

Awarded A Carr Academic Scholarship

Kathleen E. Hall from Brackett High School has been awarded a Carr Academic Scholarship at Angelo State University for 1996-97.

Over 300 Carr Academic Scholarships for 1996-97, ranging in value from \$1,500 to \$6,000, have been awarded to qualified high school seniors. During the current year approximately 900 students from throughout Texas and the nation, as well as numerous foreign countries are attending Angelo State University on Carr Academic Scholarships.

As a general rule, students must rank in the top 15 percent of their

high school class and present either a combined math and verbal score of 1140 on the SAT 1 or a composite score of 25 on the ACT.

Supported by a growing multi-million dollar trust established by the late Robert G. and Nona K. Carr of San Angelo, the undergraduate scholarships may be renewed annually by the University for students who maintain the required academic record. During a four-year course of undergraduate study at ASU, Carr Academic Scholarships can be worth from \$6,000 to \$24,000.

Norma Conner Returns from Christian Appalachian Project

Norma Conner recently returned from a commitment with the Christian Appalachian Project in Jackson County Kentucky. This is Norma's second year to help with the project and she intends to keep going. "It just makes you want to cry when you see how these people are trying to make a life for themselves. The CAP is a non-profit interdenominational service organization that seeks to help the people of Appalachia help themselves.

The people of Appalachia work hand in hand with volunteers and staff members to improve their lifestyle and their community. Volunteers perform what ever tasks are needed by the individuals, including helping them get their GED.

Norma was the cook for over 40 students and staff members the first week and 99 students the second week. The students were from col-

leges all over the country, working to help others on their spring break. Norma said that unfortunately Texas was not represented by the students.

During this project the two groups built 3 new houses (average size 20' x 24'), did extensive repairs to 3 houses, and built new additions for 3 houses. These repairs and additions included new flooring, walls, ceilings and bathrooms where there weren't any.

CAP operates more than 60 programs in the heart of rural Eastern Kentucky. Founded in 1964 by Reverend Ralph Beiting, CAP's many programs were created to offer solutions.

We are very proud to know a person like Norma Conner and proud of her for her dedication and sacrifice. Maybe next year a few more of us can tag along with Norma.

Patrick Regan - The Great Highland Bagpipe.

Patrick Regan traveled from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania to Brackettville Texas this past week. On Friday he did several programs for the different age groups of the Brackettville School District, ages ranging from Kindergarten to Senior High School. The children and teachers alike were thoroughly entertained with Mr. Regan's stories, as an added bonus they learned a lot about the art of bagpipe playing.

Mr. Regan's favorite student story is of a man that was his student in Austin for 7 years. After Mr. Regan and his family moved "back east" this student himself became a teacher. There are now 4 generations of students who have in turn become the teachers. "It just makes you feel proud to see the art being carried on like that" stated Mr. Regan.

In August of 1977 Patrick and a good friend, Kevin Hendrix, started a group of Bagpipers called, 'The Silver Thistle Pipes and Drums', in San Antonio. This group is now well known and travel all over the United States in competition against other pipes and drums.

"I started playing the pagpipes out of jealousy," Patrick stated. He was in Boy Scouts and the scoutmaster's son (whom Patrick was already envious of) asked Patrick's father to teach him to play the bagpipes. Not to be outdone by this other kid, Patrick took up the bagpipes also. This began a tremendous rivalry between the two boys and probably kept them both very serious about learning. Patrick

recently was cruising the internet reading the Bagpipe page, when he noticed a request for a piece of music that he and this other kid had memorized when they were boys. After further inspection Patrick realized it was his childhood rival whom he hadn't heard from in years. Patrick's response to the request was "You mean you don't still have it memorized?"

"My teachers are responsible for my music" Patrick very modestly said. His first teacher was of course his father of whom Patrick jokingly said, Couldn't put up with me so he found another teacher for me. Patrick was a student of Mr. Forbes in Dallas Texas who kept Patrick's attention with stories of the spitfires he flew in the Royal Air Force. Then Patrick moved on to Seumas MacNeill, who wrote the book on tutoring for the bagpipes. Mr. MacNeill was the head of the college of piping in Glasgow Scotland, and had won the Silver Medal in the Scotland Competition. Patrick said that Mr. MacNeill is the greatest classical bagpiper he has ever heard. In Scotland Patrick took lessons from "The Bear" quiet spoken Fred Morrison. Then in 1983 Patrick moved his family to Pittsburgh to study under Jim Macintosh. Jim has won every prize there is and at 71 is not one that you would like to have to compete against. He recently received the "Most Excellent Order of the British Empire" for his bagpiping. This award is just below being

knighted by the Queen. "The great thing about Jim is that as a teacher he is still a student, constantly analyzing his own music."

