After four weeks of practice and two scrimmages, the Brackett Tigers will open their gridiron campaign Friday night.

And Tiger fans couldn't ask for a better opponent - Brackett will battle longtime rival Sabinal at 7:30 at Tiger Stadium.

"It's going to be a great contest," Brackett coach Roy Rokovich said. "Our kids are ready to get the season started. Sabinal plays good football. They hustle. They get to the ball. They have a great defense. We're looking forward to playing them."

The Yellowjackets, who return 18 lettermen, are coming off of a 5-4 season, after finishing sixth in District 28-A with a 2-3 conference mark.

"It's going to be an exciting game," said Sabinal coach Jesse Rodriguez, who coached at Brackett from 1987 to 1989.

"Brackett's going to be solid and we're going to be solid. Both teams are going to go out there and hit hard and play hard. The team that gets the luckiest is going to win."

Both coaches agree that the key to Friday night's game will be ball control.

"Offensively, we need to control the football," Rodriguez said. "We need to keep it away from Brackettville, their quarterback and their option offense. We can't turn the ball

over." "Defensively, we need a lot of people to the football. We need to get on the quarterback and get on the pitch-back. We just have to move to the ball. If we just sit back and relax, they have the personnel to bust one down the middle or down the sidelines."


Leading the Tigers offense this year is junior quarterback Jay Wayne Ballew.

"I saw Ballew on tape, and he is impressive," Rodriguez said. "He's faster than anybody we have so we have to be aware of where he is at all times.

"He's going to put a lot of pressure on our secondary, on our linebackers and on our defensive ends just because he has that speed."


I can remember those days and find myself daydreaming about the good old days of Labor Day, U.S.A.






