SOMETIMES IT MAY seem as though the weekly newspaper in a small town such as Bovina, is there mainly for historical purposes since the grapevine is strong and the phone lines are quite active. Most folks already know about any "really big" happenings before the paper makes it to the news stands each week.

(In truth, the weekly newspaper serves the primary function of supporting the people who make up the community....their births, their deaths, and all the events that happen in between. In addition, the newspaper is designed to serve as an advertising vehicle for the businesses and residents of the area.)

The Bovina Blade has embarked on its 32nd year in business locally, and like most other businesses these days, it's a fight to keep your doors open.

Yes, the paper is a business. It is in the rather strange position of being not only a public service, and a news and advertising medium, but it is also a business with salaries to pay, printing, utilities, postage, and other large overhead costs.

With inflation on the rise again and taxes increasing, people are just naturally searching for the best way to stretch their dollars as far as they can go. The large discount stores in nearby bigger cities are most attractive to the local consumer.

The large stores can buy in larger quantities, so they are able to offer goods and services at less cost than most of the smaller stores in a small town. But did you know that many of those large discount stores are foreign-owned?

Some of the Blade's readers have often asked "if the paper so strongly advocates 'shop at home' then why does it run advertising from out-of-town?" Well, the stores in the large surrounding towns are anxious for your business and they are willing to spend their advertising money to tell you about their goods and services.

When there is not enough local advertising to support the paper, then out-of-town advertising must be accepted by the paper in order to make ends meet.

Some of the local stores depend solely on mail-out circulars to tell you, the consumer, about their goods, services, special items and promotions.

The merchants should ask themselves if those pretty color circulars can offer any of the following: support your clubs and church events, publish your local news, sponsor your Little League teams, give info on your local elections, tell the world when your children get married, your grandbabies are born, go to bat for you against unjust tax hikes, or fight for local improvements such as better roads, a needed bond issue, or industrial expansion.

In effect, the merchants who mail-out those circulars are themselves "shopping out-of-town" because that advertising dollar does not stay in Bovina, to re-circulate back through the town.

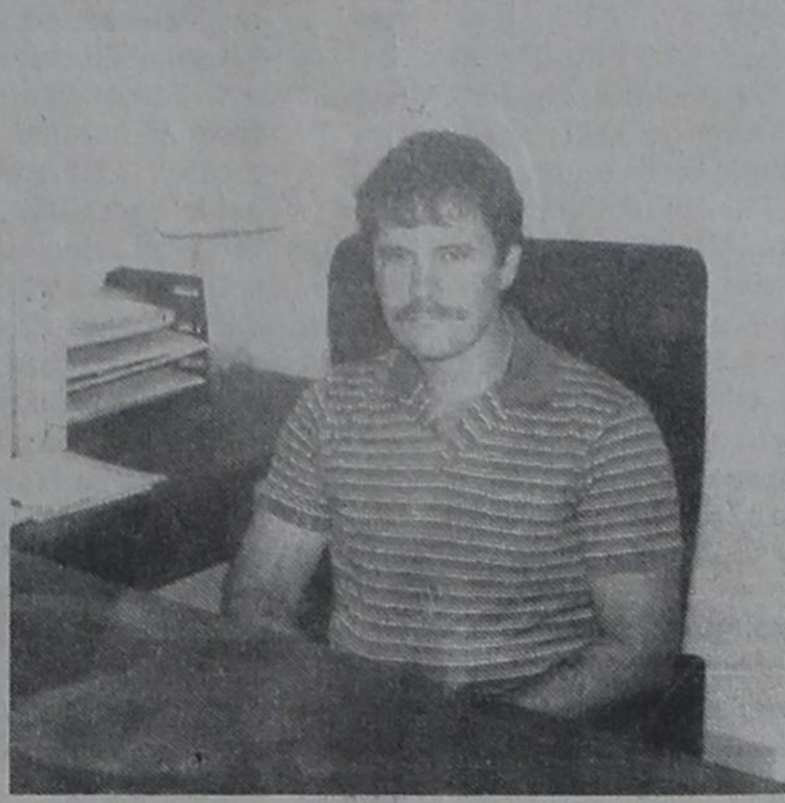
The readers of this paper enjoy seeing ads for the local stores in the paper...and not just on special occasions such as July Fourth and Christmas. And the merchants of Bovina need an advertising medium which will not go directly from the customer's mail box into the trash can. It's time for us all to get together.

New Leaders Named For Local Excel Plant

Excel Corporation has named a new plant manager and office manager for its Friona plant.

Terry Wilkerson, 36, is the new plant manager, replacing Vaughn Blum. Kerry Bahns, 31, is the new office manager, replacing Harry Hutcheson.

Both Blum and Hutcheson received promotions within the corporation, which necessitated their moving from the Friona plant.

