down. Then, right after that, Riddle picked off a pass and ran it back for a score. We also had a blocked punt which set up a short touchdown drive," Talley said.

Although play got a little ragged in the second half, Bovina was able to move the ball throughout the game.

For his performance, Venable was named "Player of the Week" for class A players by the Amarillo Globe-News on Tuesday.

Venable gained 233 yards rushing on 20 carries, scored three touchdowns, kicked one point after and ran another two-pointer.

Talley said that Scaff did a good job throwing the football, completing five passes, and of running the option play.

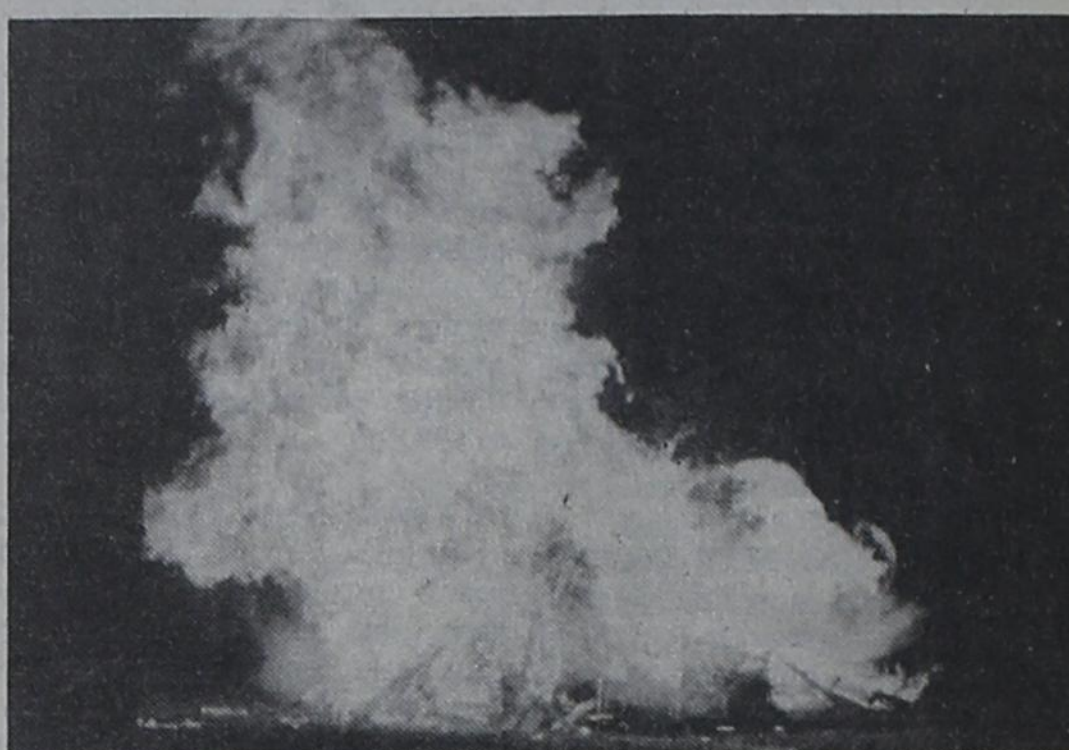
Ware gained 114 yards on 15 carries, and Scaff completed passes for 84 yards. The Mustangs amassed 477 total yards. They led in first downs, 20-6.

Clinic To Offer Shots

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for October. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella and mumps.

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

The nearest clinic to Bovina will be held at Hereford on October 8, from 8-12 and 1-4 p.m. The address is the Texas Department of Health Office, 914 East Park Avenue.

BHS To Host Steers Fri.

Bovina High School's Mustangs will open district play on Friday by hosting the Farwell Steers. Gametime, for the starting of district play, is 7:30 p.m.

It will be the second district game for the Steers, who knocked off previously unbeaten Petersburg, 17-13, in their game last Friday.

"We knew that Farwell had a tough team, even before they beat Petersburg," said Mustang Coach Bill Talley.

The Steers have a talented backfield combo, built around 1987 all-district fullback Jeff Actkinson, a 185-pound junior, and second team all-district quarterback Damon George.

"George runs the option well, and also runs with the ball well. Although they are primarily a running team, he can throw the ball if necessary," Talley says.

The Steers have a 3-2 season record, having played one more game than the Mustangs, who enter the contest with a 3-1 mark.

Farwell also has its defensive standouts, again led by Actkinson, who was an all-district linebacker a year ago.

The Mustangs expect to be in good physical shape, with no injuries to speak of. In fact, the flu bug, which was making its rounds in the team last week, might be better off this week.

"We had eight players who missed practice at one time or another last week," said Coach Talley.

The Mustang coach said that everyone on the team was excited about getting into district play. "We realize the challenge we have. We can't rest on our laurels. We have to go out and prove ourselves," he said.

Glenden Sudderth Is Week's Champ

City Woman Sees Pope John Paul II

On September 11, Helen Mazurek, her daughter Mary Ann Lloyd of Canadian and Mary and Johanna Mesman of Farwell boarded a plane in Amarillo for San Antonio to see Pope John Paul II.

