Irish Enjoy Visit To Fort Clark

On each visit to Fort Clark, John Toy has spoken to the Rotary Club since Eric and Frances are both members. This year's topic was "Ireland Old and New". A brief historical overview highlighted the diversity of the peoples who settled the Brittish Isles. These basic differences contribute to misunderstandings that erupt between the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland, which has chosen to remain part of Great Britain. The Republic is populated by Catholics, and Northern Ireland, is largely protestant. John explained that each side wants its own way and to protect its own interests. This pattern is deeply en-

trenched, and he is not overly optimistic about change. However, the general population does live peacefully. The violence is perpetrated by terriorists that represent a very small percentage of the people, and is generally confined to areas that can be avoided.

Americans hear of the violence and some fear traveling in Northern Ireland. However, certain areas of American cities are probably more dangerous. Northern Ireland is beautiful and interesting, as is the and visitors are Republic, welcomed.

CPL Projects Lower Bills

pany customers should see lower July bills as a result of the settlement of issues related to the 1993-1994 outage at the South Texas Project Electric Generating Station, as well as a petition to lower fuel charges.

In an effort to resolve concerns about the outage, CPL agreed to issue a one-time base rate refund of \$50 million and a one-time fuel refund of \$30 million. This refund is being issued as a one-time bill adjustment on customers' July bills.

The one-time adjustment is expected to lower bills received in July by 50 percent or more. The adjustment averages about \$61 for the typical residential customer who used 1,300 kilowatt-hours of electricity during June.

CPL also agreed to absorb \$62.25 million in replacement fuel costs associated with the STP outage, and the company has withdrawn its earlier petition to recover replacement fuel costs incurred as a result of the outage.

In return, the parties to the settlement agreed that CPL's base rates should remain at their current levels, and the settlement resolves all base rate, fuel and prudence issues relating to the STP outage.

The settlement is subject to the final approval of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. Hearings to consider the merits of the settlement will begin July 19. In the meantime, the PUC authorized issuing the refunds in July on an interim basis.

When finalized, the settlement brings to an end months of uncer-

Central Power and Light Com- tainty and additional regulatory proceedings. The settlement strikes a balance between customers' concerns about the length of the STP outage and the belief that CPL's rates are reasonable at their current

> In a separate filing submitted to the PUC last month, CPL also requested permission to lower the fuel factors used to compute the fuel charge portion of customer bills. If approved, CPL would lower its future fuel charges by \$54.6 million annually. This would result in an ongoing reduction of about \$4 a month for the typical residential customer.

The request to lower the fuel factors is the result of the aboveaverage performance of STP over the last year and CPL's success at negotiating favorable fuel pur-

Hearings to consider lowering of the fuel factors will be held later this year; however, the PUC in June granted CPL permission to implement the lowered fuel factors on an interim basis.


Item 1.4: This item was to consider the letter from Area Agency on Aging and it was tabled until the next meeting.

Sheriff's Corner

By Sheriff Norman H. Hooten

I have been asked by concerned county officials, state officials, and a few local citizens to use this column as a means to remind and bring to the attention of a few local folks the rules, regulations, and laws regarding, the use of certain vehicles registered for specific uses, specifically in this instance, the use of vehicles registered as "Farm Trucks" during daily business other than that allowed under the law for this type registration.

The law provides under Art. 6675a-6a-"Reduction of registration fee on trucks used by farmers"., The following:

(a) When a commercial motor vehicle is to be used for commercial purposes by the owner thereof in the transportation of his own poultry, dairy, livestock, livestock products, timber in it's natural state, and farm products to market, or to other points for sale or processing, or the transportation by the owner thereof of laborers from their place of residence, and materials, tools, equipment and supplies, without charge, from the place of purchase or storage, to his own farm or ranch, the registration fee shall be fifty (50%) of the registration fee prescribed for weight classification in Section 6 of

this Act; provided however, that the additional use of the vehicle as a means of passenger transportation, without charge, of members of the family to attend church or school, to visit doctors for medical treatment or supplies, and for other necessities of the home or family shall not prevent it's registration as a farm vehicle. NOTHING in the foregoing shall be interpreted as permitting the use of a farm licensed vehicle in connection with other gainful em-

If the owner of any commercial motor vehicle registered under this section shall use or permit to be used any such vehicle for any other purpose than those provided for in this Section, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than Twenty-Five (\$25.00) nor more than Two Hundred (\$200.00), and each use of such vehicle and each permission for such use of such vehicle shall constitute a separate

NOTE: The mere fact that an owner lives on a farm or ranch DOES NOT entitle him to register his vehicle with farm license plates. The use made of the vehicle governs

entirely it's elgibility for a farm license plate.

