

## "MY TURN"

SPRING HAS SPRUNG upon us with a windy vengeance. Most of the trash which has blown into the yard and caught on the bushes at our house consists of plastic items of one sort or another.

Whatever happened to the good old brown paper sack? If you go to purchase just about anything from an appliance to a zither, the store will send you home with your new product bagged up in plastic.

The first page of the Bible tells us to subdue the earth and have dominion over it. I don't think that means we are supposed to completely cover it up from pole to pole with our garbage.

Aerosol cans, styrofoam, and plastics are killing this beautiful planet on which we dwell. I happen to have lived just long enough to remember when we used to use pump sprays, we wrapped our leftovers in waxed paper, and we sat on cushions made of kapok.

The largest use of the dangerous chemical compounds which we call fluorocarbons, are for air conditioning refrigeration and for fire extinguishing systems. The atmospheric lifetime of these chemicals is 110 years. The industries which supply these products are currently researching alternate ingredients for production in order to comply with a global agreement calling for a 20 per cent cut in CFC productions by 1993 and an additional 30 per cent cut in 1998. The U.S. and over 30 other countries have signed a treaty which seeks to protect the ozone by this proposed 50 per cent cut in CFCs.

We are beginning to see nations working together to clean up the atmosphere, preserve the rain forests, and get rid of nuclear wastes. These are steps in the right direction.

The pollution which bothers me is much closer to home. At a time when almost one-third of U.S. landfills are due to close in five years, we see that many of the large grocery chains (mostly foreign-owned) are phasing out soft drinks in glass returnable bottles by simply not stocking the returnables on their shelves. If you want Cokes, you either buy them in cans or plastic throw-away bottles and you cart them home in plastic sacks.

This plastic is not biodegradable; meaning that it does not decompose and return to the earth as a nutrient component, but stays around for centuries to kill off our animal and sea-life. Have you seen photos of dead fish and waterfowl with their bodies entangled in those little plastic circles which hold our six-pack drink cans together?

Wouldn't it be just as easy to buy our six-packs in cardboard cartons? Cardboard is biodegradable.

I can also remember when we washed our babies' diapers every day and then pinned them back on again. Each year in the U.S., 18 billion disposable diapers are added to our household waste. This adds a cost of up to \$1,417 per child over the cost of home washing, according to an article in the current Science Weekly Newsmagazine. Plus, landfill disposal of these diapers costs another \$300 million annually.

In our instant-gratification society, there seems to be a lot of apathy regarding things which pertain to the future of good old terra firma. Are you concerned about the condition in which we will leave this earth for future generations? Am I the only one who is worried about this? There are many things that each of us could do, and a good starting place would be to always request paper bags at the check-out stand.

## Measles Case Is Identified Locally

Bovina School nurse Sarah Owen reports that Bovina Schools have at least one probable case of the measles, and this was Cindy Quintana, teenage daughter of Manuel and Christina Quintana. Cindy was hospitalized in the Friona hospital for three days.

Measles shots were offered at Bovina Schools on Monday from 1-3:30 p.m.

Mrs. Owen reported that the State Health Department only recommends getting a measles shot if the person is under 30 years old and has either never been vaccinated against measles, or if

the person received a measles shot before they were 15 months old.

"They say that the shots are about 90% effective for those people who got shots between 12-15 months of age. The shots were 95% effective for those who got their shots after they were 15 months old.

"For awhile they were saying that people vaccinated before 1980 should get a shot, but now the State Health Department has changed that advice," said Mrs. Owen.

Measles vaccine is available from Dr. Paul Spring at the County Health Department from 9-11 a.m. and from 2-4 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. Children under 18 must be accompanied by their parent if they are going to get measles shots.

Shots are also available at the Texas Health Department in Muleshoe. It is located west of the Courthouse. They give shots on Tuesdays. Children under 18 years of age must be accompanied by their parent if they are going to get measles vaccine.

He gave eight points of "Remembering," admonishing the audience to remember to laugh; remember one another; remember that the problems of life are constant; remember that growing older is a normal process.

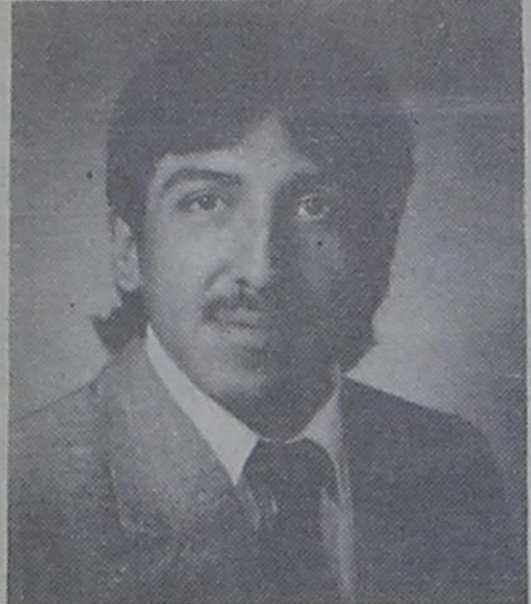
Also, remember the utter divinity of simplicity; remember to maintain a positive mental attitude; remember to live in the present, and lastly, remember your blessings.

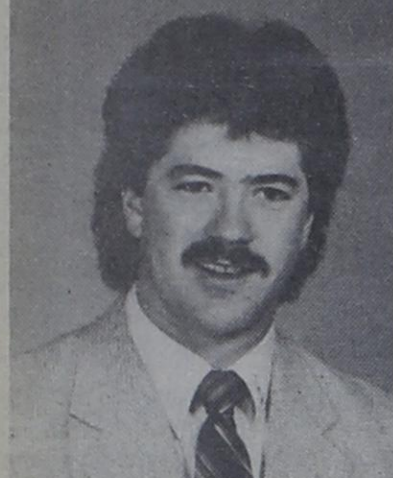
