Planning on Bull Town Days 1972 is well underway, Tom Bonds, who will serve as general chairman for the second consecutive year, tells us.

Bonds is enthused with the early progress which has been made for this year's celebration.

It appears now that carnival rides will be here for the three-day event. It's possible that the rides will be in town a few days ahead of time. This will help, if it comes about, to put the community in a holiday atmosphere ahead of the actual celebration.

A verbal deal has been made for a carnival which has a Plainview base to be here for LTD. When we say carnival, we mean carnival-type rides, not booth-type gimmicks.

The carnival rides which are slated to be here won't be as numerous as some which have been here during past celebrations. However, they should be adequate and add much to the celebration. The rides operate on a percentage with a respectable part of the money staying here and going toward paying celebration expenses.

Carnival rides, or the lack of them, have created more than enough worries for LTD general chairman in years gone by. After the rides are advertised and promised to the people, they may or may not show up. It's when they don't that the problems come about. In the first place, there's the loss of the revenue which has been counted on. In the second place, you have some disappointed people and many of them are the younger type. It's double-tough to disappoint young folks.

Nevermind what's happened in the past, it's this year that we're worried about now. And everything possible has been done to see that carnival rides will be on hand for this year's LTD. If something happens and they're not here, it's just another bad deal --- not the end of the world.

Most everything else is progressing smoothly, Bonds tells us. We'll do our best to stay up on the celebration publicity-wise, between now and its scheduled dates of August 17-18-19. Those are the dates, incidentally. It could be that you have out-of-town friends, relatives, acquaintances or what-have-you who would be interested in knowing. Might be a good idea to get the word to them.

People are one of the most necessary ingredients of successful celebration. We need to see that they're here. If we're going to do some entertaining, we need plenty of folks to entertain.

Now that the wheat's all cut, wonder why a good rain, without hail, wouldn't be a good thing?

Not only do we need the moisture, but relief from this below-the-Caprock 100 degree heat would be nice, too. It isn't natural for the Plains of Texas to have a 100 degree heat wave of several days duration, is it?

Wind and sand, we understand, but heat!

That's for people who live in other parts of the world.

Thanks to Daylight Savings Time, among other things, most of the baseball and softball games which are played at "night" in Bovina are played without the use of the lighting system. More innings of the summer sport are played before the lights are turned on than after.

There's nothing wrong with that, we guess, but it's kinda ironic. Without the lighted field, we'd probably think we didn't have a place to conduct the programs.

That's not the only thing that DST fouls up, however.

For a long time, we were of the opinion that something could be done to exempt this area at least from Daylight Saving Times. Now, we're about to decide we were wrong again.

There's been an old story going around which said that DST was invented by an Indian who cut a strip off one end of his blanket and sewed it on to the other end to make it longer.

We believe the blanket idea would work better than the time change.

Ninth Annual Celebration --

Planning Underway For Bull Town Days

Mrs. Cap Naegle has been named chairman of the 1972 Bull Town Days Queen Contest, according to an announcement this week from Tom Bonds, general chairman of the celebration.

The queen contest, in which those entered compete on horseback, is one of the highlights of the three-day celebration, scheduled this year for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 17-18-19.

Deadline for entering and rules of the contest will be announced soon.

This year's celebration will be the ninth consecutive LTD event.

Arrangements have been made with a Plainview-based carnival rides firm to be here for the celebration, Bonds says. The rides consist of three for adults plus others for small fry.

One of the opening events of the celebration, the queens contest is scheduled for Thursday

night. It will be at the roping arena east of town.

Details on other parts of the celebration are now being worked out, Bonds says. A complete schedule will be announced soon, possibly as early as next week.

The free, community-wide barbecue is again expected to headline the celebration. Thousands of people attend the free barbecue which is served down-

town and features choice beef. It will be Friday night. Mutt Graham and R. L. Hopingardner are in charge of preparing the beef.

Hat bands to advertise the celebration are scheduled to be distributed in the next few days. They'll be available to all who wish to wear them to bring attention to the celebration.

The celebration has proven to be a highly-popular community event during its eight year history.

Sponsors are Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agricultural and Bovina Roping Club. Bonds is serving as general chairman for the second consecutive year. Lweis McDaniel is co-chairman.

Loses Leg --

Stone Injured In Accident

Louis Stone of Bovina lost a leg in a farm machinery accident early Wednesday morning of last week.

Stone, who is employed by Oakley Stevenson, was preparing to run a rod weeder at Stevenson's farm east of town. When he kicked at the machinery to knock some dirt loose, the spinning rod caught his pants, drawing his leg into the weeder.

