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

If the bulbs are there for next season and forever, you have the following options:

At fall planting: For the first year's bloom, no fertilizer. For are three good choices, a good organic compost or well rotted cow manure worked into the soil when planting; a slow release bulb food; or a combination of bone meal and an 8-8-8 fast release soluble fertilizer (about one teaspoon per square foot).

In spring: Again for first year blooms, none needed. For perennial bulbs, fertilizer considerations are: nothing needed if fall you applied manure or a slow release bulb food or the bone meal nitrogen fertilizer mix.

Q. What should I do after tu-

A. After tulip flowers have faded, "dead head" them by clipping off faded blooms so that they won't go to seed. Daffodils don't require dead-heading, just leave them alone.

The main requirement for bulb flowers in the post-bloom period is to leave the leaves alone so that the plant can put its energy into next spring's performance. The photosynthesis turns basic elements such as oxygen, nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium into stored food reserves.

Information for hunting season

Season Dates for deer and turkey hunting in Kinney County this year are as follows:

■ Archery Season: Sept. 28, through Oct. 27; limits include and are the same as during General Season.

■ General Season, north of US 90: Nov. 2, through Jan. 5; limit of four deer, no more than two bucks.

■ General Season, south of US 90: Nov. 9, through Jan. 19; limit of five deer, no more than three bucks.

■ Late Anterless Only Season: South of US 90 only, Jan. 20, through Feb. 2.

■ Muzzleloader Anterless Only Season: North of US 90 only, Jan. 11, through Jan. 19.

■ Turkey: Dates are same as for General Hunting Seasons and Archery Season above (limit four, either sex) with the exception of a county-wide spring season from March 29, through May 4, for gobblers only.

Also, the correct sunrise and sunset times for Oct. 31 are 6:56 a.m. and 5:58 p.m. because of the time change.

For more information on these and other hunting seasons, check the Hunting Guide available where licenses are sold or from your local Game Warden.

Now, here is some information for those of you who are interested in taking advantage of what the state parks in our part of the state are offering:

AUSTIN - Two popular natural attractions just west of the Austin and San Antonio metro areas are proving that Texans with disabilities can enjoy back-to-nature experiences like any other

state park visitors. Garner State Park in Uvalde County, the most popular campground in Texas, will soon be one of the state's most accessible parks for wheelchair users and other visitors with disabilities,

During the '50s and the '60s, wells were drilled northwest and southwest of town which were for irrigation projects.

Las Moras Creek has always gone dry when the heat and evaporation was intense.

However, years ago, the railroad pumped water out of the creek for steam engines, which could only travel 20 or 30 miles without requiring more water to supply steam.

The availability of water for wells depends upon faults that change the underground structures Fort Clark residents watch it, and create the recharge zones and the aquifers.

Underground rivers exist, as well as pools formed by "underground dams". These areas were To Kinney county residents, it explained when the Water Commission was created and the geology of this area was described.

The Balcones fault runs next to San Marcus. Another fault exists at Las Moras mountain.

Fortunately, Kinney County is not connected to the aquifer that supplies water for San Antonio. Thus, we are not drawn into their disputes over water.

In 1964, Las Moras Spring did go dry, but picked back up when the rains came.