FARM TRUCK LICENSE PLATES MAY NOT BE ISSUED

1. Farmer's Cooperatives.

Kinney County

2. Passenger vehicles, unless reconstructed for delivery purposes.

3. Vehicles transporting livestock to a show or rodeo when stock is not being transported for the purpose of

4. Any vehicle used for gainful employment or for hire, including transportation to and from a place of employment.


There are several violators of this law operating in and around Brackettville and Kinney County, some of them associated with County government and with business connections in town. This week's column is a request for those violators, and you know who you are, to make arrangements to get your vehicles registered properly. Failure to do so in a reasonable amount of time will leave county and state law enforcement officers and agencies no choice but to file applicable charges against the violators.







Often, I take for granted the fact that not every person in this county knows what an extension agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service does and is responsible for in each county. It is not until a county resident comes to the office or is attending an educational meeting that a question arises about Extension Service work.

State law authorizes the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as a part of the Texas A&M University System (which is the state land grant university) to offer ongoing educational services to improve farm, ranch, home and community life in Texas counties. County Extension Agents are an integral part of the Cooperative Extension Service, which represents a three way partnership of the county, Texas A&M University and the United States Department of Agriculture (U.S.D.A.).

The commissioners court of each county enters into an agreement with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the U.S.D.A. for the purpose of cooperating in farm, ranch and home demonstration work. The commissioners courts include in their annual budgets the necessary salaries and other expen-se items of each county Extension

Through this "local front door", the Texas Agricultural Extension Service carries the problem-solving knowledge available from research ogy to county res County Extension agents work closely with Extension specialists and local volunteers to transfer this knowledge through public meetings, demonstrations, short courses, publications, mass media and follow-up personal consultations.

County Extension agents live and work with the people in a designated county and form the basic unit of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Agents are professional educators with broad based training in agriculture, home economics, 4-H and youth work, natural resources, community development and other related subjects.

Agents also work with a county Extension program council which is composed of local lay people, who identify county problems, evaluate solutions and plan educational activities.

Cooperative Extension was made possible by the passage of the Smith-Lever Act of 1914. The Texas Legislature, in 1915, accepted the terms of the Smith-Lever

Act and established the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as a legal entity in the state, assigning it to the Texas A&M University System for administration. The legislature also authorizes financial participation by County Commissioner's Courts of Texas.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture administers all efforts nationally. That covers the legal basis for Extension work but what about the functions on a county level?

Agricultural Extension Service as stated in the Smith-Lever Act is...."to aid in diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects relating to agriculture and home economics, and to encourage the

application of the same...' Texas Agricultural Extension Service programming is based on initiatives which include:

*Increasing Agricultural Competitiveness-enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of agricultural producers dealing with lowering production costs, making products more competitive in the world market and increasing profits.

*Water Quality Managementprograms to address water quality in home, landscapes, agricultural production and natural resource system management.

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




Francis Henry French was born in Fort Wayne, Indiana on September 27, 1857. Deeply impressed from his youth by the stirring deeds and stories told by veterans of the Civil War, he realized his ambition for a military career by entering the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York where he graduated twelfth from the Class of 1879. He was assigned as 2nd Lieut of "E" Company 19th Infantry and came West. Following service at Fort Garland, Colorado Territory and Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, the regiment moved to Fort Brown at Brownsville, Texas where Lt. French was detailed as the Regimental Adjutant. In December of 1882 the 19th Infantry was posted to Fort Clark.

At Fort Clark, on January 1, 1883, Lt. French began diaries which he faithfully maintained for the next thirty years.

July 1883: Lieutenant French accompanies Marie Doughty to Cincinnati where he meets her mother, brother, and sister. Promising to write each other, they part company and French continues on to Fort Wavne where his mother and sister await him at the train station. Just as at Fort Clark, French busies himself with visits to friends and family. Despite having to spend much time in a dentist's chair, he manages to take in ball games, go on picnics, attend church, be fitted for civilian suits, and write letters to Marie. French's account of his activities, along with his comments reflecting on social mores of the time, give us a good picture of everyday life in late 19th century mid-America.

Friday. July 20, 1883

Did not go to the Dentist's and am to rest until Monday. Went up to the shops and walked through them with Potter. He works in the office of the master mechanic and as he seems to understand and inquire thoroughly he explained everything very well. In the afternoon called with Mother at Uncle French's and at Dr. Ayers'. After supper went to call at Mrs. Higgins'. A number of folks from grandmother's & Mr. Chapman spent the evening here. Saturday. July 21, 1883

Went down town & to the factory in the morning. In the afternoon went with Lula to see a quite interesting game of ball. Called on Mrs. Ian Henderson in the evening. Potter was here to call. Ern & Mecca Hoagland came up for short time but did not get out of the carriage.

