With primary election time approaching, less than a month away in fact, we might as well make a choice now, if we're going to, in the Democratic gubernatorial race.

There's more interest, as it should be, across Texas in this campaign than any other at this time.

During the past three months, we've mealy-mouthed about the candidates in this race and their strong points, trying to put into print some of the desirable characteristics, as we saw them, about each of the four leading candidates, those who are given a "chance" of making one of the top two spots and thus the run-off, which is scheduled for June.

Incumbent Governor Preston Smith, seeking a third term, is a resident of the High Plains--Lubbock. From an area standpoint, this is definitely his long suit. As desirable as that fact is, though, it is not enough to overcome his two-term tenure in office. Surely, those two terms have been long enough for him to get all his ideas across which were good for this Great State and its citizens. His time in office should have been sufficient for him to implement his best programs. That makes us want to look around for another candidate, with all due respect and appreciation for Preston Smith and his political success. While we think he's too closely linked to the Sharpstown trouble, we probably wouldn't cast our May 6 vote for him if the stock scandal had never come to the surface.

Smith is a good man, a most successful state politician; he has focused attention on our section of the state. Still . . .

Ben Barnes, with a great political ring to his double initial name, has never been one of our favorite political people. It's our personal feeling that BB is too closely tied in with the "in" group in the state capital. This will, we figure, keep him from bringing about the kind of change which is needed in our state leadership.

Barnes, while still youthful from a political standpoint, has been groomed too long for the office he now seeks or another high one. There's nothing wrong with that as such, of course, but his success up to now has been almost too easily come by.

Also, wasn't he the lieutenant governor and the presiding officer of the State Senate when the stock scandal broke and hasn't he been linked to it also, at least indirectly?

Barnes is marked off our list of gubernatorial candidates with the full knowledge that he now appears to have the inside track at the governor's chair.

The smart money is on Barnes, it seems from here. The people who really have their minds made up about who will be the next governor of Texas think Barnes is it.

The Texas political machine is difficult to beat and Barnes has the backing of that machine. Nonetheless, Barnes, like Smith, is marked off our list.

Mrs. Frances Farenthold, the state representative from Corpus Christi, is probably the most deserving candidate in the race. She's been working in the legislature, telling the citizens of Texas reform was needed in the state political setup.

Mrs. Farenthold was saying this back when it wasn't especially popular to do so.

We think Mrs. Farenthold would make a fine governor for Texas. The state could do a lot worse and we appreciate her for the way she thinks.

If a "change" is needed in the state's top elective post, certainly Mrs. Farenthold would provide that.

However, the May 6 Demo primary ballot will instruct us to "vote for one."

That leaves Dolph Briscoe, the Uvalde banker-rancher as our choice in the race.

Since he's not now a part of the state's political make-up, Briscoe, too, will bring needed change to the governor's chair. His background as an agricultural leader among other things on a state and national level makes him qualified for the office.

While the literature we've read doesn't openly say so, Briscoe was given more credit than any other one individual for the successful program for the eradication of screwworms in Texas and the Southwest. To the folks in towns, this doesn't mean much, perhaps.

But to the livestock people, the benefits are untold and this, in turn, is highly beneficial to all the people of the state. Some livestock people will tell you that a man who can put through

Thieves Hit Three Farms

Thieves struck three farms in the Bovina area Thursday night, according to Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter.

A battery and instrument panel were taken from an irrigation well motor on the farm of Dave Thompson northeast of town. Tools, a water can and chains

were stolen from a truck owned by Birkelbach Machine and Pump Co. The truck was parked on the Wilbur Charles farm east of town. Also taken that night was a plow part from the J. D. Kirkpatrick farm east of Bovina.

Law officials believe the same person, or persons, was involved in all three incidents, said Minter.

Two calves had to be destroyed following an accident on the 300 block of Third Street about 11:20 p.m. Monday, according to City Marshal Ronald Mitchell who investigated the incident.

Greg Hromas of Bovina, driver of a 1964 Ford sedan, struck the calves when they ran across the street in front of his vehicle, said Mitchell. The calves, although not killed in the collision, had to be destroyed. The car sustained about \$350 worth of damages, said Mitchell, and the calves were valued at approximately \$250 or \$300.

New Stallion Station Under Construction

A new commercial stallion station is being constructed half a mile west of Bovina on FM Road 2290 by Robert Read and Harold Hawkins.

When the facility is completed, possibly in June, it will become the home of Monumental, a Quarter Horse stallion owned by Read and Hawkins, and Henrijan, a Thoroughbred stallion, leased by them from C. E. Trimble.

