

## Kinney County: Land of Heroes

A day or so before this Memorial Day, several volunteers will move silently and reverently through the Seminole Indian Scout Cemetery, solemnly placing an American flag on the grave of each veteran scout. They do it each year, because they care.

A flag once flew over the cemetery but, I'm told by a scout descendant, someone kept stealing it and the group that maintains the cemetery could not afford to continue replacing the flag. So now they wait until an appropriate time and place out the individual flags.

When Lt. Francis Henry French first met the scouts, he referred to them as "plantation darkies you! who afford me a great deal of amusement."

Over time the genuine humanity of the scouts caught the young lieutenant and his diary reflects his changed opinion of their worth with reflections such as, "Most of them have fine forms and all are roes." strong healthy men. From plantation darkies to old warriors, quite a transformation. I know how it happened, because my experience has been that the Seminoles are the most authentically decent people I have ever had the good fortune to call my friends.

There is a poem etched on an obscure monument Gettysburg National Battlefield. It has been my favorite since I was a boy. It fits Memorial Day and it fits the Scouts.

As has become my custom, I will go to the Scout
