In the first place, there's the loss of the revenue which has been counted on. Nevermind what's happened in the past, it's this year that we're worried about now. And everything possible has been done to see that carnival rides will be on hand for this year's BTD. If something happens and they're not here, it's just another bad deal --- not the end of the world.

Water Safety

Rules Endorsed

Any place that has swimming and/or boating should have a safety station. This station can be simple . . . a post in the ground with about 40 feet of small rope fastened to an innertube or plastic gallon bottle, and a long branch or pole. A sign promoting safety should be placed advantageously. Each person should know what to do with the equipment.

Some basic rules to know when around water are:

Learn to swim, never swim alone, never dive into strange waters, swim only in supervised areas, hang on to your boat if it swamps or capsizes, everyone should wear life jackets in boats.


