Casey led Baird with 76 yards rushing

while Deel had 72 yards rushing.

Coach Conley said Cross Plains was much more competitive this year than in the past.

He concluded that he was very happy that Buffalos were unable to score. He said offense did a lot better in the 2nd half.

This was just one more honor for Baird School Centennial.

This week the Bears will play the Gorman Panthers at Gorman at 8 p.m.

The Panthers beat Hico last week which put them 1-0, same as the Bears.

Coach Conley feels this will be a much better game than Cross Plains. They look a lot tougher.

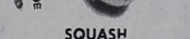

USDA Announces Funding For Food Stamp Job Search Contracts

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is seeking contract proposals from state welfare departments to continue job search services for food stamp work registrants. Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Mary C. Jarratt said that \$30 million is available for the job search contracts. This aspects of food stamp operations had previously been accomplished through the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL). However, USDA plans to transfer the responsibility

directly to state welfare agencies which are assigned by law to administer the food stamp program. The change is intended to

give states greater flexibility and control over food stamp operations.

As a condition of eligibility for food stamp benefits, able-bodied recipients between 18 and 60 years old are required to register for work and actively seek employment.

"We're committed to helping food stamp recipients who are employable find suitable jobs. State welfare agencies, with a thorough knowledge of their clientele, are in the best position to directly carry out this responsibility effectively," Jarratt said.

To determine the amount of funds states may receive,

the Department is using a formula derived from the number of food stamp work registrants in each state. State welfare agencies may perform job search services themselves or may contract with state employment security agencies, other state and local agencies, or private employment agencies.

A notice announcing the availability of funds to state agencies to continue job search services is scheduled to appear in the "Federal Register" on Friday, August 20, 1982. Contract proposals must be submitted to USDA's Food and Nutrition Service by September 13.

Union Exploration from Lamesa will drill No. 2-B-61 Williams as a proposed 500-foot wildcat eight miles northeast of Putnam in Callahan County.

Location is on a 61-acre lease, spotting 3,041 feet from the south and 760 feet from the west lines of Section 3161, TE&L Survey.

It will be an east twin to No. 1-B Williams, an oil drilled to a total depth of 4,215 feet.

Aries Operating Inc. will drill two Callahan County wildcats five miles southeast of Denton Valley on the R.S. Click 140-acre lease.

Each test is slated for 2,500 feet.

No. 1 Click spots 2,064 feet from the north and 3,080 feet from the west line of Section 9, Block 3, T&P Survey.

Site for No. 2 Click is 1,635 feet from the south and 467 feet from the west lines of Section 9.

Another wildcat will be drilled eight miles southwest of Admiral as S&W Petroleum Co., operating from Cisco, No. 1 Harris.

Slated for 2,000 feet, it spots 150 feet from the southwest line and 230 feet from the most westerly east line of S.J. Robinson Survey 295.

Davis Brothers, Abilene, will drill No. 4-G Chrane in the Lytle Gap, West (Upper Cook) Field six miles southwest of Eula.

The planned 2,200-foot venture is located on a 320-acre lease.

It spots 2,2670 feet from the north and 1,700 feet from the west lines of Section 7, Block 7, Sp Survey.

Davis Brothers, Abilene, filed application to drill No. 3-B Hayden in Callahan County Regular Field five miles southwest of Moran.

The planned 1,750-foot venture spots 330 feet from the north and 800 feet from the west lines of Section 116, University Lands Survey.

PROPERTY TAXES—

GOOD INTENTIONS AREN'T ENOUGH

I want to talk this week about taxes and good intentions.

As I travel around Texas, I notice that what's known as the Peveto Bill is the subject of much talk and controversy. This bill, named after state representative Wayne Peveto, is a tax reform law; legislation of the best intention.

The law was designed to end confusion and unfairness in the way property taxes were assessed. Property was often on different tax rolls at different values. Older properties went years, sometimes decades, without being revalued or updated. New construction and newly sold property was on the rolls at more correct values and so people who owned it paid a higher share of taxes. Some property was simply left off the rolls entirely. The system was confusing and inequitable.

In an attempt to correct these problems, the Peveto Bill created property tax appraisal boards for each Texas county. These boards were charged with the responsibility of set-

ting all property at its full value—as residential or commercial property or as land used for agricultural purposes. Taxes could then be levied on this accurately assessed property according to the needs of the taxing entities.