After arriving in San Antonio, they journeyed to Boerne, where they were surprised with a big welcome party by Helen's brothers and sisters and their families from Bandera, San Antonio, New Braunfels and Arkansas.

The next day they went to San Antonio to visit the Alamo and also did a lot of sightseeing in the area and visited old churches. Helen said they really enjoyed the hill country.

The next day, they all went to the university parking lot on their way to see the Pope. About 6 a.m., they were on a bus going to the Mass site in Westover Hills, where an emotional crowd of three hundred thousand people participated with the Pope in Mass.

She said they waited patiently for the Pope to arrive at Kelly Air Base. After the arrival, everyone was getting so excited and lining up along the parade route to see the Pope ride by. She said they felt really lucky as he was only about four or five feet away as his bullet-proof Mercedes Benz Popemobile

went by. The Pope was busy giving his blessings to the crowd.

At the Mass site, they could see everything real well with binoculars.

The Pope conducted the service in both English and Spanish and his message was for all people, all ages and all faiths and was a quote from the Bible, "I give you new covenant, such as My love has been for you, so must your love be for one another." He also instructed that we help one another physically and spiritually.

Helen said, "Being of Polish descent and one time a member of St. Stanislaus Church in Bandera, which is the second oldest Catholic Church in the United States, (the oldest is in Parama Maria), there was a particularly warm feeling of pride, knowing I shared a common heritage with the Pope. It was such a spiritual moving moment being in the presence of the leader of my religion."

Helen went on to say, "It would have been nice to have joined the crowd of 500,000 along the parade route, in the city, which was waiting on the Pope's arrival to San Fernando Cathedral, but we were tired by then, however, I know his cheerful smile won many, many hearts of the Texans."

County Raises Approved As Court Splits On Issue

Parmer County commissioners approved a new budget Monday which calls for a ten per cent salary increase for county employees.

By accepting the budget, the commissioners also accepted an increase in the tax rate which was part of the budget. The county's rate for a \$100 value for everything taxable in the state of Texas was \$0.2948 and will increase to \$0.3028 per \$100.

A certain tax increase is allowable each year by law, and this increase falls within the amount allowed, according to Bonnie Warren, County Clerk.

The budget was carried by a split vote. Two commissioners were in

favor and two were opposed to the budget. Judge Porter Roberts broke the tie in favor of the motion.

One of the dissenting commissioners, Ernest Anthony, said, "I don't want to vote for salary increases when the taxpayers haven't gotten a salary increase."

According to County Treasurer Anne Norton, the ten per cent pay raise plus an increase in Social Security and an increase in retirement will cost the county about \$70,000 to \$75,000 more annually.

The budget also calls for an increase in commissioners' travel pay. There is an increase in capital

outlay because of the possibility of installing an elevator in the county courthouse.

Certain expenditures within the budget are projected to be a little less than in the previous budget. Two of those areas include the jury fund and maintenance janitorial expenditures.

The budget does call for use of reserve funds to meet the pay increase and certain other expenditures.

Overall, the projected total receipts (or all the money the county projects to bring in) for 1988 will be \$1,689,826. The beginning balance for 1988 is projected to be \$1,033,219.

Thanks for the outstanding participation in our open house. Together we can accomplish great things with the greatest natural resource our country has--our kids.

