Just one year after losing a re-election bid, Ralph Gonzalez earned his fourth term on the City Council Saturday and incumbents had successful bids as Brackettville had its highest voter turnout in six

There were 462 citizens who cast ballots in this year's election, a 14 percent increase over last year's turnout of 404 voters. It was the highest turnout since 1992 when 487 ballots were cast. In the Place 4 race, Gonzalez garnered 184 votes, while Martha E. Ward McDonald had 143 and Martin T. Luna Jr. finished with 65. Mindy Slubar and Alex Longoria, both write-in candidates, had and Alex Longoria, both write-in candidates, had 38 and 12 votes, respectively. 38 and 12 votes, respectively. Schools battle the equivalent of what could be expected at home if you left your refrigerator door open for several minutes - the
cold air escapes and the milk and other items become warmer. In schools, though, the doors might be open for a couple of hours. Dairy MAX has a goal of eliminating the problem of warm milk at schools it serves by metter of 2000. More than just a matter of
what tastes better, colder temperawhat tastes better, colder tempera-
tures assure the safety of milk.
ministration is recommendin states adopt a regulation that 41 degrees not be exceeded as the serving temperature for certain
foods.
As a result, Dairy MAX is providing several different methods of serving colder milk, including "milk barrel" and forced aircoolers, curtains.
"We appreciate the opportunity to be a part of the Dairy MAX program," said Honey Bee Gomez, Brackett
vice coordinator.
"This kind of innovation