It sounded good, but it hasn't worked. The biggest problem is that the people on the appraisal boards are appointed, not elected. They are not accountable to the taxpayers. So now we have a new, faceless bureaucracy to deal with. It amounts to taxation without representation.

My opponent has been on both sides of this issue, first supporting the bill in the legislature—then doing an about-face and calling it bad legislation after it was passed.

The Peveto Bill, though well-intentioned, has created problems which *must* be dealt with in the next legislature and as your next Lt. Governor, I will do just that. If you have any thoughts on this subject, please write me at 1213 W. 34th, Austin, 78705.

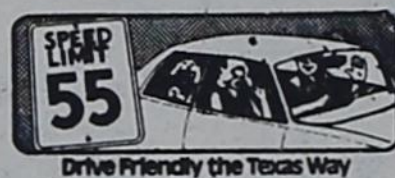

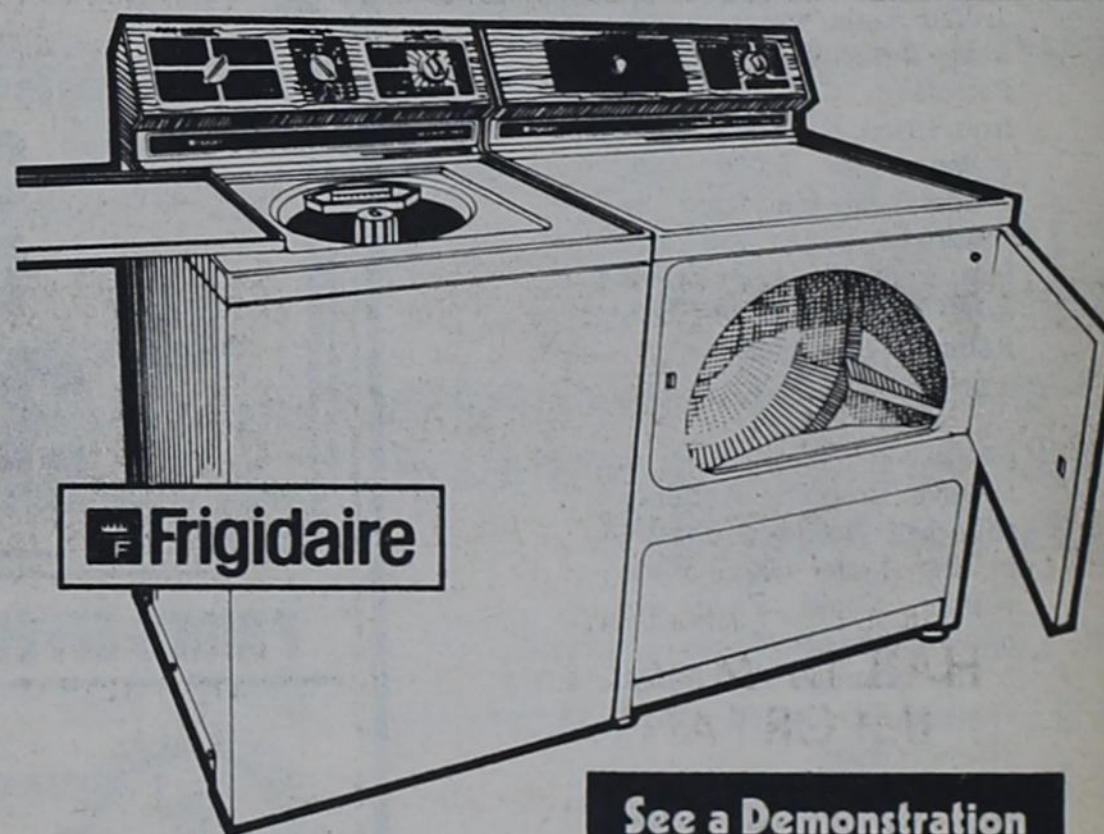

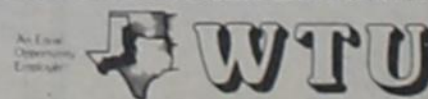

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 2, 1982

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

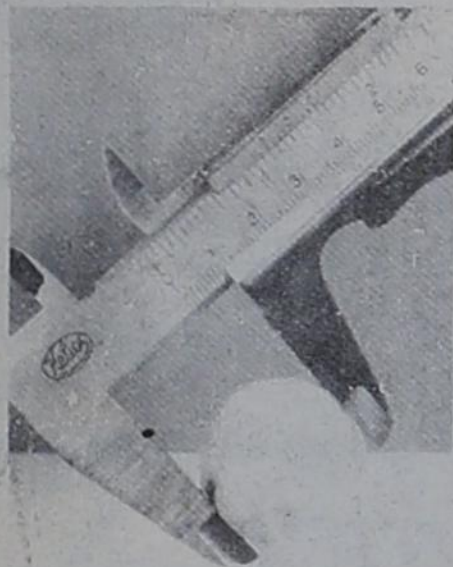
"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

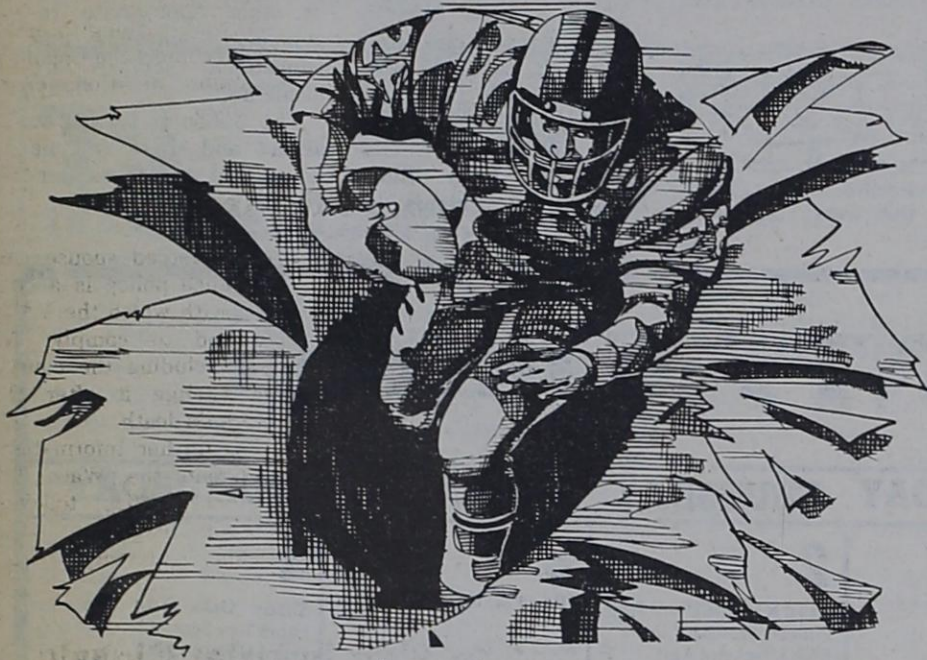

Deadline Near For All-Risk Wheat Ins

September 15 is the last date on which applications will be accepted for All-Risk insurance policies on 1983-crop wheat. All-Risk Cros Insurance Field Operations Director F.W. "Ted" Crouch, Jr. says that a list of local agents who offer the insurance can be obtained by contacting the county ASCS office.

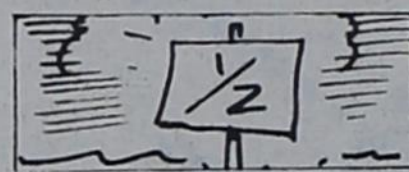
Crouch says that the number of applications

received to date and the interest expressed by wheat growers suggests that the amount of insurance in force will be a record high. "One major reason," Crouch notes, "is the continuing increase in crop production costs. Many wheat growers simply do not have the necessary cash reserves or additional borrowing capability to take a chance on losing the

money that they will have invested in their crops."

"Another reason," the insurance official contends, "is the reduced cost of purchasing insurance." The federal government, in an effort to encourage participation in the program, pays up to 30% of the cost of the protection. Anticipated sign-up also is expected to be higher because a growing number of

lenders are requiring or suggesting that borrowers carry at least enough coverage to provide for repayment of production loans.