Wilkerson, along with his wife and two children, have recently moved to Friona from Dodge City, Kansas, where he was serving as assistant to the general manager at the Excel plant.

A native of Wellington, Kansas, just south of Wichita, Wilkerson received his degree in business from Wichita State University in 1975.

He has been employed by the Excel Corp. since May of 1974, prior to finishing college. He started out on the mill floor at the Wichita plant, then spent four years at Excel's Plainview facility.

At Plainview, Wilkerson was personnel director, then worked in production and later as a superintendent.

Prairie Acres Sets Special Open House

Prairie Acres will host an Open House on August 26 from 9:30-11:30 a.m. to celebrate payment of the original bonds.

Eleven years ago, the payment schedule for these bonds seemed an unreal situation. This month we were able to make the final payment of \$70,000 plus interest on this schedule.

School Items Are Listed

Teachers have released the lists of items needed for children who will be entering first and second grades. Items needed are:

First graders: No. 2 pencil, glue (not paste), scissors (sharp point), crayons (24 count), water colors (Prang or Crayola), red pencil, eraser, school box, school bag, kleenex, coloring book (any kind).

Second graders: notebook paper (not college ruled), folder or small type notebook (not big type of notebook), two number 2 pencils, crayons (at least 16), large bottle of Elmer's glue, eraser, large box kleenex, scissors (sharp point), ruler (inches and centimeters), and school box.

He started to work for Excel in 1975, at their plant in Nebraska.

He worked for Land-O-Lakes from 1979-82, and then returned to Schuyler.

Bahns was raised on a farm 18 miles north of Schuyler, Nebraska, in the Platte River Valley. His father grew corn, soybeans and alfalfa. He attended school in Clarkston, Nebraska.

Bahns and his wife, Jackie, are parents of five children: Christi, 9, Eric, 7, Kira, 5, Linsey, 3 and Ashley, 2.

They have bought a house at 310 West Tenth Street in Friona. They are members of the Catholic Church.

"This country is a lot like where I grew up, as far as the farming and the cattle are concerned. We have a few more trees there," Bahns observed.

School Begins September 1

The first day of school will be September 1. Grades Pre-K through sixth grade will register on the first day of school in their home room. Grades Pre-K, K and one will be housed at Ridgelea. All other grades will be at the Bovina Elementary campus.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, a student must be at least four years of age on or before September 1, 1987 and unable to speak and comprehend the English language or from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level.

Pre-kindergarten students must have birth certificates and immunization records to enroll in school. Pre-kindergarten students will attend class during the morning.

Kindergarten students must be five years of age on or before September 1, 1987. Kindergarten

students that have not previously attended school are required to have birth certificates and immunization records upon entering school.

Secondary students, grades 7-12, who are new to the Bovina district or who did not pre-register last spring should come to the High School Office to pre-register on Monday, August 31 between the hours of 1:00 and 3:00 p.m.

On Tuesday, September 1, all secondary students should report to the auditorium at 8:20 a.m. for orientation.

All students that are new to the Bovina district must be accompanied by a parent so that the necessary paperwork can be completed. Students that have attended other schools should have a report card or withdrawal papers from the previous school with them so that proper placement can be made.

School will begin at 8:20 a.m.

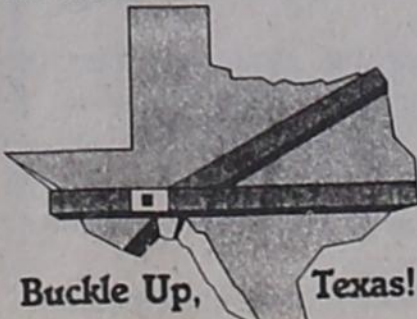
Ruby's Originals Is New Business

BHS Scores 11 TDs In Scrum

Holy Runningbacks! The Bovina Mustangs outscored the Ropes High School Eagles, 11 touchdowns to one in their first scrimmage of 1987 here last Friday.

"That's a whole season's worth of scoring for us," said a satisfied Coach Bill Talley on Monday, pointing out that the Mustangs scored only 75 points in their entire season last year.

Bovina scored almost every way possible. They got their first score when Denver Riddle intercepted an enemy pass and ran it back for a touchdown.

On Bovina's first set of 20 offensive plays, Todd Ware made a nice run for a touchdown. Then Riddle scored his second TD on a 41-yard run, and on the very next play Bud Venable ran 70 yards for a touchdown.

At the end of their first possession of 20 plays, Bovina had a 4-0 scoring lead, thanks to the one defensive and three offensive touchdowns.

On Bovina's second possession, quarterback Scott Scaff passed to Venable, who snared the ball and ran for a touchdown. The play covered about 50 yards.

On the same series, Venable got his third score of the scrimmage on a short run.

