

# Bonds, Mrs. Cervantez Receive Citizen Awards

Mrs. Pearl Cervantez and Tom Bonds were recognized as outstanding citizens of Bovina Thursday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet held in Bovina Schools cafeteria.

Mrs. Cervantez is coordinator of Bovina Neighborhood Center, which operates under the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Bonds is a long-time Gulf Oil Corp. distributor here.

The "Woman of the Year" was announced by Mrs. Leon Ware, the 1972 recipient, who said Mrs. Cervantez' motto "... could well be do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, at all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can."

Mrs. Cervantez, a native of Tucumcari, N.M., moved to Bovina with her family when she was one month old. A graduate

of Bovina High School, she was the first of her race to receive a diploma from the high school here. Her hobbies include crocheting and yard work. She is married to George Cervantez and has one son.

Mrs. Cervantez was chosen Woman of the Year of the Diocese of the Council of Catholic Women and in 1964 she was a delegate from Amarillo to the national DCCW convention in Washington, D.C. She was president of the Planning Deany

of Plainview in 1964 and was in charge of public relations of the Deanery in 1962. Mrs. Cervantez became coordinator of the Bovina Neighborhood Center in 1968.

She is a member of the Panhandle Coordinator Child Care Center, a member of the board of directors of the Amarillo Top of Texas TB and Respiratory Disease Association, a member of the Committee of Central Planning Comprehensive for

Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center in Amarillo, a member of the Family Living Program in Parmer County, a member of the board of Texas Panhandle Community Action Cooperative of Amarillo and coordinator of the Joint Action in Community Service for Job Corps which has had six graduates from the Bovina area.

"Mrs. Cervantez has worked with and helped a total of 737 families with everything from adult education classes to as-

sisting local FFA students in purchasing animals for class projects," Mrs. Ware said.

In addition to the plaque, Mrs. Cervantez received a dozen long-stemmed red roses.

Bonds was introduced as the 1973 "Man of the Year" by Bob Fillpot, recipient of the award last year.

A graduate of Bovina High School, Bonds has served two terms as a director of the chamber, is past president of the Jay-

cees and a former city councilman.

He is a member of the Highway 60 Association, Farwell Masonic Lodge No. 977, a 32nd degree Mason, Shriner and honorary Future Farmer of America. Bonds has worked with the Boy Scout organization in Bovina, sponsored Little League teams, and is past president of the Lions Club. He was a member of committees responsible for organizing a bank here and

the Bovina clinic drive. Bonds served as chairman of the annual community celebration, Bull Town Days, for two years and was named the chamber's Good Guy in September 1972. He is married and the father of two children.

The plaques presented the honorees this year were made by former industrial arts teacher and football coach of Bovina High School, Gib Hough, now of Ruidoso, N.M.

Now 38, which is not a bad age for a young man, he attended high school in Post and then went to junior college in San Angelo on a football scholarship. After completing his eligibility at Angelo, he transferred, again on a football scholarship, to Sul Ross at Alpine. It was there that he became interested in baseball, the sport which has done a good job of paying him for the past several years. At that time, Sul Ross had one of the top baseball programs among Texas colleges and players there had the opportunity to be looked at by big league scouts.

We asked Uncle Mink and Wink this week if they realized that Norm was a potential major league baseball player when he was a boy.

They admitted they didn't. "He didn't play baseball, only softball, until he went to Sul Ross," one of them pointed out. That's true . . . and interesting, but it doesn't say much for our organized boys' baseball programs as training ground for future stars.

Norm evidently is blessed with some of the wit and humor which his twin uncles have because the aforementioned story says he's interested in getting into baseball telecasting and broadcasting when his playing days are over. And he is given a good chance to do that.

Mrs. Green was transferred to the Lubbock hospital Sunday. She is reported to be in good condition, suffering minor injuries.

Mr. and Mrs. Green are employed by Bovina Schools as custodians. Schilling is a farmer.

Green remained in the intensive care unit of the hospital as of Tuesday morning. His condition was reported to be slightly improved.

