## Sharp delivers tax rebates

AUSTIN - John Sharp, the state comptroller The city of Houston received a sales tax rebate of public accounts, delivered a total of $\$ 139$ mil- of $\$ 16.4$ million in January, 2.2 percent below cities and 117 counties.
This month's payments to Texas cities and counties include sales taxes collected by monthly
filers in November at the start of the holiday shop filers in November at the start of the holiday shop-
ping season, and reported to the comptroller in ping season, and reported to the comptroller in
December. December. "The first sales tax rebates to cities and counties for 1997 are virtually the same as rebates for
the same period in 1996, as the recent burgeoning growth of the Texas economy appears to be leveling off somewhat," Sharp said:"
Sharp delivered city sales tax rebates totaling $\$ 126.6$ million, less than 1 percent above las year's January payments of $\$ 125.7$ million. Likewise, rebates of $\$ 12.38$ million to Texas
counties also were less than 1 percent counties also were less than 1 percent more than
the $\$ 12.37$ million allocations in January 1996 . The city of Brackettville received a sales tax rebate of $\$ 3,468.06$ for January, reflecting a 26.79 percent increase from the $\$ 2,735.08$ in sales tax rebate for the same month last year Kinney County's sales tax allocation for January was $\$ 2,222.76$, up 10.68 percent over the January 1996 payment of $\$ 2,008.13$.

In other words, the Homemaker IRA allows non-wage earr:ing spouses to make savings con-
tributions at the same rate that wage earning spouses are allowed wage earning spouses are allowed fect the way millions of Amerif cans save for their retirement. I wrote this legislation starting from the basic premise that work done inside the home, running the home, caring for children, is every bit as important to the strength
of our society as any work performed outside the home any where in the country.
But until the Homemaker IR.A became law, the tax code did not reflect that long-held American value. The old law limited a nonworking spouse's contribution to $\$ 250$ a year, or $\$ 2,250$ for a one income couple. This was a "gender gap, and

The idea behind IRAs is to able and encourage Americans to set aside money for their retirement security. Single income couples have the same retirement needs as two income couples. Everyone should be allowed to save, on an equal basis, for their as impartial as we can make it No one, especially not homemakers, should be at a disadvantage. How big of a difference will

Multiple row breaks also add Multiple row breaks also add natural beauty, privacy and value
to a homestead, and act as a sound barrier to highway or farm road traffic. To ensure maximum performance, Fewin recommends a four row farmstead windbreak; an outside shrub row, providing low
density protection; two interior density protection; two interior
evergreen rows, supplying year evergreen rows, supplying year
round security; and an inside tall round security; and an insice tall zone of protection. zone of protection.
