
He joined the United States Air Force in 1965 and retired in 1985. He also took courses towards an associates degree in business administration.



For the past few years, Texas has wound up on the losing end of the battle for resources to secure our border.

Considering the fact that Texas alone accounts for over 1,200 miles of the U.S.-Mexico border, our state gets particularly shortchanged when it comes to assigning U.S. Border Patrol agents. But things are looking up.

The drawback, she said, is that ei people often try to do too much notion quickly and become sore, tired and discouraged. The key is moderate physical activity on a consubsistent basis.

"You don't have to do strenubrious aerobics or run a marathon to improve your health and fitness," Smith said. "It's good just to become more physically active than you have been.'

And physical activity, Smith points out, is doing anything rather than just sitting. The health benefits can come from accumu-25 lating 30 minutes of physical activity on most days.

"Even a moderate amount of exercise such as brisk walking, bicycling, pushing a baby in a stroller, playing a game of voltime or any place. People can keep leyball, vacuuming the house, or comfortable shoes and a T-shirt digging in the garden will reduce at work or some equipment such problems such as heart disease,
