\section*{Rose Downy Mildew}

May Be A Problem
Rose downy mildew causes serigardens, home landscapes and in the local nurseries. Symptoms of rose downy mildew can be variable and
can be confused with chemical injury to leaves or possibly with other diseases. Rose downy mildew is different ave a problems with each year in

Symptoms of rose downy mildew include: 1) Purplish-red lesion that are fre-
quently angular in appearance; but don't confuse these with a similar lesion caused by black spot.

A control strategy must be put in place once you have determined that Spacing plants enough for good air circulation is important in the con-
trol of many rose diseases. these diseases are brought on by high humid conditions, air circulation to allow plants to dry out will keep the disease from getting started, in most
cases. Plants located in a sunny lo cation is another strategy to help them from dry off and keep them from remaining damp too long. Minimizing
foliar wetness by watering at the base and only around mid-morning will prevent leaf dampening due to irrigation. If you take the time to collect old
leaves that have dropped off the fected plats have dropped off the incult for the disease to spread tifliplants. Infected leaves blow up un-