### Blakely Boosts 'Love, Laughter'

Amidst a setting of Bovina-grown products, Dr. James Blakely of Wharton, nationally known humorist and professor, told those attending the 13th annual Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet Thursday night that "someday we'll be grazing in greener pastures, living on love and laughter."

About 230 people crowded into Bovina Schools cafeteria to hear Dr. Blakely and recognize Bovina's "Man and Woman of the Year."

They were served a meal featuring charcoal broiled rib-eye steaks and were entertained by Miss Linda Marcom at the piano.

Master of ceremonies was outgoing chamber president, Don Spring. He also introduced Dr. Blakely.

New officers for the year were introduced, Mrs. Robert Read, president; Edward Isaac, vice president; Mrs. A. L. Nuttall, secretary; and Jerry Wright, manager.

Wright introduced out of town guests following the invocation by Father John Coppinger, pastor of St. Ann's Catholic Church. Rev. Howard Marcom, pastor of Bovina United Methodist Church, pronounced the benediction.

Out of town guests registered from Lazbuddie, Farwell, Friona, Clovis, Muleshoe, Hereford, Dimmitt and Amarillo.

Carrying out the theme, "Bovina, My Home Town," locally grown agricultural products, such as vegetables, milo and cotton along with replicas of cowchips decorated the tables. Sketches of churches, schools and other buildings decorated

the walls. Tables were covered with white cloths with yellow runners. A centerpiece of yellow spring flowers decorated the rostrum.

Dr. Blakely evoked spontaneous laughter from his audience time after time while spicing his speech with philosophical points on love and its relationship to the community.

"Love is a spectrum of ingredients with one of the most important being laughter," Dr. Blakely told the audience. Quoting Mark Twain, he said man is the only animal that laughs, or blushes, or has cause to.

He urged those attending to express love for their community because "it will draw interest and pay dividends long after our memory fades away."

Other ingredients of love that Blakely commented on were patience, generosity, courtesy, humility, unselfishness, good temper, kindness and sincerity.

"Love is patience. Those of you who are patient enough to go along with your chamber have a love for your community.

"Love is kindness. Kindness pays dividends because you can get more out of people with love and kindness.

"I think I can play a few more years," said Norm, "but if a job like that opened up, I'd have a tough time turning it down."

Cash's salary for being Detroit's first baseman and one of the top hitters is considered to be in the \$70,000 to \$80,000 range. That might beat farming a little, but it isn't as much as he feels he deserves, the story says.

"Norm isn't really hurting for money. He's in demand in the winter season for speeches and appearances because of his reputation as a humorist. Besides, Norm's 13-week television show last summer carried high ratings and he's all set for a new series in 1973.

He led the Tigers in the home run department last season with a total of 22.

The Cash Brothers are overly modest about the success of their nephew in the baseball world. At the same time, they're proud for him for what he's accomplished and wish him well, just as you'd expect nice uncles to.

Joe Wilson submits the following statistical information concerning the price of fat cattle which he clipped from Wes Izzard's Monday column in The Amarillo Daily News:

---If the price of choice steers had gone up as fast since 1956 as the price of a first class postage stamp, steers would be bringing \$77 per hundred.

---If beef prices had increased as much as medical care, steers would be selling for \$72.34.

---If the rise had been as fast as hourly pay, the figure would be \$80.60.

---Compared to the cost of having a baby, steers would be bringing \$119.13.

