Water samples come back free of bacteria

Five water samples taken last week by the city of Brackettville came back free of bacteria, according to Utilities Superintendent David Martinez.

"We took five samples last Wednesday and they all came back positive," Martinez said on Monday.

The samples were taken from the Gum residence on E. Spring, Rory's Video Review on Military and Gove, the Church of Christ on N. Ann, the Vela residence on W. Spring, and the R.E.A. on W. Military.

Fort Clark officials **OK** security contract

The Fort Clark Springs Board of Directors approved a three-year contract with Smith Security at Saturday's regular meeting.

The directors also approved the HERB SENNE recommendations of the planning committee for further study.

The recommendations include development of the old R.V. park, the new R.V. park, and the old temporary dump site.

The board approved the first reading of an amendment to the rules and regulations dealing with Rendezvous Park.

In other action, the directors approved a proposal for road work in Unit 27, an insurance agreement for the upcoming year, and an agreement with the city of Brackettville for fire protection.

Pretrial hearing set for Sept. 17

Two Kinney County officials plead not guilty to charges of theft and abuse of official capacity Wednesday after being arraigned in district court.

County Judge Tommy Seargeant and Commissioner Joe Montalvo were both indicted last month on charges surrounding the theft of highway guard rails.

Seargeant is being represented by Robert T. Bass of Austin and Uvalde's Rogelio F. Munoz is representing Montalvo.

District Judge George M. Thurmond set a pretrial hearing for 1 p.m. on Sept. 17. All pretrial motions must be filed by Sept. 5.

"I would like to get the trial set in the month of October," Thurmond said.

Seargeant and Montalvo face three different counts in the indictments. The third count was quashed Wednesday because it said the alleged incident occurred in September of 1997, rather than in 1996.

The indictment will be returned to the grand jury prior to the pretrial hearing.

"The grand jury will have an opportunity to look at it again," District Attorney Thomas F. Lee said. "If they feel it's appropriate that matter be reindicted, we'll have an opportunity to correct any mistakes in the indictment so that we have a proper charging instrument come out of the grand jury."

OSHA should research before it regulates

As hand surgeon Dr. Morton Kasdan has pointed out, treatment before diagnosis is bad medicine, whether dispensed by a doctor in the form of drugs or the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) in the form of regulations.

OSHA has been studying the matter of ergonomics since the early 1990s. Ergonomics is the science of adapting work or working conditions to the physical requirements of the workers. Ergonomic injuries include repetitive strains and conditions such as carpal tunnel syndrome.

According to OSHA, ergonomic injuries account for 60 percent of workplace illnesses and \$20 billion in workers' compensation claims. But the Bureau of Labor Statistics tells a different story: It reports that ergonomic injuries account for only 7 percent of total workplace injuries. The National Safety Council puts that figure at 4 percent.

Few would argue that repetitive motion injuries are real. There are questions, however, about whether these injuries are caused exclusively by factors in the workplace. Scientists and physicians do not agree on how much exposure to risk factors actually causes problems (or even which workplace risk factors cause prob-

The question is this: Why is it that two people can perform the exact same work activity, and one ends up with carpal tunnel syndrome and the other doesn't?

Could not some of these kinds of injuries be the result of factors other than workplace conditions, such as diet, age, heredity or nonwork activities?

In addition, neither medicine nor science has been able to determine how to prevent such ail-



New law helps with criminal trespass

Another new law passed by the Texas Legislature this past term deals with criminal tres-

In order to file criminal trespass charges on someone, notice that entry on property is forbidden must first be given.

In the past, notice is defined

1. oral or written communications by the property owner as follows: or someone with apparent authority to act for the owner.

2. fencing or other enclosure obviously designed to exclude intruders or to contain livestock.

A group of diseases that cause inflammation in the part of the kidney that filters blood, called glomerulonephritis, is the third leading primary diagnosis - at 12 percent - for applicants. Other conditions and diseases leading to ESRD include urinary system disease, congenital anomalies, connective tissue disease, cancer, blood diseases, HIV/AIDS and metabolic diseases.


Patients with ESRD must rely on either dialysis or a kidney transplant. Untreated, complete breakdown of the kidneys is always fatal. Nationally, kidney disease is the fifth most common

cause of death. "I tell patients that it is important to learn about kidney disease," said Zapata, who received a kidney transplant in 1989 following 15 months on dialysis. 
Choking and Young Children

Question: The other day I left the room briefly and my toddler started choking on something. What could I have done to prevent this?

Answer: Providing a safe environment for your children can be one of the best ways to minimize choking hazards. For example, keep batteries, paper clips, small toy parts and figures, nails and screws, coins, keys, balloons, marbles, and jewelry out of reach of small children. Prevent your toddler from playing with toys that are age-graded for his or her older brothers and sisters, and be sure these toys are stored out of reach of your young child. foods provide a particular danger to young children. Feed your toddler only firm foods that have been completely chopped. Infants and young children don't always chew their food well, so always cut it for them. Be especially careful when serving hard candies, nuts and raisins, chunks of meat, hot dogs, raw carrots, and grapes. Also, have your child eat at the table; don't let him run around while eating and don't let older brothers and sisters feed him. Be sure to discuss these safety rules with anyone who watches over your young child.