Patrick Regan wants to encourage all people, especially the young ones to go after your goals no matter what hurdles stand in your way. Patrick was a contender in bagpipe competition for the Silver Medal for several years with no problems then one year he was struck with a horrible case of stage fright. He says "It is a debilitating fear that even now I have to constantly fight." Patrick quit playing the bagpipes totally for 5 years after the attack of stage fright, then he decided not to let this fear win. For seven years now he has worked and studied to reach his goal to win the Silver Medal and to go on to win the Gold Medal in international competition. By not giving up Patrick will reach his goal, just like all of us can do if we just keep trying.

Patrick finished up his visit to Brackettville with a concert for the public in the Amphitheater at Fort Clark. His wit and story telling kept the capacity audience laughing while his music kept them in admiration.

Patrick will now go on to enter the Silver Medal competition in Scotland. He will be competing against pipers from all over the world.

We wish you much success in your quest for the Silver and then the Gold!

They were required to keep control of their bikes while making several sharp turns and speeding toward the finish line. The last event was a straight fifty yard race. Many proved to be excel-

lent bicycle riders, but the final winners in the second heat were 1st place - Dietrich Davis, 2nd place - Ashly Smith, 3rd place - Nataly Rodriguez.

Many parents were in attendance and helped with the timing of the races. Their assistance made the event a success. We all saw how our children could use their knowledge of safety rules and courtesy rules on their bicycles to prevent accidents and injury. It was, indeed, an eventful and learning experience for our fourth graders.



From Your Local Game Warden

Occasionally my job with Parks and Wildlife requires travel, sometimes lots of travel, in order to get the job done. Since the end of January, I have traveled to Austin for 2 days to instruct CPR classes at our training academy, to Del Rio for 2 days to attend meetings, and to Eagle Pass for 2 days to work the Rio Grande River for netting and water safety violations and to check retail stores and restaurants, that sell fish and bait, for proper licenses. I have also been to Choke Canyon near Tilden (no, not to go fishing) to a department owned facility for fire-arms training and qualification and to attend training on field sobriety and Boating While Intoxicated laws. I have also made a trip to Kingsville to pick up state equipment left at one of our facilities there for repair.

So what do I do when I get a few days off? Travel, of course, I took a few days off last week and traveled to East Texas to visit relatives and try to do a little fishing with them. I told Mrs. Robinson and the crew at The Brackett News that I would bring back a fishing report for Toledo Bend Lake. (Fishermen and women, or is it fisherperson? or how about persons going fishing: Check out the area lakes fishing report feature that has been added to the paper) Well, anyway, the fishing report for Toledo Bend Lake for last week: Terrible. I caught one fish for 4 days of fishing.

The rest of the fishing party did not fare much better. Cold temperatures, cold, strong winds, thunderstorms and rain showers, and a low lake water level probably had a lot to do with the lack of fish on the end of my hook. Then, again, it might have something to do with the person operating the fishing rod! All things considered I did enjoy the time visiting with the

folks and seeing a little bit of East Texas. Things are a little greener out there although they are way below their average rainfall also.

Earlier I mentioned our training academy in Austin. The department is now taking applications for the next Game Warden Training Academy Class. This school is scheduled to start approximately January 1, 1997 and the class will graduate as Game Wardens after about 7 months of intensive training. The department will accept applications from April 1 thru April 30, 1996. No applications will be accepted in Austin after April 30.

The minimum qualification requirements for an applicant are: that he or she be at least 21 years old prior to January 1, 1997, in good physical health and able to pass a physical agility test and must have successfully completed a Bachelor level degree with major course work in Criminal Justice, Natural Resource, Environmental Science, Fish and or Wildlife Management, Parks and Recreation or other closely related field of natural resource conservation and management. In addition to the initial application, additional written test and oral interviews are required as part of the process. This is by no means all of the requirements. There are other basic requirements to be met prior to applying and prior to being accepted into the Game Warden Academy class. There will probably be anywhere from 750 to 1300 applicants applying for an estimated 30 to 40 positions.

The gentlemen at the tireplace on Hwy 90 across from the Fort also provide good, reliable services.



