

## Bull Town Bulletins

**YE EDITOR PROBABLY** doesn't have to tell his readers that the calendar year of 1992 is going down as one of the most unusual from the standpoint of weather in recent memory.

This is especially true if you are in the farming business, where some of the facts I'm about to present are all too painful.

Although the county has received above-average rainfall for the year, the fact remains that there have been two or three periods during the year when it has been extremely dry, with the date this is being written marking the 25th consecutive day without so much as a trace of moisture recorded.

The official rainfall at Friona's National Weather Service gauge stood at 20.96 inches after the last measurable rainfall on September 20. That's about three to four inches more than the usual moisture that we get in this area.

Yet, there was a period from February 5 through March 25--virtually two months in duration, when a scant .28 inch was the only moisture received during that seven-week period.

Fruit trees were severely hurt--many killed--by a hard freeze the morning of March 10, when the mercury dropped to 16 degrees, the second-lowest reading of the year, after the trees had budded out.

Severe weather battered the area a number of times during the spring and summer months.

A funnel cloud was spotted south and east of Friona March 28, when a corn dryer and other improvements were destroyed.

Then, the weekend of June 27-28, funnel clouds and hailstorms raked a large area from Bovina to Hub, and north of Bovina and West of Friona.

The hail wiped out much of the cotton crop and a lot of corn. Funnel clouds were spotted all over the place, and for once, even our western Panhandle area received some advance warning from the area's severe weather center.

About the time we had recovered from the late June "blow," another storm hit the east side of the county, on August 27. This was basically a wind and rain-storm, accompanied by pea-sized hail which the wind whipped into everything for 15 or 20 minutes.

No funnel cloud was actually spotted in the August storm, but some insurance investigators said it had to be of funnel-type origin. In our own neighborhood, a couple of huge trees were uprooted, and yard fences for a two or three-block area looked like a semi-truck had gotten loose through the back yards.

We have always known that we had quite a bird population on Maple Street in Friona, but it wasn't until the August storm that we realized just how big it was. Carol and I estimated that we picked up 800 dead birds of Mockingbird to sparrow size and smaller in our front and back yards.

The storm got 'em all. For years we have put out sunflower seeds for the Bluejays, robins, and other more attractive birds. We've always muttered about having too many sparrows. But it's been so quiet in our back yard the past two months we have even missed these little buggers. Plus, we have no birds out there at all to get after the insects.

Of course, those of you out in the country lost a lot more than your birds, so like we said at the beginning, this is just reviewing something that you already knew.

At least we didn't bore you with a lot of politics this week. Haven't you heard enough?

## Bovina Reps Attend Seminar

A team of teachers from Mackenzie Jr. High in Lubbock spoke of their experiences and management in implementing those processes. The final presentation was by Dr. George Melton, a middle Level expert from Virginia.

"The early voting is for anyone and for any reason: over 65, disabled--or if you just want to vote early. It is no longer considered 'absentee voting,' as it once was," Mrs. Warren pointed out.

## Council Meeting Discusses Issue

The city council met on Tuesday, October 13, at 8 a.m. for their regular meeting. The citizens had been put on the agenda for this meeting and they showed up with 100 plus attending. The main objective of this meeting was to discuss the police protection in Bovina.

A meeting was held last Tuesday night with a majority of the people whose homes have been burglarized attending. It was agreed unanimously by the group that the city policeman should live in our town.

They feel that then the robbers would not know if he is on duty or off. They also know that he cannot work 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

They do not know the finances of our town, but if it is possible another full-time or part-time policeman might help. It was determined at this meeting that all who had been investigated were not satisfied with their investigation.

