Enough signatures have been collected to put phone customers, Alderman Tino Gomez announced at Tuesday's City Council meeting.

The measure must be approved by over 70 percent of the local telephone customers for the program to be implemented.

Gomez said that over 95 signatures had been collected. A minimum of 75 was needed.

He said the next step is to send a letter of interest to the Public Utilities Commission.





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

Importance of the National Guard

Amendment II to the U.S. Constitution ratified on Dec. 15, 1791: "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

The fall of the Berlin Wall in 1989 radically changed America's defense needs. This brought about a reexamination of our national spending priori-

As we try to balance the budget, we must make better use of scarce resources and seek greater value for every dollar spent. Accordingly, Congress has supported the Defense Department's efforts to reduce its size prudently and address changed security threats.

The Defense Department's force structure now is roughly 30 percent smaller than it was in the 1980s. Its budget has also declined to about 60 percent (in real terms) of its peak in 1985. We have reduced our military forces to the lowest levels since just before the outbreak of World War II.

One of the little-noticed implications of this changed defense landscape is the increased reliance we now put on the National Guard.

Our eight National Guard divisions are an integral part of America's defense readiness. A recent study of Texas' 49th Armored Division by the Institute for Defense Analysis concluded that it could mobilize, train and be ready for deployment in little more than 90 days.

This is the kind of essential support that makes it possible to downsize our active-duty force without compromising readiness or national security.

Dollar for dollar, the National Guard is one of the best defense investments we can make. In fighting for full funding for the National Guard in next year's defense bill, I pointed out to my Senate colleagues that the Army National Guard trains its recruits at only 20 percent of the cost of training a regular Army soldier. That's a savings no one can afford to ignore.

The administration's requested defense budget for next year would have severely cut funding for the National Guard. But in July, the Senate voted to restore critical funding for the National Guard (as well as reserve programs). Historically, with the exception of the period of the Cold War, the United States has not maintained a large, standing defense force. We have relied instead on the National Guard and reserve pro-

It would be shortsighted to gut our reserve capabilities at the same time we are dramatically downsizing the active force.

Question: Will steak and potatoes, chicken fried steak with gravy, and barbecued brisket really elevate my risk for cancer?

Answer: Studies show that 30 percent of cancers are related to diet. Therefore, you can reduce your chances of getting cancer by making a few changes in your diet.

You should reduce the amount of fat you eat or cook with, eliminating fried foods altogether. And you should reduce the amount of protein you eat, especially red meat.

You should also avoid taking in too many calories. Obesity is linked to breast, colon, and uterine cancers. Your risk for getting one of these cancers increases with being overweight. Cutting back on fat, protein, and calories will also reduce your risk of coronary heart disease.



You should also cut back on the amount of processed, smoke-cured, or salt-cured foods you eat. These foods contain potent cancer-causing agents.
