# Compensation Helps Handicapped Youth

"APPROXIMATELY 60 PER-CENT of our prison inmates are high school dropouts with an average educational level of seventh grade. Most have an I.Q. between 70-100." This statement was made last fall by Charles T. Terrell, chairman of the Texas

So when Dr. Lauro Cavazos says that he is pledging to improve our nation's educational level and curtail the dropout rate, he will also be cutting down on crime and improving our over-crowded prison populations. You may remember that Dr. Cavazos was appointed to the Reagan Cabinet as Secretary of Education last summer and was then re-appointed by the new Bush administration.

Cavazos is the first Hispanic-American to ever serve in a Cabinet post and he is the former President of Texas Tech University. In fact, one of the last public acts which he performed in the capacity of Tech President was at graduation ceremonies last May. Several Parmer County young people received degrees at those ceremonies, including my oldest son, Stanley. So this person has already touched our lives to a small

"Currently about one in four students across the nation drops out of school," Cavazos says. His next highest priority is the 13 percent illiteracy rate in the United

Personally, I do not think either the dropout rate or illiteracy can be wiped out without first instilling a desire for learning among the nation's children. Some children have a natural inborn eagerness to learn. Many do not. My father had a favorite old saying, "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink." A lot of parents are leading their youngsters up to the schoolhouse every day, but the kiddos are simply not interested in drinking from the pool of education that is offered to them there.

What can we do to instill a thifst for knowledge in our children?

Parents are getting a lot of mixed signals these days. On the one hand, we are told that our boys and girls are lagging behind in learning and on the other hand, we are told that young people today are under too much pressure.

A recent survey of high school students in the Dallas-Ft. Worth area revealed that a large percentage of them could not name the country which lies on the buthern border of Texas. A large ercentage of students in Boston, Mass. could not name the New England Colonies.

Oprah Winfrey brought a group of high school pupils from large city schools onto her show several weeks ago and interviewed them about the situations faced by today's students. After discussing various school problems, at the end of the hour's show, the kids were asked what was the one thing that would do the most to improve the learning environment at their schools. I was quite surprised when the youngsters all agreed that no cars on campus and wearing school uniforms would solve the greatest number of school problems. They said that school uniforms would establish more pride in their school, giving a sense of belonging to an established group, while at the same time abolishing discrimination because some kids attend school not as well-dressed as others.

Here are some general knowledge questions which were asked on another program as a sample of facts which should be known by anyone who is a high school graduate: what country practices Aparthied? Can you find Wyoming on the map? The U.S. was provoked into the first World War by whom? The controversy surrounding Joseph McCarthy was about what? King Solomon in the Bible was famous for what?

> Bentsen was joined by Senate Republican Leader Robert Dole in offering the Equity For Rural Hospitals Act of 1989. "This bill provides urgently

needed short-term relief for the escalating problems faced by rural hospitals and long-term structural reforms as well," Bentsen said in remarks accompanying his legislation.

"In 1988, 43 rural hospitals closed across the United States, 19 of those in my home State of Texas. Hospital administrators surveyed recently by Touche Ross suggest that as many as 600 hospitals could close their doors in

the next five years." Bentsen said inequities in Medicare's prospective payment system (PPS), which was inaugurated in 1984, are a big part of the problem. Under PPS, reimbursements to hospitals are no longer based on individual costs but on a system of average costs.