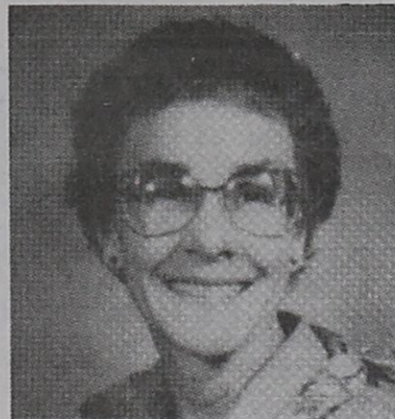
Virgie Cary was the spokesman for the group and Mayor Keith Knight recognized her and gave the citizens twenty-five minutes to present their complaints.

She presented the above message and also made a report that she had contacted the Lubbock Identification Defense Service to find the proper method of investigation of a robbery because none of the group knew the proper procedure.

They told Virgie that the following information is needed to get a good conviction of a felony:

1. Pictures of entry and the rooms burglarized, item used to enter, or personal evidence left behind like their cap or something of a robber's personal effect.
2. Fingerprints and footprints.
3. A very detailed report needs to be written.
4. Evidence left at the scene be taken for evidence.

The group also stated that they would like to know if there is some way they can help solve the robbery

problems we have.

"Because after being robbed, we can all attest that your life is not the same. We have all lost things that no amount of money can replace. Beside the feeling of being violated, we also have a fear that some day someone will be hurt. And there is no price that can be put on that," the spokesman said.

After Virgie had presented her statement Carolyn Beauchamp spoke saying that she had contacted the Clovis Police Department to find out the procedures on burglaries and found out that fingerprints were very important.

Several other citizens spoke up with the consensus being that all the citizens felt that our policeman should live in the town of Bovina.

Mayor Keith Knight asked Rex Williams, Parmer County Sheriff, to come in and answer some questions on the procedure of burglaries.

Williams stated that it was very hard to get fingerprints and that when you did then you had to fingerprint everyone that had been in that home to determine if the finger prints were ones not usually found in that home.

Williams also stated that the fingerprints had to be sent to the F.B.I. to be verified or that a fingerprint expert had to be called in to be able to use them as evidence.

The Sheriff made the statement that his department did take fingerprints whenever they could.

Mayor Keith Knight asked the group if they wanted their taxes raised so that another policeman could be hired. The general response was that if that was what it took to get good protection they would pay the taxes.

Mayor Keith Knight then dismissed the citizens by thanking them for coming and said that they would act on the situation but not right now at this moment.

The purpose of the Parmer County SWCD, with headquarters in Friona is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Christian will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District Law.

Christian is also active in local and church activities. Troy and his wife, Lillie, live and farm in the Oklahoma Lane area. Their children, Vic, Todd, and Sharmy, are grown. Vic and Todd farm with their dad.

In Texas there are 212 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

The Parmer County SWCD was organized in April 1948.

## Screening Clinic Is Scheduled In Friona

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

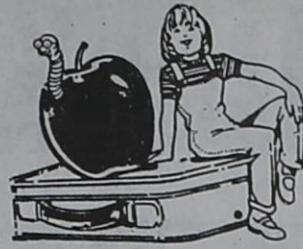
Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recom-

mended by the American Cancer Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination every year; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, November 18, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only.

## Back-To-School Lunch Ideas

Parents and their children often remember life differently. I think that I hate bologna sandwiches because I had to eat them in my lunch everyday in the first grade. My mother disagrees, insisting that she packed a variety of lunches.

She's probably right, but I still prefer roast beef on a hard roll to bologna and cheese any day!

After a while, I started buying my lunch in the school cafeteria. Then, reports of bugs and rats in school kitchens led me back to the ol' brown bag.

By that time, I was in high school, my mother had a full-time job, and I packed my own lunch. I usually packed a green salad topped with tuna fish; I poured my favorite salad dressing in an empty pimiento jar—just enough for a small salad.

Out on my own and in the working world, I began to experiment with my brown bag lunches. I stuffed pita bread halves with tuna salad and alfalfa sprouts for a healthy meal.