My copy of the News traveled all the way to East Texas folded up inside of her copy. It was kind of a shock to her to find someone else in this area that had a subscription. I explained that I receive the paper, because I know the owner pretty well. In fact, I laughed and told her that, since I'm new to East Texas and know very few people here, the News staff was probably helping me out. She was very pleasant to talk to and said she would mail my paper on to me.

I just thought it pretty neat that she would take the time to call. Too many people would have just made derogative comments about the post office goofing up and let it go at that.

Also, I was impressed by the February 15 editorial by Norman Hooten. It could actually apply to our entire nation. Gossip, whether on a local level or a national level, is like a giant tar spill. It sticks to everything it touches and leaves a black sticky mess that's hard to clean up. We all need Mr. Hooten's reminder to be more tolerant.

She encouraged them to get to know the candidates and the issues; so that they might make a more educated decision on election day. Regardless of how they voted or what their political convictions were, Katherine encouraged everyone to just get out and make their opinion known by voting. Because of that one lady, our precinct had a very large percentage of it's registered voters actually show up at the polls.

You can make a difference, but only if you use the privilege that is yours by getting out and voting. The next national election is coming up in November. Start now to find out about the candidates and the issues. Regardless of who your choice of candidates is, make your opinion known. VOTE!

The Rotary Club met on March 28 and heard Rozetta Pingnot and Joy Ralston discuss the Kinney County Arts Council. It was formed two years ago when the Middle Rio Grande Development held a meeting. Betty Switzer, director of community development and rural service, reported on an opportunity for an arts program in Kinney County through the Texas Commission on the Arts. Because the county had not received any funds in the last five years, it was considered an under served area. Betty Slattery, Jean Faulkenberry, Ruth Wilks, Joy Ralston, and Rozetta were there and formed the nucleus of a community organization. Twelve people were selected who were interested and agreed to raise the money needed to receive matching funds from the Commission.

Fifteen hundred dollars was required and civic clubs, including Rotary, the schools, and individuals made donations. The Old Quarry Society made a generous gift and acted as an umbrella organization to sponsor the Council.

The involvement of the schools was very important because the school children of Kinney County were seen as the primary beneficiaries of the programs to be presented. For this reason, teachers select the performances to be given.

Once the money was raised, the Council applied for a grant. Joy Ralston took on this very involved task. When this was accomplished and the first program booked, those involved encountered a lot of headaches in making arrangements, and from then on they used an Austin booking agent.

The first presentation was San Antonio Brass in April of 1995. Ticket sales at \$3.00 or \$5.00 can't cover the cost of the productions, and

last year money was raised through a Christmas home tour of five houses. High school students were used as docents. This proved so successful that one will be given again this year.

March 29th of this year "Bagpipe and Blarney" was presented and was so entertaining that many people requested a return performance.

On April 26 the Ballet Folklorica and Mariachi Band will perform at the amphitheater. The performances are high school students, but are very professional. Those who have seen them perform have praised them highly.

Two pianists, Silvia and Sylvana Suarez, from Piedras Negras, played a concert here a few years ago. They were very well received. Now, they are both studying at the University of Texas and have been given the opportunity to study in Prague. To do this, they must raise some \$4,000, and have been invited to give a benefit performance at Fort Clark in May which will be sponsored by the Kinney County Arts Council with the Community Council. They will be using the beautiful new grand piano recently purchased by the Community Council.

Rotarians exhibited a lot of interest in the program and the plans for future performances. This area is fortunate to have cultural opportunities such as this in our sparsely populated region. We are indebted to everyone who has played a part in creating these opportunities.

Thanks to Rozetta Pingnot and Joy Ralston for telling us about the Kinney County Arts Council and to Marsha Thurman Schmidt for providing this program.

Rotary and the faculty of the schools will be playing their annual basketball game on April 11th at 6:30. We have decided to name it the Allen Kreiger Memorial Basketball game. Please come and root for these valiant players!

WOOD RECEIVES AETC AWARD

LAUGHLIN AIR FORCE BASE, Texas -- Robert E. Wood, director of maintenance for Laughlin Civil Service Aircraft Maintenance, was recently named Air Education and Training Command's 1996 Lieutenant General Leo Marquez Award winner. The award is given to the outstanding aircraft maintenance civilian manager of the year.

