cies occurs in Texas; the Opossum. The opossum is a mammal about
the size of a terrier dog, with long,
scaly prehensile (adapted for holdscaly, prehensile (adapted for hold-
ing, grasping, especially for wrapping
around) tail; short, black, leathery ears, long, slender snout, and a fur
lined pouch in the female, and a furry body that is grayish to blackish in
color, and weighing from 4 to color, and weighing
pounds when grown. ants of woodlands, but are found in prairies, marshes, and farmlands.
Opossums are found in the eastern Opossums are found in te eastern
U.S. and most of Texas. They can
be found living in hollow trees or logs, woodpiles, rock piles, crevices, under buildings, in attics and in un-
derground burrows abandoned by other animals.
The opossum is more or less soli-
tary and strictly notur tary and strictly nocturnal, venturing
forth to feed shortly after dark. It feeds on a variety of foods, including feeds on a variety or foods, including
rats, mice, young rabbits, brids, in-
sects, crustaceans, frogs, fruits, and vegetables. Usually 2 litters of young per year
are prouced, about February and
June. The young 5 to are produced, about February and

are born after a gestation period of only 11 to 13 days and each weighs
about 3 3rains (1/5 of a gram; $1 / 2,380$ of a pound)! Eight new-born opos-
sums can easily be held in a teaspoon.

begins to nurse, the nipple swells and
completely fills its firmly attaching it to its mother. It

 New Maroon Carrot Gets NamedThe maroon carrot now has a name．Several months ago It told you
that a researcher at Texas A\＆M had isolated the gene that makes carrots
their typical orange color Leonard Pike has developed a carrot
that is maroon on the outsid ange in the center and the new vari－
ety is called Betasweet．The name reflects the high beta carotene con
tent of the carrot．Beta carotene is
believed to help prevent heart disease and certain cancers．The Betaswee name also conveys that the carrot has
a higher sugar content but none of the bitter taste you may get with the con－
ventional orange carrots． Betasweets will be sold as raw car rots as well as pre－packaged，ready
to－eat carrots and should be available later this year．There is no word yet
on how soon the seed will be avail able．
