Jury deadlocks in Montalvo case

Second trial likely to be conducted in adjoining county

After a full day of deliberation and a hung jury Thursday, District Judge George M. Thurmond declared a mistrial in the case against Joe Montalvo.

The Precinct 4 Kinney County commissioner was facing charges dealing with theft and misappropriation of highway guard rails.

"My client has always contended that he didn't do anything wrong," said Rogelio Munoz, Montalvo's attorney.

"It was up to the jury to decide what the facts were and they couldn't agree on the facts. Mr. talk to them, and then we'll just figure out where Montalvo still contends that he didn't violate the law in any respect," he added.

Stafford said she has addressed concerns of being a working mother.

"I would do the same as any other working mom, I would take

my baby to the baby sitter if my husband was at work.'

Stafford comes from a law enforcement family.

"My father, brothers, and my husband are currently in the law enforcement field," she said.

Stafford works as a legal assistant and administrator in the Kinney County Attorney's Office.

"I have an extensive work history in the field of both criminal and civil law," she said. "I have had prior law experience working for a private law firm specializing in civil, criminal and business law.

"I am a certified EMT and have worked in the EMS field in Lubbock, Texas."

Stafford is currently taking classes to obtain a paralegal license

"I strongly believe I can use my experience in criminal and civil law to be a fair and impartial justice of the peace," she said.

If elected, Stafford said one of her focuses would be to work with teens in trouble.

"This is not just a job," she said. "I want to make a difference. My objectivity will not be clouded by politics.

"I would appreciate your consideration in electing me for justice of the peace. Your support would be greatly appreciated."

1882, the 19th Infantry was posted to Fort Clark At Fort Clark, 'on January 1, 1883, Lt. French began diaries, which he faithfully maintained for the next 30 years.

Friday, January 29, 1886

Went over to the hospital for usual treatment but Dr. Black was absent, some friends of his having arrived last night; and the treatment had to be postponed. Mail was very late. While waiting for it went down to the store and played billiards with Cunningham and Geary. Mail brought a letter and bundle of papers from home. 




