

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison

The Clinton administration is going to have to decide which is more important: stopping the flow of illegal drugs across the Mexican border into this country, or making the border more hospitable for nocturnal ocelots.

Down in Brownsville, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has drawn a bead on the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

As part of Operation Rio Grande, the Border Patrol has increased its manpower, added equipment and installed some two dozen lights along the banks of the Rio Grande to foil nighttime sneaking activities by drug smugglers and illegal aliens.

But these lights, Fish and Wildlife officials allege, disturb two large species of cat, the nocturnal ocelot and the jaguarundi. Brownsville INS sector chief Ernesto Castillo says the lights are an essential of the Operation Rio Grande strategy, protecting both Border Patrol agents and thwarting drug traffickers.

Mexico is the source of between 20 percent and 30 percent of the heroin and 70 percent of the marijuana shipped into the United States. It is the transit point for between 50 percent and 70 percent of the cocaine sold in the United States.

The use of illicit drugs among eighth graders has risen 150 percent in the last five years. Heroin addiction is climbing and crack cocaine remains an epidemic in America's urban centers.





In December of 1882 the 19th Infantry was posted to Fort Clark



## Texans urged to help in the study of Monarch migration

AUSTIN - Borne on the winds of a cold front millions of Monarch butterflies are headed for Texas, some of which bear tiny tags indicating where they came

Texans are being urged to help in a nationwide effort to solve the mysteries of the migration by finding tagged Monarchs, tagging more of them and keeping track of their numbers and location during the migration.

The massive Monarch migration is a well-known phenomenon, but much needs to be learned about how they get to their overwintering grounds in Mexico in the fall. To provide answers, a research project is underway with funding from the Nongame and Urban Wildlife Program of the a role in guiding them. ## TDH urges yearly flu shots for everyone

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) urges all Texans to get yearly flu vaccinations. The experts also warn that the elderly and others who may be at high risk of influenza and its complications should be immunized even before the flu season begins. The flu season usually lasts from December through April.

The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) each year predicts which strains of influenza pose the greatest public health danger in the U.S. The vaccine CDC has recommended for the 1997-98 season is meant to combat the A/Wuhan,

A/Bayern and B/Beijing strains of the disease. The effectiveness of each year's shots declines with time, therefore, annual immunizations with the appropriate vaccines are recommended for everyone except people with serious allergies to eggs.

People most at risk of severe or fatal complications of the disease include those 65 or older, anyone with chronic respiratory or heart problems, diabetics and children on aspirin therapy.

Influenza kills about 20,000 in the U.S. each year. According to Jim Schuermann, TDH public health technician, the elderly are the group hardest-hit by influenza and its complications.

"Fewer than 30 percent of elderly Americans and others in high-risk groups heed our regular warnings to have yearly influenza vaccinations," he said. "We know that one reason some older people fail to be vaccinated is because of a persistant, unfounded fear that the vaccine can actually cause influenza.

"The truth is that a vaccinated person may still contract some strains of influenza, but not from the vaccine," Schuermann added.