His son, Jessie, was in the field with him at the time of the accident about 8 a.m.

The younger Stone and Earl Stevenson, who was passing the farm shortly after the incident, rushed Stone to the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona where he was in surgery most of the morning.

Doctors amputated his leg just below the hip.

Some difficulty arose in obtaining blood donors for Stone because of his rare type. Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis was contacted by Billie Suderth, veteran's service officer here, and officials there offered to supply necessary donors.

Stone has been employed by Stevenson the past several years.

His condition was reported as improving as of early this week. Barring complications, he is expected to be put on crutches the latter part of the week.

DPS Predicts 58 Fatalities

The Texas Department of Public Safety estimates that 58 lives will be lost in traffic accidents during this year's 4th of July Holiday. "Operation Motocycle" will begin at 6 p.m. Friday, and will run until midnight, Tuesday, July 4.

Major C. W. Bell, regional commander of the Lubbock Region of the Department of Public Safety states, "All available personnel will be used in an effort to keep the highway deaths at a minimal. We will be on the lookout for violations of the traffic laws, especially we will be alert for the speeding driver and the drinking driver."

Speed and DWI are the two largest contributors of traffic fatalities, Major Bell reminds all motorists that "each driver is responsible for keeping control of his vehicle in order to avoid colliding with another vehicle, a pedestrian or any fixed object."

"No one wants to be responsible for the death of another. Let's make our streets and highways as safe as possible. We all could drive twice as safe as we usually drive, so let's make an all-out effort and make this 4th of July a safe, happy holiday. Not a holiday that turns into a mourning." "Do your part, 'Drive Friendly,' the Texas way."

Of great interest and hope is the manufacturer's claim that the new antibiotic clears up infections such as bronchitis, urinary tract infections, ear infections, laryngitis, tonsillitis, etc.

Fortunately, the new antibiotic is inexpensive, and smaller amounts are required than with other antibiotics. One hopes the U.S. cost will also be low, in contrast to past practices of the U.S. drug industry, which has often charged excessive prices for drugs available in other countries for a fraction of the U.S. price. But whatever the price, Anoxil appears a significant medical advance.

Water Safety Rules Endorsed

July Fourth is near and hot weather has arrived. According to Herb Evans, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Friona, this means that water safety should be on people's minds.

Any place that has swimming and/or boating should have a safety station. This station can be simple . . . a post in the ground with about 40 feet of small rope fastened to an inner-tube or plastic gallon bottle, and a long branch or pole. A sign promoting safety should be placed advantageously. Each person should know what to do with the equipment.

Some basic rules to know when around water are:
Learn to swim, never swim alone, never dive into strange waters, swim only in supervised areas, hang on to your boat if it swamps or capsizes, everyone should wear life jackets in boats.

The application of these rules, along with knowing how to rescue someone, and knowing how to give artificial respiration, can

mean the difference in life and death, according to Evans. For a safety poster that should be at all water locations, contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Friona.

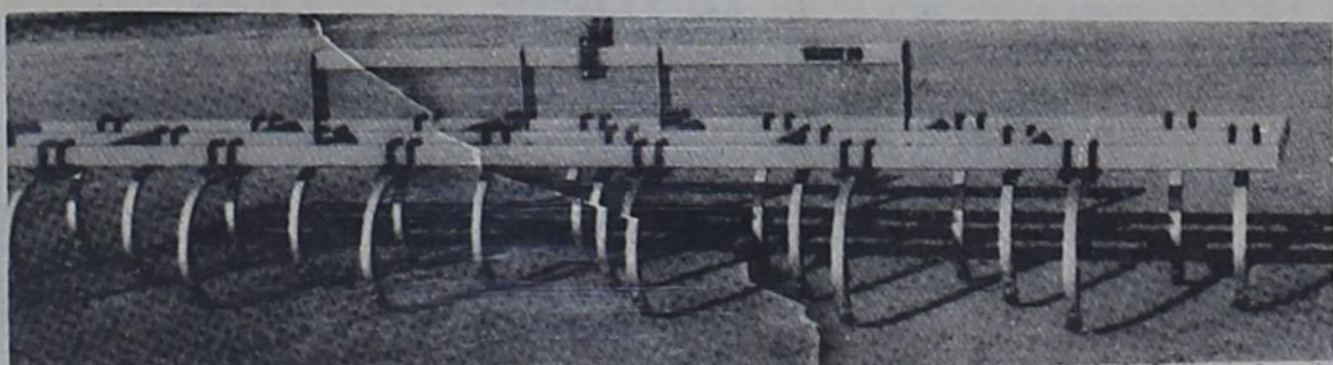
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