As director of maintenance for the Air Force's only all civil service operational aircraft maintenance organization, Wood was selected for his effective and efficient maintenance management of 182 trainer aircraft, 501 civil service employees, 47 maintenance facilities encompassing 355,468 square feet, 59 government vehicles and a \$25 million budget.

His direct support resulted in Laughlin aircraft flying 32,355 total sorties and 44,032 hours without a single aircraft mishap related to maintenance, securing Laughlin's position as the Air Force's premier pilot training wing.

He has led LCSAM to command finalist status for the Daedalian Maintenance Award for the second straight year and for the sixth year of the last seven.

Managing the only all civilian contingent participating in the 1995 joint chief of staff exercise, Roving Sands, Wood's unit was instrumental in the

success of this major exercise, involving 15,000 active duty and reservists from more than 100 deployed units of the Army, Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps.

With Wood's management, the 47th Flying Training Wing didn't have a single Class A, B or C aircraft mishap related to maintenance, and the foreign object damage rate for LCSAM bottomed out at zero, an impressive record at the eighth busiest airfield in the Air Force with more than 447,000 movements annually.

The smoothest beddown of a fleet of 46 new T-1A aircraft, including six from Reese Air Force Base, Texas, as a result of their closure, was possible due to Wood's expert foresight, planning and coordination.

He is also responsible for developing the plan that established Laughlin's first 24-hour, 7-day-a-week capability to air evacuate hospital patients to San Antonio in life threatening situations.

Under Wood's management, Laughlin dominated the annual AETC Top Flight '95 trainer aircraft award categories competition, winning the top T-1 and T-37 maintenance team awards and Best Trainer Aircraft Condition and Appearance Award.

Wood is now in competition for this award at the Air Force level.







Some Good Things About Brackett Students

I'll talk about some of the events that took place this past week in our community involving the Brackett students. As you know, I believe in the kids. For 36 years, I have worked with young people trying to make a better future for them and for us in the older generation through their efforts. I want to talk about some of their efforts and compliments this week.

To begin with, elementary school principal interviews have brought strong compliments on teachers, student behavior and on our school from several of the educators who have visited Jones Elementary School. They're good compliments about kids and about those folks who guide them at BISD. These compliments have been passed on to committee members by our visitors. What's All The Fuss About Mad Cow Disease

Drought, high feed prices, shortage of hay, cheap cattle and a surplus beef supply — more than enough reason for concern amongst beef producers. Then along comes something most people can't even pronounce — Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE). Just the name itself scares people.

Blasted across TV, radio and print media as the "Mad Cow Disease", BSE is a fatal brain disease known to exist primarily in dairy cattle in England, Scotland, Ireland, France, Portugal, Switzerland and in cattle exported from England to the Falkland Islands, Germany, Canada and Italy. The vast majority of cases have been concentrated in the British cow herd.

BSE does not exist in the United States. From 1986 through December 31, 1995, 2,660 brain specimens from cattle exhibiting symptoms similar to BSE have been examined by USDA-APHIS veterinary pathologists and all have been negative. Since 1989, APHIS has banned importation of live cattle and other ruminants from countries where BSE is known to exist.

BSE is a relatively new disease, first identified in 1986 in Great Britain. Protein feedstuffs of animal origin, such as blood meal and meat and bone meals, are commonly used in European cattle rations. In the early 1980's, England changed the process used to render and prepare these animal by-products for use in animal feeds. The rendering industry dropped a solvent-extraction process that included the steam-heat treatment of offal. It is suspected that this step destroyed the BSE infecting agent.

Epidemiologic data suggests that BSE in England may have been

caused by feeding cattle rendered protein produced from the carcasses of scrapie-infected sheep. Scrapie, a disease similar to BSE observed in sheep, also belongs to a group of diseases known as transmissible spongiform encephalopathies.

BSE is not transmitted by animal to animal contact nor has maternal transmission (through milk) ever been documented. The disease is caused by a prion (a protein-like infectious particle) which is totally different from a bacteria, protozoa, virus or fungi. Prions are found only in the brain and spinal cord tissue. Therefore, the only threat to humans would come with consumption of brain and spinal cord tissue from BSE infected animals. (Remember there are none in the U.S.).

Media reports indicate the British government is considering slaughter of its entire beef and dairy cattle herds, a plan that has been estimated to cost \$31 billion dollars in compensation. The BSE epidemic peaked in January 1993 at almost 1,000 new cases a week. According to a report issued March 22 by USDA-APHIS, the rate of newly reported cases of BSE is decreasing. Currently, fewer than 300 new cases are occurring each week.