Late in the scrimmage session, the teams elected to work on goal-line drills, with both Bovina and Ropesville getting the ball ten times from their opponent's ten-yard line.

Bovina scored on five of their goal-line attempts, and the visitors crossed the goal-line for the only time of the evening during this drill.

On the ten-yard drills, Scaff passed to Gabriel Mancini for one touchdown, and Scott Sudderth and Venable added two more TDs each.

Bovina racked up 452 yards total offense in the scrimmage, 300 rushing and 152 passing. Scaff and

Sudderth combined to complete 10 of 19 passing attempts.

"Our defense was real dominant. We held Ropes to only two first downs for the entire scrimmage. They scored their only touchdown on a pass," Talley said.

The Mustang coach credited tackles Chad Clayton and Byron Neal and noseguard Tom Fuentes with outstanding games. "They didn't let anyone get downfield. They completely dominated the line of scrimmage," he said.

Talley complimented the job of the two quarterbacks--Scott Scaff and Scott Sudderth, who, he said had picked up what they've been taught real quickly.

"They were throwing the ball real well. We're not just a running team," Talley said.

The Mustang coach said the team was much farther along at this stage than they had been the past two years, and this is primarily due to the fact that Bovina's team is made up mainly of upperclassmen, who have some experience.

"We're getting good senior leadership," Talley said.

The Mustangs still need to improve on their offensive line, according to the BHS head coach, even though they moved the football.

This Friday, the team could get a better idea of just how good they might be, when they visit Meadow for their second scrimmage. The scrimmage game begins at 6 p.m.

Meadow is said to have a good returning nucleus from their 1986 team, which competes in a tough district with the likes of Sundown.

But for the moment, at least, the team was savoring its good performance against Ropes. "It sure made for a nice Monday workout," Talley concluded.

