Three file as write-ins for Nov. election

Three Kinney County men have filed as write-in candidates for the Nov. 5 general election.

Tony Ray Kelly, Gregorio O. Juarez and Tully Shahan have all filed as write-in candidates for the county elections.

Kelly is running against Freddie Frerich in the Precinct 1 county commissioners' race, while Juarez is running against Joe "Boy" Williams in Precinct 3. Shahan is running unopposed for county attor-


Frerich won the democratic primary in March. He pulled in 175 votes, compared to 104 for Ruben C. Martinez. Williams ran unopposed in the primaries.

Running unopposed in the Nov. 5 election are L.K. "Buddy" Burgess, sheriff; Martha Pena Hooten, tax assessor-collector; and Bill Lindeman, constable.

Burgess won the democratic primary after collecting 688 votes, topping Ron Ring's 126 votes. Hooten and Lindeman were both unopposed in the primaries.

Early voting for the general election begins Oct. 16, and continues through Nov. 1.

"There is a major change in the works at this time not to dig up confusion, and I think that's a benefit to us," Brackettville City Manager David Luna reported at last week's city council meeting.

Holloman Construction has proposed a different method of excavating water lines in the city, as part of the new joint sewer plant project between the city and Fort Clark Municipal Utilities District.