Sunday. July 22, 1883 It was very close today. Mr. Moffatt has gone away and we had no services. Wrote to Marie in the © 1994 THE VINTON TRUST

morning and after dinner went out to Grandmother's with Father. A rain storm drove us into Mr. Cheney's for shelter. Took tea with Aunt Julia. In the evening went to prayer meeting with Mattie. Very few people were in attendance.

Monday. July 23, 1883

Was rather surprised when I went to the dentist's this morning to find the day given to somebody else, and rather glad too, although I want to get through. Made an engagement for Wednesday morning. Went around town and up to see Potter at the shops. In the afternoon, Lula, Sue, Mary, Kate, Maria, Emma & Mecca Hoagland, Chapman, Potter, the two Cary's, Will Fleming, Howard McCullough & I went up the river for a little picnic. Had a good time till a shower came, which wet us and the supper thoroughly. We had to come home. Potter came after changing his clothes and spent the rest of the evening here. Mecca Hoagland is not much changed from what she was when she & I were sweethearts, only is more womanly. She will make a true wife to the man that wins her.

Tuesday. July 24, 1883 Received a letter from Marie and one from Miss Williamson, a young lady friend of Marie's in Cincinnati. The latter is very anxious for me to marry the former, but I think this will never occur. Went down town in the morning. Read and slept in the hammock in the afternoon. In the evening called with Lula on Mrs. McKinnie & her daughter who leave tomorrow for the East, and on Emma & Mecca Hoagland. Lizzie T. & Ralph are here to keep house while the girls are away.

Wednesday. July 25, 1883 Spent the morning in the dentist's chair and almost completed my work with him. Slept & read in the afternoon. In the evening Sue & I went up to the railroad to say good-

bye to Emma & Mecca. Lizzie was the only other person. The train was over an hour late and we had a very easant talk. I admire Mecca very much indeed, & think highly of Em, too, but the former is more mature and more settled. They are to be ab-

sent until the 1st of September and probably I shall not see them again. Mr. Braden of Indianapolis, Chapman, Potter, Howard McCullough called this evening. Mr. B. invited me to call while am at the Encampment next month.

Thursday. July 26, 1883 Finished up the dental work and now nothing remains but to pay the bill, \$75. Stayed at home in the afternoon. In the evening called on Mrs. Ruthrauff with Mother. Potter spent the evening here. On account of engagement to call with Mother, had to decline a ride in Henry Meyer's dog cart.

Friday. July 27, 1883 Went down town with Mother & to the factory. Bought a pair of new shoes. In the afternoon went to the factory & talked with Father about his law suit against the canal owners. Aunt Mary's houses are being rapidly put up. In the evening took a long ride with Henry Freeman. McQuiston and other callers were here in the evening.

Saturday. July 28, 1883 Went down to the factory and up town in the morning. In the afternoon went to go see a game of ball

Potter came later.

with Lula & Sue & others & had quite a pleasant time. In the evening called with Lula on Mrs. William Meyer. My first evening dress suit, (civilian's) came home this evening, but as it does not fit well will have to be returned for alteration. Potter came in the evening to take Sue out for a ride and then called afterwards. He & Sue seem to be "sparking"; it may lead to an engagement. He is a very pleasant young man and I gues is able to support a wife.

Sunday. July 29, 1883 Went to the English Lutheran Church in the morning and heard an excellent sermon on the subjects of Sympathy & Generosity. Uncle French called in the afternoon & prevented me from finishing my usual letter to Marie. Had to excuse myself to go with Henry to dine with Lizzie at Mr. Hoagland's. John came down from Chicago last night and with Mr. H. & Ralph completed the party. Had a good dinner and after-

wards had a real pleasant time talking. After dinner Henry & I came up home & found Chapman & Potter here, and then went out to Grandmother's to spend the night. Spent the evening talking and singing. Was reminded of old times when Henry & I were boys and used to spend the nights frequently with each other.

Monday. July 30, 1883

Came over early this morning and came home to change my clothes. Then went down town with my dress coat & vest to have them altered. In the afternoon finished my letter to Marie, sending her a photograph, and wrote to Miss Williamson. Now we two have commenced a correspondence, I wonder where it will end. In the evening Mary made us a call so that I could not make any calls as I had intended. Henry came in later in the

Tuesday. July 31, 1883 Last day of the month. Received a letter from Marie this morning. Went down town in the morning. After dinner attended the funeral of Mrs. Emma Py? nee Pullan. It was a very sad affair. Knew her before her marriage and liked her very much . Marie is acquainted with her but does not like her. Made some calls after the funeral. In the evening Potter and Cash Miller called.

LAUGHLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Texas--The thunderstorms that were forecast for your flight to Barksdale AFB, La., are popping up approximately 50 miles in front of

The autopilot is engaged and you are cruising at 37,000 feet. You turn on the aircraft's four-color weather radar and overlay the radar depiction onto the present position map of

the multi-function display. The MFD's six-inch liquid crystal display shows your aircraft's present position, with a moving map display, in relation to the planned flight course you programmed into the flight computer before leaving Laughlin. Analyzing your route of flight using the joystick-controlled cursor, you are able to determine a safe route well clear of the thunder-

A flashing yellow circle on the TCAS display tells you that another aircraft is approaching you from the "one o'clock" direction. The copilot calls the traffic in sight and the Delta jet safely passes 2,000 feet below you.

Had the traffic actually threatened to cross your flight path, and urgent conflict resolution advisory, "Climb, climb," would alert

you in time. The high penetration approach at Barksdale is uneventful as the aircraft's flight director gives you steering, descent and level-off commands.

The T-1A's state-of-the-art Integrated Avionics Processing System uses four liquid crystal displays for each pilot to present the aircraft's situation. The IAPS ties together separate systems such as the flight director, autopilot, Flight Management System and all other avionics into a highly functional integrated system.

You complete a turn in holding at the local non-directional beacon, followed by a procedure turn into an NDB final at Shreveport Regional Airport for a "touch and go". Approach control vectors you for an autopilot coupled instrument landing system approach, full stop at Barksdale.

You complete the after-landing checklists, coordinate for refueling and then plan for your return to Laughlin. With an hour to debrief the flight, you and your instructor grab some lunch. By the time you take off on your return sortie, which

includes a low level route and a "drop-in" to Kelly AFB, Texas, your training day is in its eighth

is an example of the challenges that face a T-1A Jayhawk student pilot every day in specialized undergraduate pilot training. The student's flying day typically begins at 6 a.m. with a formal flight briefing. The briefing covers safety issues, weather and a "stand up" situational emergency procedure where two students are called upon to solve complex

With the morning briefing complete, students meet with their instructors and head to base operations to plan their flights. Destinations are chosen based on each student's syllabus requirements and the availability of various instrument approach procedures at different locations.

The T-1A has the ability to fly for nearly five hours without refueling, allowing students and instructors to do much of their training at other bases in Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana. In fact, during the navigation phase, T-1A students will do approximately 90 percent of their training at bases other than

Once a destination is chosen and the flight planning completed, students and instructors return to the flight room to brief the sortie. After signing out their aircraft, they step to the jet and begin the preflight inspection.

The sorties are usually two hours in length with a student pilot in the left seat, and instructor in the right seat and another student pilot in the jump seat. One student will fly the first portion of the "out-and-back" to the destination, completing all of his approach work at the destination base. The second student usually plans to "drop-in" at another base for his instrument work prior to flying back to Laughlin.

With the sortie complete, the student and his instructor will debrief for another hour to review the student's performance, review some of the techniques for accomplishing the maneuvers attempted that day and go over the student's grades. By this time, the student's training day may be pushing the 12hour limit. Tomorrow, it starts all over again.

The T-1A and the SUPT syllabus continue to provide the Air Force with the best tanker and airlift pilots in the world. Our country's need for mobility and tanker support will continue to require our students to have excellent navigation and instrument flying skills when they graduate pilot training. The training students receive at Laughlin in the 86th Flying Training Squadron provides them with those skills.

'Young Park Naturalists'

PILOT POINT--Exploring nature in North Central Texas state parks has its own rewards, but now children ages 7 to 14 can earn a Young Park Naturalist certificate to

Observing and answering questions about birds, trees and insects are some of the activities in which children can participate toward earning their certification. The Young Park Naturalist series is a program of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"We want to give kids something to do at the parks with their families," said Judy Brummett, education program coordinator for TPWD's Ray Roberts Lake State Park. "They look for plants, search for birds and mammals and write down what they see. They also pledge to keep the park clean and alert a park ranger if they see an animal in distress.'

Kids who participate in the program are given a booklet with activities that can be performed independently. When the completed booklet is turned in to the park, the certificate is awarded.

Brummett designed the pilot program that she hopes will grow statewide. In March Lake Ray Roberts became the first park to offer the program. Since then 12 more state parks have launched the program. Already, more than 200 booklets have been distributed to young park visitors.

The project typically takes three to six months to complete and there is no deadline to turn in the booklet, Brummett said. Because it cannot be completed in one weekend stay, kids can complete the program at one or more participating state parks, added Brummett.

Participating state parks include: Acton, Cedar Hill and Penn Farm, Cleburne, Dinosaur Eisenhower and Eisenhower Birthplace, Fort Richardson, Lake Arrowhead, Lake Mineral Wells, Lake Whitney, Meridian, Mother Neff and Ray Roberts Lake.

"Right after it started, a family with three boys saw it, got excited and immediately started working," Brummett said. "They came back and said they were impressed, the kids enjoyed it and that they hoped to come back to work on it some more."
