#### Brackettville gets new area code next year

Brackettville is among cities that will be assigned a new area code next year.

Implementation of the new area codes is scheduled for midsummer 1997.

Brackettville and other cities in the northern portion of the 210 area code will be assigned the 830 prefix. Cities in the southern portion will be assigned the 956 prefix. The Greater San Antonio Area will retain the 210 area code.

The new 830 area code will serve all or part of 34 counties, including the cities of Del Rio, Uvalde, New Braunfels, Fredericksburg and Kerrville. The southern portion, including Laredo, McAllen and Brownsville, will be assigned 956.

The Brackett Tigers and Tigerettes will open play in the Southwest texas Junior College Invitational basketball tournament


The Tigerettes face the Leakey Lady Eagles in the tournament opener at 8:30 this morning.

Sara Webb said farmers/ranchers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers/ ranchers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer/ rancher must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Webb said. Farmers/ranchers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until June 23, 1997 but farmers/ranchers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season," Webb said.