Preventative measures implemented by British officials in 1989 to eliminate BSE contaminated products from the human food chain and animal feed industry have been effective. Considering the 2-8 year incubation period associated with BSE in cattle, incidence of new cases should continue to decline through 1997. Assuming the eradication program remains on track, BSE infected cows may only be a part of British history by the turn of the century.

BRAUNIG: Water clear; normal level; 62 degrees; black bass are good on black chartreuse and pumpkinseed Power Worms and spinners fished in the reeds; hybrid stripers are fair on shad, chicken liver and shrimp; redfish are fair on crawfish and by trolling spoons and white grubs; catfish are fair on cut and cheese bait.

CALAVERAS: Water fairly clear; normal level; 73 degrees; black bass are fair on Power Worms and spinners; redfish are fair to good on perch and crawfish; catfish are good on cheese bait fished around the bridges and dam.

CHOKE: Water fairly clear; 20 feet low; 65 degrees; black bass are good on worms, spinners and buzz baits; white bass are fair to good on minnows, slabs and spoons; crappie are fair on minnows and jigs fished around the boat docks; catfish are good on rod and reels and trotlines baited with minnows, liver and cut

COLETO CREEK:

Water fairly clear; 4 feet low; 67 degrees; black bass are fair to good on spinners, worms, Slug-goods, Bass Assassins; hybrid stripers are fair on slabs, spoons and live bait; crappie are fair on minnows; catfish are fair on prepared bait.

CORPUS CHRISTI: Water clear; low; 65 degrees; black bass are good on worms, spinners and crank baits; white bass are fair to good on minnows and slabs; crappie are good on minnows and jigs fished around the docks and at the park; channel catfish are fair to good on rod and reels baited with cheese and cut bait; yellow catfish are fair on trot and jugs and rod and reels baited with live bait.

FALCON: Water clear, 31 feet low; black bass are good on spinners, crank baits, worms and topwaters; striped bass are fair to good on spoons and live bait; catfish are fair to good on rod and reels baited with minnows and prepared bait.

MEDINA: Water clear; 23 feet low; black bass to 4 pounds are slow on Power Worms; hybrid stripers are slow; white bass are fair to good on Lil' Georges; crappie are fair on minnows; catfish are fair on cheese and cut bait.

Lions Club Sponsors Boy Scout Troop 257







At Fort Clark, on January 1, 1883, Lt. French began diaries which he faithfully maintained for the next thirty years.

April 1884: This month is a turning point in the young lieutenant's experience in Texas. He relinquishes command of the Seminole Scouts and is detailed to Fort Brown, in Brownsville, where he is made the "Supervisor of Target Practice."

Tuesday, April 1 1884

Today is Father's birthday. Hope and pray that he will see many more and happy prosperous ones too. Hammond was Officer of the Guard, so Guard, Hewitt and I played tennis alone.

Wednesday, April 2, 1884

Overslept myself again and missed walk. Smith worked today on my mattress. Think it will be a very good one when finished.

Thursday, April 3 1884

Friday, April 4 1884

Today commences my last week in Clark. After breakfast made out paper for John Thompson's widow to sign to draw the pay due at the date of Thompson's death.

Saturday, April 5 1884

Completed Return of C.C. & G.E. and mailed it today. Then wrote rough draft of proceedings of Board of Survey, showed it to Maj. Smith and wanted to get Eckerson's approval but he was at Col. Bernard's with Miss Armour

Sunday, April 6 1884

Beautiful day. Hope the weather will remain settled until I get to Mayers Springs. Shunk came back this morning. Glad to see him again as it was lonesome while he was away.

Monday, April 7 1884

This morning about half of the Seminoles came up to exchange accouterments for better ones. I gave them notice about two weeks ago, but with their usual procrastination they put off until the last minute and now it is too late.

Tuesday, April 8 1884

Went to see Dr. Taylor about a mess outfit and then went to the office for a few minutes where Capt. Hall asked me if I would be willing to give up the Seminoles and go down to Brown for duty.

to go to Mayers Springs and I am very glad to get rid of the Seminoles. Played billiards with Hewitt & found that he had refused the detail. The General sent for me. I thought this was to speak about the detail, but it was on account of the Board of Survey.

Wednesday April 9 1884

Went out to drill this morning the first time in two years. Did not have anything to do except walk around behind the company. Made out invoices and receipts and after noon went out with Cunningham to transfer the property.