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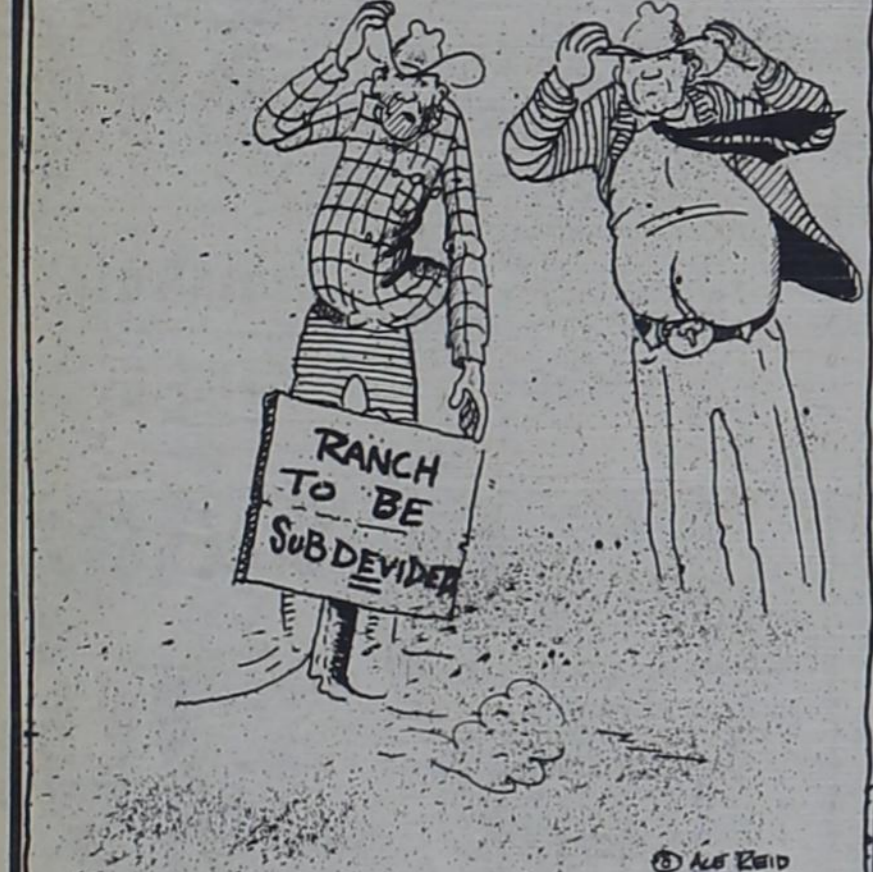

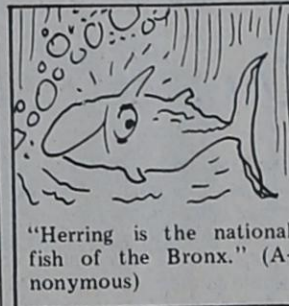
Mrs. Leon Schilling and Mrs. Dan Koelzer reported on the TB clinic which will be held at Bovina Schools on Friday, March 30.

# In a shell

We've heard many good comments about the chamber banquet Thursday night. We enjoyed it tremendously.

Dr. Blakely proved to be most entertaining, the food was delicious, especially the steaks, Donnie Spring was outstanding as master of ceremonies and the decorations were "unique" as Dr. Blakely put it.

It's impossible to mention all the people responsible for making a successful banquet, but it does take a whole bunch of people to make it work as the one Thursday night did.

It's really a treat to see all the men dressed "to the nines." What with all the wild new colors and patterns, the male plumage is once again the more colorful. Think we get so accustomed to seeing the men in their blue jeans and run-over boots that we forget just how handsome they can be.

Would like to digress from our title as "news editor" for awhile and revert to the more familiar one of "farmer's wife."

We don't claim to be an expert on the farm price situation or the market place. But, we are weary of hearing at every hand about how "high" everything is in the grocery store.

Ran across the following item in Sylvia Porter's column in the Ladies Home Journal several months ago and think it is appropriate. Mrs. Porter is a well-known financial and wall street expert.

A reader writes to Mrs. Porter: "Every time we travel abroad we're amazed at how inexpensive the fruits, vegetables and other food items are. We never realized how high food costs in the U. S. really are until we saw the contrast. Just how badly does the U.S. come out in comparison with other nations?"

Mrs. Porter says: "We don't come out 'badly,' we come out best in the world -- no matter what you think you saw. To document the point:

"We in this country spend on average only 16 cents out of each after-tax dollar on food. Food costs in the U.S. are the lowest of any major nation in the world, in terms on the share of our paychecks that we must budget for food -- which is the only truly valid comparison. In Japan and most countries of Western Europe, food takes more than 35 cents out of every consumer dollar; in the Soviet Union the share is more than 50 cents; in India, it's 60 cents.

