New building proposed for alternative school

Plans are underway for a new building for Brackett's Alternative Education Program.

The Brackett School Board of Trustees will discuss the plans for the building at their next regular meeting on Monday, Oct. 14.

"We have a basic floor plan that our teacher (Willy Clements) has recommended to us," Superintendent Taylor Stephenson said. "We're going back over those, and planning it. The major stumbling block now has been the selection of a sight."

School Board President Jimmy Bader appointed a site selection committee, with Trustee Tim Ward as the chairman. The rest of the committee consists of Clements, Stoney Burks, Sara Terrazas, Mary Jane Meek, Guillermo Farias and Marcus Tidwell.

"Basically, this committee is charged with selecting a sight for the school," Stephenson said. "They will look at available sights and recommend this year's budget. what is best.

"We have made an attempt here to separate our students. "We own some land around the school and around town," Stephenson said. "I'm sure that the board will look at some of those sights, but it could involve the purchase of some land."

"I prefer that it be fairly close to the school, not too far out, because we think we can better service the needs of the kids, and the kids can get there without providing transportation."

Stephenson said the structure will probably be a prefabricated steel building.

"We're going to need some parking for about 10 or 15 cars," he said. "We will think about security for the facility."

Stephenson said that he hopes to have the projected completed in time to house the alternative education students in the new building by the beginning of the spring semester.

The Harris Ratings System has Crystal City listed as an 8-point favorite over Brackett. Both teams are 1-2 on the season. The Javelinas, a 3A team, are coming off of a 27-0 victory over the La Pryor Bulldogs.

"Crystal City is going to be tough," Tigers head coach Roy Rokovich said. "In watching them on film, they are real big."

The Javelinas are led by tight end Enrique Flores, who caught three touchdown passes in last week's win over La Pryor.

"Flores is a big kid," Rokovich said. "He has a lot of ability. When he's ready to play, he's as good as they come."

"They love to run the option. La Pryor caused six or seven fumbles the other night, so they have a tendancy to turn the ball over."





Keeping the Eagle on track

The History of Texas is written in its railroad lines and depots. But in my books, railroads aren't about nostalgia. Instead, they represent a vital link to the future that needs to be forged stronger, not allowed to rust.

Many Texans started humming the "Disappearin Railroad Blues" last month when Amtrak announced plans to discontinue its Texas Eagle rail passenger service. This would be an incalculable loss.


The Eagle represents 80 percent of all passenger rail service in Texas. It is one of Amtrak's primary intercity, cross-country routes. It is ironic that rail commuter service would be cut in Texas, where a "short drive" within the state can be more than 300 miles.

There are many Texas cities without airline service whose transportation needs could best be served by train or train-bus connections. Eventually, rail lines could feed passengers into airports, providing more people with convenient links to transportation.

Railroads are an integral part of a balanced national passenger transportation system. Any attempt to cut one link inevitably weakens the others. Neither the national economy nor our state economy can prosper without all its arteries of transport, railroads, highways, and airports, operating efficiently.

We should be looking for ways to combine each mode of travel to strengthen our entire national transportation network. We must devise a better working, more flexible system, a system less weighed down by outdated rules and administrative requirements that skew the bottom line and impede service.

A future-oriented transportation policy can only in, or ante up. be created with states and communities acting as I am working on an extension of the deadline for full partners. Meanwhile, many of our highways and runways are operating at capacity. Railroad lines remain the one under-utilized infrastructure. Many states already are entering into partnerships with Amtrak.

It's time for Texas to get on board and give Texans the opportunity to enter into this kind of working relationship with Amtrak, in the same way the state and countless communities work with other transportation providers.

Amtrak's ability to expand its capacity rapidly, carry on despite severe weather conditions and transport large numbers of people in an environmentally sound manner make passenger rail service a potential growth industry.

I don't believe the Texas Eagle's demise is inevitable. Its announced cancellation was a heavy-handed decision taken in haste, leaving Texas to regret at leisure. Texas wasn't given the opportunity to weigh
