CAFE standards hard to swallow

Along with yellow roses, Bob Wills' music, Aggie and Teasip jokes and chili, pickup trucks are a defining icon of Texas culture. These hard working vehicles take us from farm to market, transport us to work and haul our stock in trade.

But, like the Puritan whose great fear is that somewhere, someone is enjoying himself, the federal government fears that we are enjoying our pickup trucks and sport utility vehicles just a little too much. Watch out. The federal government's corporate average fuel economy (CAFE) standards are about to rev up and spoil the fun. This means another bureaucratic assault on our economic well being.

Enacted by Congress during the height of the energy crisis in 1976, the CAFE standards were intended to ensure that automakers increased the fuel efficiency of their cars and trucks. They set "average" standards for each manufacturer's fleet of new cars sold. This was supposed to reduce fuel consumption and help stabie lize the volatile energy market.

Trouble is, although fleet fuel efficiency has risen 70 percent since 1973, CAFE has failed to reduce aggregate fuel consumption. Americans are driving more not less. Moreover, the law of unintended consequences has kicked in with a vengeance:

*In order to meet the increased fuel efficiency standards, manufacturers are building smaller, lighter vehicles. According to a study conducted by Harvard and the Brookings Institute, CAFE standards have required an average 500 pound downsizing of new vehicles, which translates into more than 2,000 additional traffic deaths per year.

* The standards for imports are less rigorous than for domestically produced vehicles, giving domestic manufacturers an incentive to increase the percentage of foreign parts they use in some models so they are classified as a foreign manufactured product. 

The activity at Lake Amistad is water related. Most visitors come to fish, boat ride, water ski, scuba dive and swim.

These activities are recreational, but all are dangerous to some extent. You can be injured if you go fishing and fall off your boat, and you can drown if you have forgotten to wear a life jacket.

Anderson said one of his primary duties is to be a safety officer. He and other officers do boat safety inspections and check for alcohol and drug use. He also teaches courses in boating safety.

the lake. Fortunately, Del Rio has an excellent hospital and ambulance service. However, injuries often occur far from the boat ramps and roads and in inaccessible areas.

His task is to reach the victims, wrap them up, National Park Service Ranger Dennis Anderson, and get them stabilized in order to take them to the boat ramps where the ambulance can reach them.

The most frequently asked question is about the water level of Lake Amistad. Despite recent rains, Anderson has been a Federal Law Enforcement the level is still low. It can rise rapidly, however, when rains occur around Big Bend, Ozona, and Comstock.

Right now, Anderson is often asked to explain the newly instituted user fees. There will be no entry charge for just visiting the park, but May 1 is a target date for boating and camping grounds fees.

Forty dollars a year will provide a sticker for a boat. An infrequent visitor may choose to purchase a \$4 a day permit.

The upkeep of the National Parks is financed by federal tax money.

However, in 1992 Congress decided that those who use the parks should pay more.

A movement was begun to make the parks more self sufficient. Eighty percent of collected money stays with that park to be used for hard improvements such as roads and parking lots.