"And this goes for many of the other basic necessities of life -- including clothes and shelter. As a result, we have a larger share of the money we earn left to spend on goods and services (other than necessities) than people anywhere else in the world."

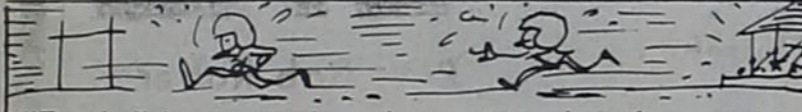
It's our opinion that we hear too much propaganda about how "high" everything is, and it's seldom, if ever, that the farmer's point of view is given equal time.

One thing we do know for sure is that today a tractor without any extras or equipment costs more than a quarter-section of good land did 20 years ago and yet farm prices have just returned to the same level of 20 years ago. And that is just one small indication of what farmers are faced with today.

We have an idea that if some of the businessmen in this country got the same return on their investment a farmer does, we would hear them scream to high heaven about it. We don't know of many business ventures that are as risky as farming.

We also know we can't do justice to explaining the farmer's point of view.

The boss says nevermind all the signs of spring, it's too early to go wading in the creek. Don't know if his wet boots had anything to do with that remark.

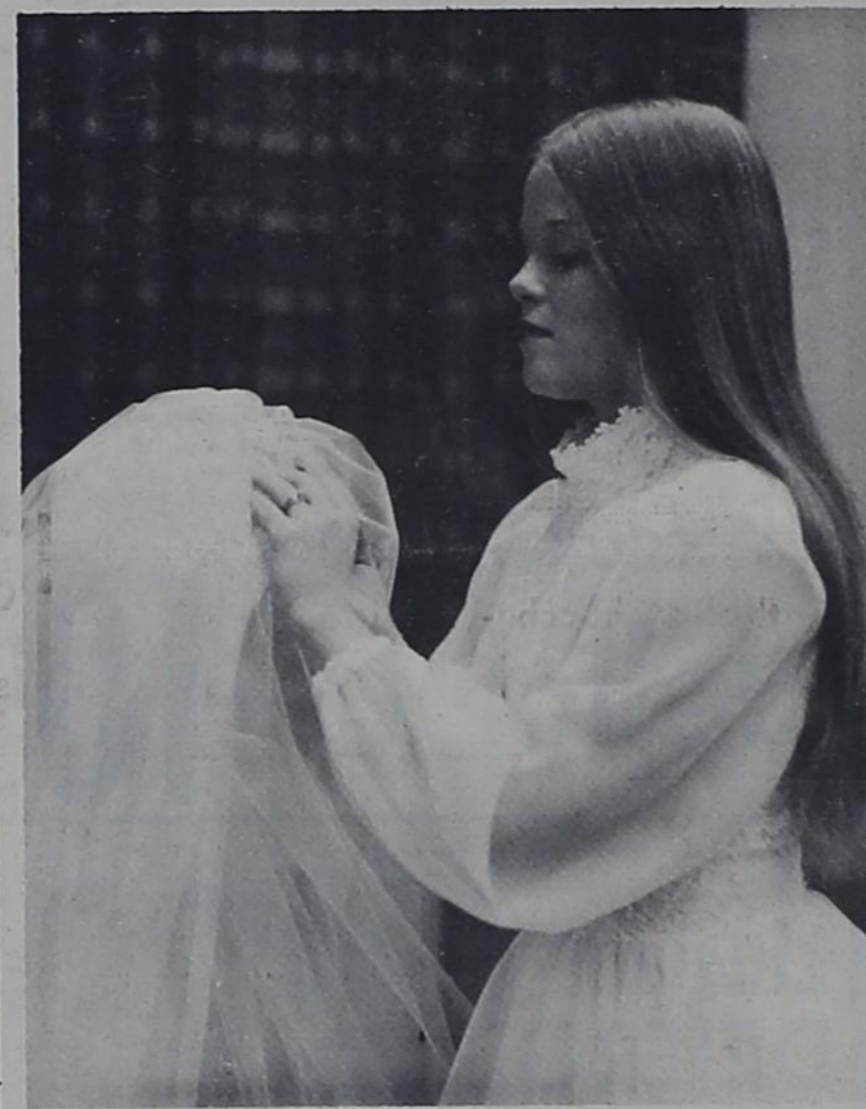
For a short wedding trip, the bride wore an orange print knit dress with orange trim and white accessories.