Making a lunch everyday that your child will eat can be a little tricky. Not only do you need to consider your child's likes and dislikes, but you also need to keep in mind the following safe-food tips:

- \* Refrigerated lunches are the safest, but since most children have no way to refrigerate their lunches, you can put something cold in the lunch bag. For example, a frozen drink, a small, plastic dish filled with frozen water or a freeze pack.
- \* If you pack the lunch the night before to make school mornings easier, refrigerate the lunch overnight.
- \* Include nonperishable snacks such as peanuts, raisins, cheese and crackers, sunflower seeds, dried fruit, granola or pretzels.
- \* Keep hot foods hot in thermal bottles. Before filling with the hot

food, warm up the bottle by pouring warm water into it; drain, dry and fill with your lunch choice.

School lunches don't have to be the boring bologna and cheese sandwiches that I remember (although I don't doubt my mother's claim that my school lunches were indeed filled with variety). Instead of plain white bread, put sandwich fillings in a pita pocket, flour tortilla, hot dog bun, taco shell, or any whole grain bread.

Ask your child to help make and pack his or her school lunch and try the following recipes.

**ALPHABET CHICKEN SOUP**  
2 tablespoons vegetable oil  
Flour seasoned with salt and pepper

1 frying chicken, cut into small pieces and blotted dry  
2 cups chicken stock  
2 cups water  
1 teaspoon dried thyme leaves  
1 bay leaf  
1/4 cup chopped parsley

1 24-ounce bag frozen stew vegetables, cut into small pieces  
1 cup frozen peas  
1 cup frozen pearl onions  
1 cup cooked alphabet pasta  
Salt and pepper to taste

Heat the oil over medium high heat in a large pot until hot. Take the chicken and roll it in the flour. Be sure to shake it to remove any excess flour. Add only enough chicken to fit comfortably in the bottom of the pan. Brown the pieces on all sides. Make sure that

all the chicken is browned. Remove the chicken from the pan and place it on a plate. When the chicken is cool enough to hold it in your hands, pull off the skin and blot in a paper towel to get rid of the extra fat. Return the chicken to the pan. Add the stock, water, thyme, bay leaf and parsley. Cook until the mixture boils. Once it is boiling, cover the pan and lower the heat so that the chicken can simmer for 15 to 20 minutes. Add the vegetables, alphabets, salt and pepper; simmer until the vegetables are tender. This should take about 15 minutes. Makes about 4 to 6 servings.

**PEANUT BUTTER AND RAISIN SANDWICH**  
1 bagel, halved horizontally  
2 tablespoons peanut butter  
2 tablespoons raisins  
2 tablespoons bacon bits  
3 thin slices red apple  
1 lettuce leaf

Spread the bagel halves with peanut butter; top with raisins and bacon bits, pressing down lightly. Cover bottom half with apple slices, lettuce and remaining bagel half. Cut in half. Makes one serving.

**CHICKEN SPREAD**  
2 cups minced cooked chicken breast  
1/4 cup minced dill pickle  
3 hard-cooked eggs, finely chopped  
1/2 cup chopped celery

Combine apple and honey; set aside. Combine next 5 ingredients in a medium bowl; make a well in center of mixture. Combine egg, milk and margarine. Add to dry ingredients; stir just until moistened. Stir in apple mixture. Place paper liners in muffin pans; coat liners with cooking spray. Spoon batter into liners, filling two-thirds full. Bake at 400 degrees for 18 minutes. Makes 1 dozen.

**APPLE MUFFINS**  
1/2 cup chopped apple  
1/4-ounce diced pimiento, drained  
3/4 cup reduced-calorie mayonnaise or salad dressing  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Combine apple and honey; set aside. Combine next 5 ingredients in a medium bowl; make a well in center of mixture. Combine egg, milk and margarine. Add to dry ingredients; stir just until moistened. Stir in apple mixture. Place paper liners in muffin pans; coat liners with cooking spray. Spoon batter into liners, filling two-thirds full. Bake at 400 degrees for 18 minutes. Makes 1 dozen.