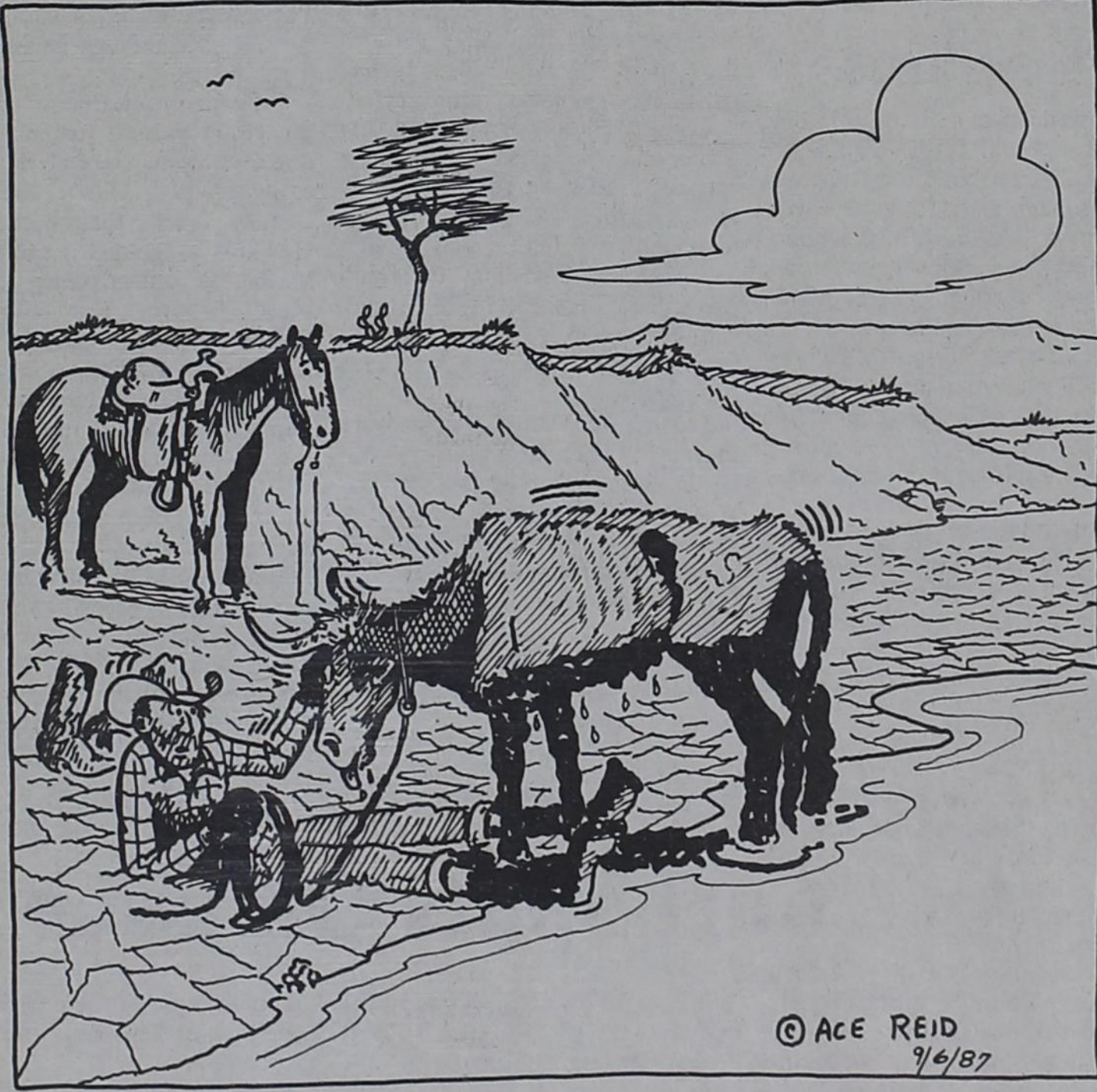

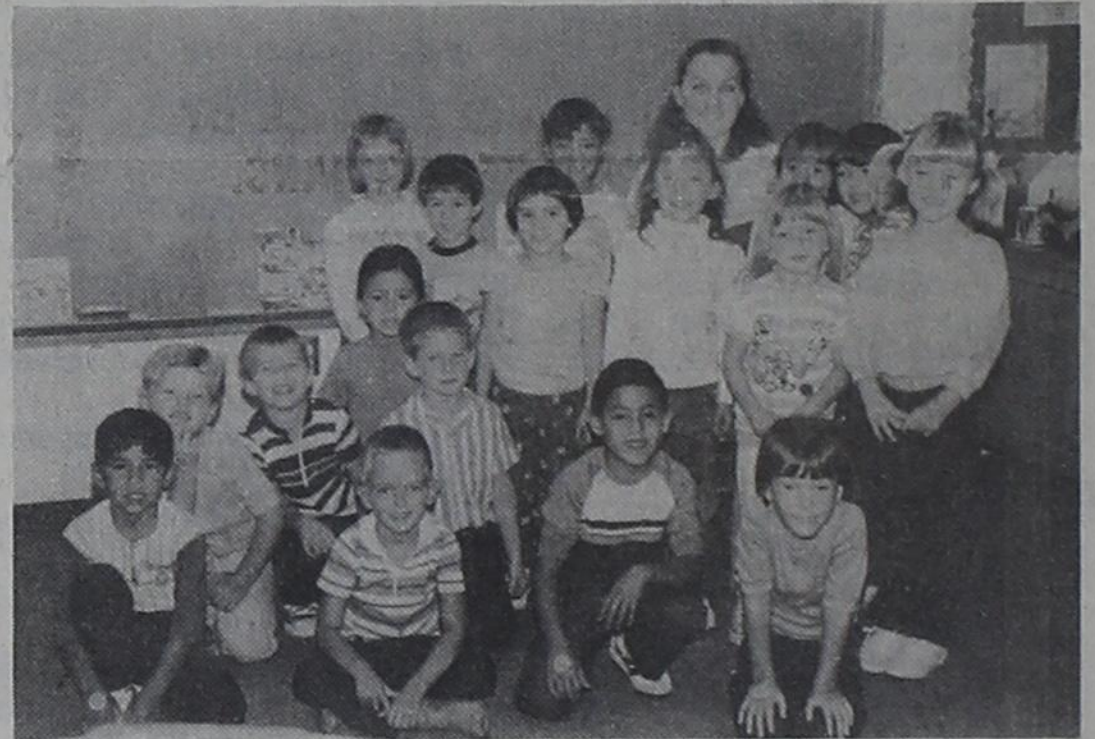