The horses are presently standing at Read's place two miles west and half a mile south of town.

Construction on the stallion station began this week, according to Read and he hopes to have it in use by June.

A concrete block building 36 by 84 feet in size will be the main feature of the new facilities. The building will include an office as well as space for three stallions.

Read and Hawkins plan to add another stallion later to go with the two they're now using.

A total of 16 pens will be constructed adjoining the building for visiting mares.

Contractor for the building is Sherrill Lumber Co. The pens will be constructed by Larry

Scott, Birkelbach Machine and Pump has the contract for drilling the water well for the facilities.

Read says the need for the new facilities was created by the popularity of Monumental, whose pedigree reads like a "who's who" of racing Quarter Horses. This is the second year for the partners to stand Monumental and Read says he expects to breed 60 or 70 mares this year. The Trimble horse was acquired just this year. He was standing in California when he was purchased by Trimble.

Horsemen have brought mares to Monumental from as far away as Kentucky and Kansas.

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12:01 A.M. Time For Change-Over

Direct distance dialing begins in Bovina at 12:01 a.m. Sunday morning.

Bovina customers of General Telephone Company will be able to dial station-to-station toll calls completely automatically when the new electronic telephone system here is put into operation at that time.

Complete instructions for the service, including an interim Bovina directory reflecting the complete change of numbers, were received by customers this week.

Construction on the unique \$370,000 computerized telephone system here began in June of last year. The new system, the only one of its type in Texas, features an electronic office with a computer as the center, according to Rad Richardson, General's district manager.

Cost of the building was approximately \$120,000, which included a complicated air conditioning system needed to take care of the equipment. Cost of the equipment installed in the building was in the neighborhood of \$250,000.

One feature of the electronic system is a 15-second time out on the completion of dialing. If the dialing sequence is delayed, a busy tone will interrupt and dialing must start again.

To use the Direct Distance Dialing, one dials the access code "1", area code if different from your own, and number. Most telephones in the United States and Canada are accessible.

County Has Anti-Trash Campaign

Parmer County Commissioners Court launched a campaign during a regular session Monday to control the practice of using ditches of county roads for dumpgrounds.

Raymond Trelder, commissioner from the Lazbuddie precinct, says the problem is becoming severe in the county and the commissioners court is beginning action which it is hoped will eliminate it.

People found guilty of throwing trash of any kind in a county right-of-way will be fined from \$15 to \$200, Trelder says. Dumpgrounds are available to the public in the four communities of the county, he points out.

Also a problem in the rights-of-way are electric fences. These create a safety hazard when county personnel mow the right-of-way.

There have been recent instances of dead animals being deposited in rights-of-way and of sewerage being run in ditches, Trelder points out.

Cook's Corner

BARBECUE BRISKET
4 lbs. beef brisket
1 pkg. onion soup mix
Esta Lee says beef brisket will work, but she usually uses any cut of roast.

Sprinkle onion soup mix over beef and wrap securely in heavy duty foil. Bake 8 to 10 hours at 200 degrees. Another trick she uses is to put the beef in the oven at night and let it bake until morning.

Shred or chop into small pieces and put juices and meat in 4-quart pot. Add 1-18 oz. jar of Kraft barbecue sauce and simmer for about 20 minutes.

Esta Lee says this freezes real well, so she usually cooks two or three roasts at a time and keeps some on hand in the freezer for unexpected company. Will make approximately 25 sandwiches.

BUTTERMILK PIE
5 eggs
3 c. sugar
1 c. buttermilk
1 stick oleo
2 T. flour
1 T. lemon juice

1 t. vanilla
Mix all ingredients well and pour into two unbaked pie shells. Bake at 300 degrees until golden on top or until it passes the knife test.

RHUBARB CUSTARD PIE
2 egg yolks
2 T. flour
2 1/2 c. cut rhubarb
1 1/2 c. sugar
1 T. butter or oleo

Arrange rhubarb in pie shell. Mix sugar with flour and add beaten egg yolks and butter. Pour over rhubarb. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees) for 12 minutes, reduce to 350 degrees for 25 minutes. When about half done, stir lightly. Cover with meringue.

BARBECUE SAUCE
3/4 c. vinegar
1/2 c. sugar
1/2 c. Worcestershire sauce
2 t. pepper
2 c. catsup
3/4 c. salad oil or shortening
2 2/3 c. minced onion
dash hot sauce if desired
liquid smoke to suit taste
Brown onion in shortening while mixing other ingredients. Mix all together and simmer.

Your firmness and examples will furnish a bridge over which youthful rebellion travels into rich and satisfying experiences in personal religious living.