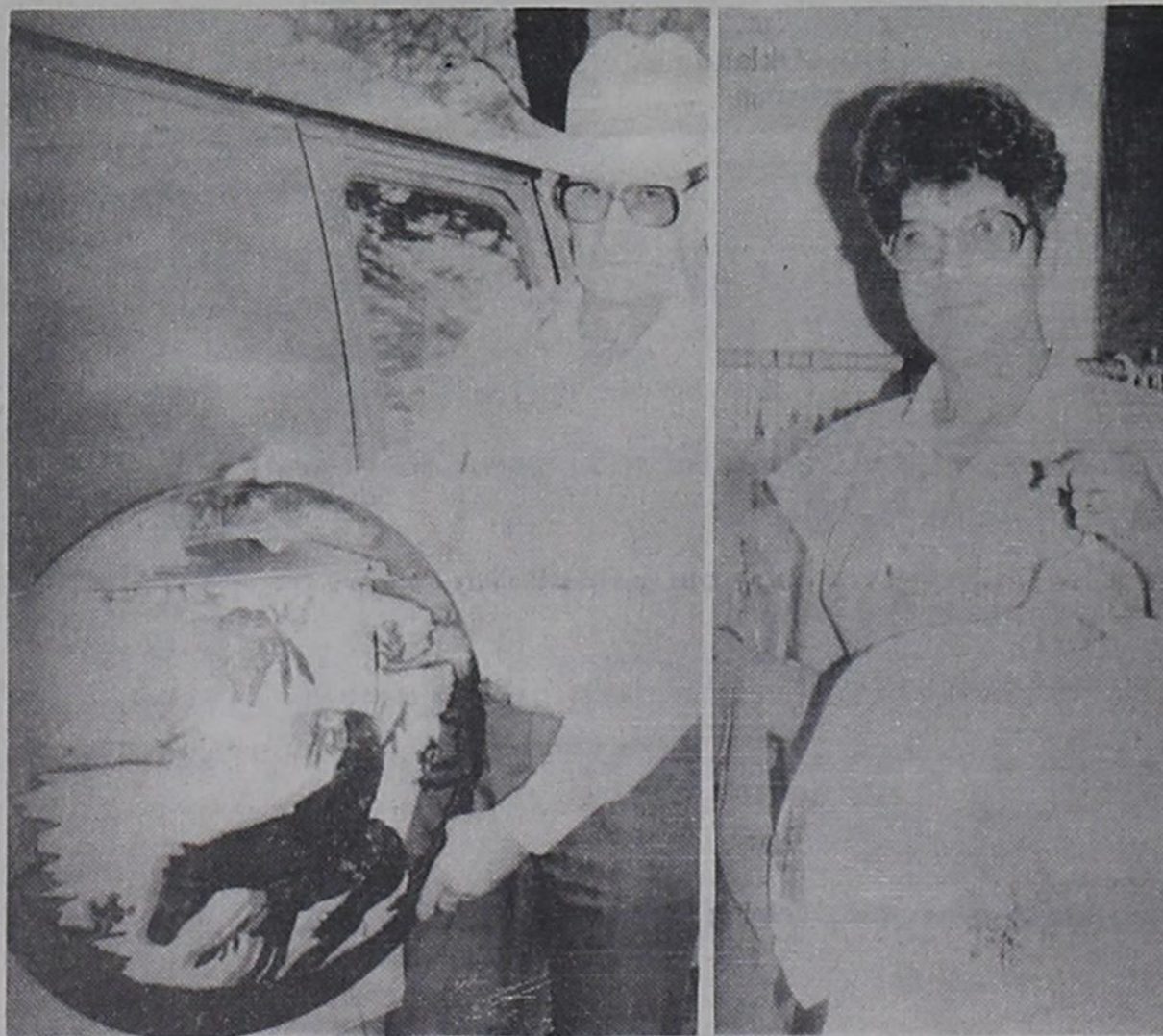

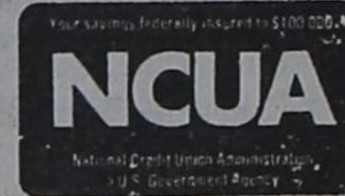
Cancer Center has taken a leadership role in developing efficient, effective programs which embody these goals.

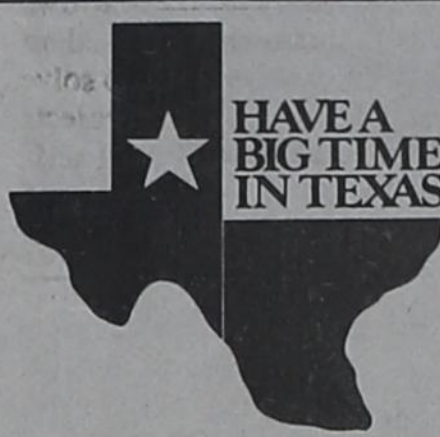

LEGAL NOTICE

CITY OF BOVINA, INC.

Amendment to Ordinance 78-12

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF BOVINA, PARMER COUNTY, TEXAS, THAT ORDINANCE 78-12 BE AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "DISCARDED APPLIANCES OR CABINETS" PROVIDING FOR A DECLARATION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR UNLAWFUL ACT IN MAINTAINING A PUBLIC NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE AND ORDER TO ABATE NUISANCE; PROVIDING FOR DISPOSITION OF DISCARDED APPLIANCES OR CABINETS; PROVIDING FOR PENALTY; PROVIDING A SAVING CLAUSE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY

of the public nuisance and specify that the nuisance must be abated and removed within ten (10) days after the delivery date of the notice. If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action by the City of Bovina to abate said nuisance to a date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return.

SECTION 5: Disposition of Discarded Appliances or Cabinets

In the event such discarded stove, clothes washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer or cabinet as defined in Section 1, after due notice and expiration of time set forth, has not been removed or the nuisance abated, then the City of Bovina shall remove said nuisance and make needed adjustments to render it harmless. Said nuisance shall not be made operational but used only as salvage material.

SECTION 1: Definitions

Discarded Appliance or Cabinet shall mean any stove, clothes washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer or any cabinet that is no longer being used for the purpose or purposes for which it was designed and manufactured, and which cannot be opened from the inside when closed, unless same is kept in a locked and completely enclosed building.

SECTION 6: Penalty

Any person, firm, association, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and conviction thereof shall be punishable by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) per each day such violation occurs.

SECTION 2: Public Nuisance Declared

Any discarded stove, clothes washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer or cabinet as defined in Section 1 is a public nuisance since it is an attractive nuisance that could cause a human being, especially a minor, to become trapped inside and suffocate.

SECTION 7: Savings Clause

Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this Ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of this Ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 3: Public Nuisance-Unlawful to Maintain

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, partnership, association or corporation to leave or permit to remain upon any public property, public right-of-way, or upon any lot or tract of land within the City of Bovina, any discarded stove, clothes washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator, freezer or cabinet as defined in Section 1.

SECTION 8: Emergency

The Board of Alderman of the City of Bovina are hereby authorized to cause publication of the descriptive caption of this Ordinance as an alternative method provided by law; and furthermore, the Board of Aldermen declare an emergency and this ordinance becomes effective upon passage;

AND IT IS SO ORDERED.

Passed by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Bovina this 6th day of August, 1987 by unanimous vote.

SECTION 4: Notice of Public Nuisance and Order to Abate

When ever any such public nuisance, as defined in Sections 1 and 2, exists in the City, the City Manager, City Clerk or other designated city employee shall send written notice by Certified or Registered Mail, with a 5-day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the premises whereupon such nuisance exists or abuts the public property, to abate and remove such public nuisance. Such notice shall state the nature
