Trustees to adopt tax rate Monday

The Brackett School Board of Trustees will vote on lowering its tax rate by four cents at a special meeting on Monday.


The trustees are expected to adopt a tax rate of 1.2119 per \$100 valuation, which is four cents less than last year's rate of \$1.2529.

The school board hosted a state-required public hearing on a proposed tax increase Monday because of the difference between the district's tax rate of \$1.2119 and its effective tax rate of \$1.0750.

The effective tax rate is computed by the Property Tax Division in Austin and is used to determine the tax rate necessary to produce local funds to financially support the district's budget.

"Most of our school moneys are from state funds which are not considered when computing the effective tax rate," Stephenson ization fund for the property poor approved Saturday by the Board districts of Texas."



This week, our Constitution celebrates its 210th birthday. For two centuries it has guided this great nation, but it is also as new. as today's headlines.

The Constitution lays out the fundamental ideas this nation is based on: our God-given rights. democracy and liberty. But as we celebrate the birthday of the Constitution, it is shocking to see how. many folks do not know the basics of this important document.

In a poll by the National Constitution Center, only 5 percent could correctly answer 10 simple questions about the U.S. Constitution. For example, about half of the Americans polled did not know that the U.S. Constitution: set up a federal government with three branches.

The questions that were asked weren't tricky, but still some Americans know amazingly little about this important document.

One of the most disturbing results of the Constitution Center's poll was the fact that only one in three people knew the first 10 amendments of the Constitution are called the Bill of Rights.

The right to free speech, the right to keep and bear arms, the right to be secure against unreasonable searches and seizures: these rights, and the others guar-The Seminoles have so much anteed by the Bill of Rights, are the most fundamental principles of our nation.

If the people don't understand these basic liberties, then the very freedom the Founding Fathers designed is in jeopardy.
