## Kinney County Says NO Again To

 Toxic, Hazardous, Radioactive Dumping Kinney County Judge Tim Ward has announced a protest demonstration against a Houston-based corporation, U.S. Ecology, for Sunday,October 31, $1993,5: 00$ p.m. at the Civic Center in Brackettville. "For more than five years Kinney County and the surrounding area including Mexico, has opposed a planned radioactive waste dump at Spofford in southern Kinney County. In June 1993 the Texas Water
Commission turned the Texcor, Inc. application down flat Now Commission turned the Texcor, Inc. application down flat. Now, just four site. The protest rally on October 31 is our way of telling U.S. Ecology to go away and leave our clean county in peace," said Judge Ward. "How many times do these huge wealthy corporations have to be turned. down?" asked Madge Belcher of CARE, Inc., the area citizens
group which opposed the Texcor project for over five years. "Thank heaven the Water Commission has good sense and good science!" added Belcher.
Richard Lowerre, Austin-based environmental attorney who represented CARE and some of the other parties in the Texcor hearings before the TWC, said, "State lawyers have identified a clear legal provision
which prevents Texcor or U.S. Ecology from placing a radioactive waste dump on this site. U.S. Ecology would be buying itself a gigantic The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Committee (formerly the Texas Water Commission) recently turned down Texcor request for re-hearing.
James Saunders, San Antonio attorney, said, "It is inconceivable that U.S. Ecology is blind to the determination of the border area to protect its national cause. Citizens of Texas and Mexico have stood shoulder to shoulder. And they have won!'
Val Verde County, the City of Del Rio, Maverick County, the City of Eagle Pass, Uvalde County, the City of Uvalde, Kinney County, Bracket-
tville, Spofford, CARE, and other entities including city, state and national governments in Mexico have opposed the Texcor dump projec All remain firm in opposing the threat of toxic, hazardous, and radioac
tive dumps in the border region tive dumps in the border region. "Kinney County and all our neighbors say no again," vowed Judge
