#### Seminar set for estate planning

The process of planning for the final disposition of your life's work will be discussed during a public meeting on Monday, May 18, starting at 7 p.m. at the Service Club on Fort Clark Springs.

The session will provide a basic overview of estate planning and an update on federal estate transfer taxes, as changed by the recently passed Taxpayer Relief Act of

Guest speakers will be Jose Pena, associate professor and extension economist-management of the Texas Agricultural Extension service, and Kinney County Attorney Tully Shahan.

The process of estate transfer requires careful planning and preparation. Anyone with business or personal assets and responsibilities for children or parents should have an estate plan.

If you don't plan the distribution of your assets after death, will the distribution be fair, and according to your desires?

Estate planning is as much for your family as it is for your peace of mind.

An estate plan focuses on planning now for the financial security of your family, identifying those who ought to get the assets you own at death, protecting those assets against taxes and other death costs, keeping the business in the family, and providing for the care of your children.

There are a number of choices to make your plan work. They might include a will, gifts, trusts, incorporation, and life insurance. These choices will be covered at the seminar.

If you have minor children, it is important to choose a guardian in case both you and your spouse pass on or become disabled at the same time.

The key to building a strong estate plan is to design it just for you and your family. Federal inheritance taxes, probate costs and other fees may erode the value of an estate and create a financial burden for your survivors.

The Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997 caused many changes to the estate transfer tax laws.

## Gonzalez elected to fourth council term

Incumbents successful in re-election bids

Just one year after losing a re-election bid, Ralph Gonzalez earned his fourth term on the City Council Saturday and incumbents had successful bids as Brackettville had its highest voter turnout in six

There were 462 citizens who cast ballots in this year's election, a 14 percent increase over last year's turnout of 404 voters. It was the highest turnout since 1992 when 487 ballots were cast.

In the Place 4 race, Gonzalez garnered 184 votes, while Martha E. Ward McDonald had 143 and Martin T. Luna Jr. finished with 65. Mindy Slubar and Alex Longoria, both write-in candidates, had 38 and 12 votes, respectively.

Gonzalez, who has previously served six years on the City Council, fills the seat that has been vacant since Tino Gomez resigned earlier this year.

Mayor Carmen M. Berlanga was elected to her fourth term. She had 261 votes while her opponent,

## Rubella concerns officials

State health officials are concerned that rubella could become more widespread in Texas.

Some 35 cases in nine counties have been confirmed in the state this year compared with 12 cases in all of 1997 and eight cases in 1996.

Most rubella illness is mild, but it can cause birth defects, miscarriages and stillbirths if contracted by pregnant women, especially in the first trimester of pregnancy.

More than 7,000 cases of rubella have been recorded in Mexico this year, including 2,400 cases in Coahuila, Chihuahua, Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas, Mexican states that border Texas. Mexico City has recorded 1,164 cases.

The first 19 of Texas' 35 cases were in a federal Immigration and Naturalization Service detention center in South Texas.




