# Entities seek cloud seeding in county

Local officials met Monday Kinney County because we are a with representatives from two different entities hoping to bring cloud seeding to Kinney County.

The Edwards Aquifer Authority (EAA) and the Texas Border Weather Modification Association (TBWMA) both want to include Kinney County in cloud seeding programs, but both groups have hurdles to overcome.

The TBWMA is lacking funding, while the EAA has been delayed because of protests filed in opposition to its permit application.

The estimated cost for Kinney County to participate in the TBWMA's program is estimated at \$40,000. A portion of those funds would have to come from

TBWMA currently consists of Val Verde and Maverick counties. Its permit was approved for the target areas of Val Verde, Maverick, Kinney and Terrell counties, and operational areas of Pecos, Sutton, Crockett, Edwards, Uvalde, Zavala and Dimmitt counties. The permit is for a four year period.

"What we're attempting to do is to get it started this year," said Cauthorn, also the chairman of TBWMA. "Hopefully, with the help of the citizens of Kinney County or the Edwards Aquifer Authority, we can get it up and running by the first of July. # New jail proposed Detention facility could provide new jobs

Serving the communities of Brackettville, Fort Clark Springs, Spofford and Kinney County

A Massachusetts-based company has made a preliminary proposal to build a 500-bed detention facility in Kinney County

Tom Rapone, chief operating officer of CiviGenics, discussed the proposal last week at a public meeting at the County Courthouse.

'The comments and questions were positive," Rapone said in a telephone interview Wednesday. "There were some concerns about public safety, but most of the questions surrounded the economic benefits of a facility and the jobs it would create."

CiviGenics owns correctional related facilities in he added. 16 states, including Texas. The company operates ties.

"We are well established in the Texas marketplace," said Rapone, who served 10 years as a U.S. marshal and is a retired secretary of the Massachusetts Department of Public Safety in charge of statewide police services and corrections.

The proposed detention facility would be completely funded by CiviGenics. Rapone said he hopes to have a written proposal to the Kinney County Commissioners Court within two to three weeks.

"It's certainly not a done deal, but with all of the positive comments we feel we should take it to the next stage, and we anticipate doing that."

Rapone said the proposed facility would create between 70 and 85 full-time positions. Basic correctional officers begin at \$8 an hour, after a probationary period, and receive a full benefits pack-

"We would be looking to hire everybody locally,"

Rapone said the company has not yet looked at detention facilities in Limestone and Ector coun- possible locations for the proposed detention facility, but added that it would not be located within the city

"We'll begin to look at sites once we get past the preliminary proposal," he said. "Once a decision is made, it would take us about 15 months to build the facility."

AUSTIN - Texans' most beloved reptile, the Texas Horned Lizard or "horny toad," is thriving in the western half of the state, but may be struggling in the eastern half, according to the results of a citizen inventory effort conducted in 1997.

The first annual report of the Texas Horned Lizard Watch, a volunteer monitoring effort coordinated by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD), also reports that the likelihood of encounless where fire ants are present.





The Brackettville Rotary Club was chartered on March 24, 1945. The group currently has 16 mem-









"We filed our permit application and we had to run notices three times during the month of February," said Rick Illgner, a special projects coordinator with the EAA.

"There's a 30-day window to protest," he said. "During that 30 days, there were 268 persons that essentially protested the permit. That calls for a hearing.

Of those 268 voicing opposition, 74 citizens from Edwards protested the permit application.

"We're negotiating with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission - they're the ones that issue the permit - on the type, the place and the conditions of the hearing," Illgner said. "We hope to have that process taken care of in the next 60 days, but it's still going to be four months before we're finished."

EAA has already budgeted \$500,000 for the project, and is not requesting funding from Kinney County this year.

"We budgeted \$500,000, but the expectation is that half of those funds would be reimbursed by the state, and so we would show \$250,000 as a revenue," Illgner said. "It would not cost (Kinney County) a single thing for this year."

Local officials questioned if Kinney County's participation in the program would extend EAA's jurisdictional boundaries.

"The addition of Kinney, Real and Edwards counties in January was simply to complete the suite of those geographical areas which contribute to the Edwards Aquifer," Illgner said.



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
