Judge's case set for trial

9th year, No. 40

Kinney County Judge Tommy Seargeant is expected to go to court on Monday, Nov. 24, to face charges dealing with theft and misappropriation of highway guard rails, according to local officials. Seargeant was originally scheduled to go to trial on Oct. 27, but the case was delayed because of a civil trial which lasted five days.

Seargeant and County Commissioner Joe Montalvo were indicted by the grand jury in July and were arrested on charges of abuse of official capacity.


"It has to do with some guard rails that came into the possession of the county and then ended up on the private property of Mr. Montalvo," District Attorney Tom Lee said.

District Judge George M. Thurmond ruled that the two county officials would be tried separately, at the request of Seargeant's attorney, Robert T. Bass of Austin.

Montalvo, who is represented by Rogelio F. Munoz of Uvalde, will be tried after Seargeant.

Seargeant was suspended with pay by the State Commission of Judicial Conduct shortly after being indicted. He is in his 11th year stretches going back to 1971.

Trustees to consider new academic wing

The Brackett School District is considering adding a new academic wing to accommodate the growing number of students.

The district's Growth Committee, headed by Trustee Tim Ward, presented the idea at Monday's School Board meeting. The new academic wing would provide the district with 11 new classrooms. could be paid for from the district's cash reserves. "We are short of classrooms," Superintendent Taylor Stephenson said. "Every classroom that we said. "We feel, right now, that a bond issue would

have is being utilized today." Stephenson said the district has grown from 574 students in 1993 to 650 this fall.

"We project, at the same rate of growth, that we could have 744 kids in our system by the year 2000," he said.

The greatest danger facing Social Security today is the false notion that it is about to collapse the wage earner. and that the only way to save it is to re-create it.

I realize in this era of reinventing government, the urge to reinvent Social Security is irresistible. But let's be clear, Social Security to be, a 401 (k) plan or an individual investment account.

Individual investments are important for income security, but in addition to - not in place of -Social Security.

Social Security is unique, providing lifetime income insurance that protects families against financial hardship resulting from the death, disability or retirement of

Social Security is the primary and only assured source of retire-This idea is being spread by ment income for most older Americans, and it guarantees lifelong, inflation-adjusted income. In fact, it serves about 44 million people of all ages, including 5 million widows, 3.5 million children and 4 million workers who have become disabled.

For 62 years, Social Security is not now, nor was it ever meant has been a reliable program providing disability insurance and protection for family survivors, not simply an investment strategy that can be measured by rates of return.

When looking at the future of Those who argue in favor of the Social Security system we should not ask the question, "Could people do better by investing on their own?"

Rather, we should ask, "Do we want our children's and grandchildren's futures to be built on the firm foundation that Social Security provides, or do we want That's like comparing apples to pull it out from under them, reducing their income insurance and forcing them to invest with no guarantees?"

HEALTH TDH's Toy Sweep putting safety high on wish list

And what they are going to find out is- not necessarily who's naughty or nice - but rather what dangerous toys might be on store shelves for children.

Texas Department of Health (TDH) Product Safety inspectors take to retail stores large and small during the week of Nov. 10 to 14 for the 1997 Toy Sweep, armed with a list of 17 toys and other children's products.

The list reads like a child's dream- water rockets, flying dolls, children's bracelets and necklaces, wooden spinning tops, plastic beeper phones, grandparents or others might want to purchase such as bunk beds, high chairs, play yards, safety gates and strollers.

These 17 items, each with a specific model number, have been selected for the Toy Sweep from recalled during the year by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC). Reasons for the along with a bicycle, tricycle, skates, skateboard or recalls include high lead levels in paint, dangers from inhaling small parts, choking and sharp edge hazards, parts that fly apart under pressure and safety equipment that may have broken hinges or faulty latches. looking for toys and children's items with specific der age 3. model numbers that may not have been taken off the shelves following a recall," said Charles Branton, with heating elements and toys with sharp edges and director of the TDH Product Safety Program. Some points. toy dangers, he said, have been corrected by the manufacturer and put back on sale.

Branton advises consumers to become consistent label readers on all products they consider buying, especially for children. "People should look for clear instructions, age recommendations and a list of potential hazards," he said. "A label will tell a consumer two critical things: that a toy is not safe for younger children and why it is not safe."

Other tips on selecting toys and children's items for safety include:

· Select toys to suit the age, abilities, skills and interests of the child. Toys safely designed for older children may have parts or strings that can choke or strangle a young child. And children may get discouraged or lose interest if a toy is too difficult to play with.

Be sure the instructions are understandable to both the buyer and, when appropriate, the child.

 Look for sturdy construction such as tightly among about 300 defective or dangerous products secured eyes, nose, buttons and other small parts. Always give a helmet and other protective gear