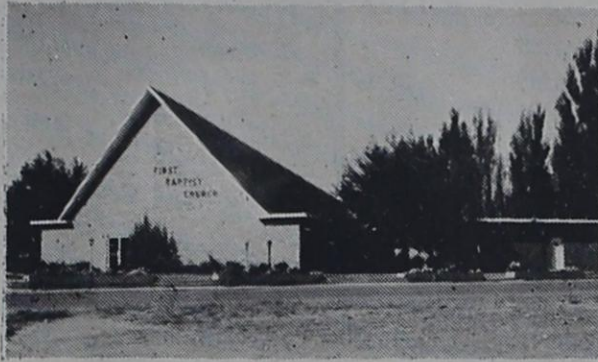
### THE MORE EXCELLENT WAY

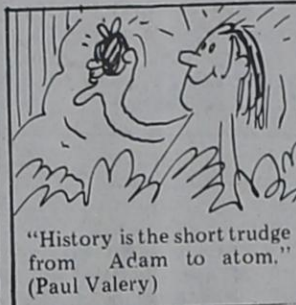
## Jan Kassahn Wins 3rd At Friona Event

Donaldson was installed as president of the 1973-'74 term at a meeting in Friona Monday night. Mrs. Corky Criswell of Bovina was installed as secretary.



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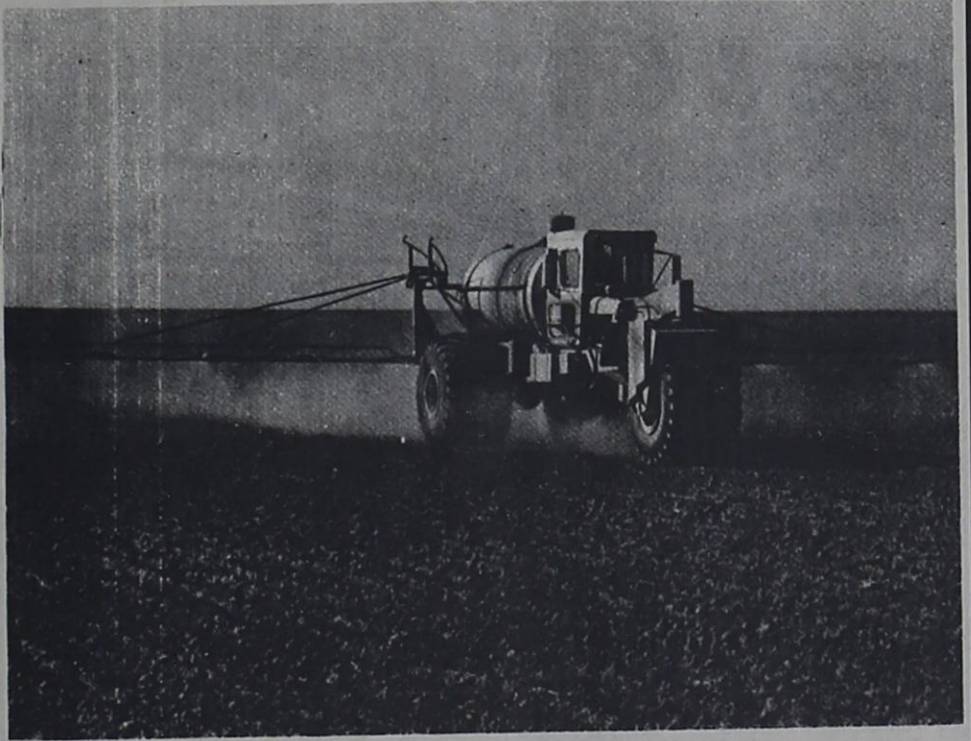

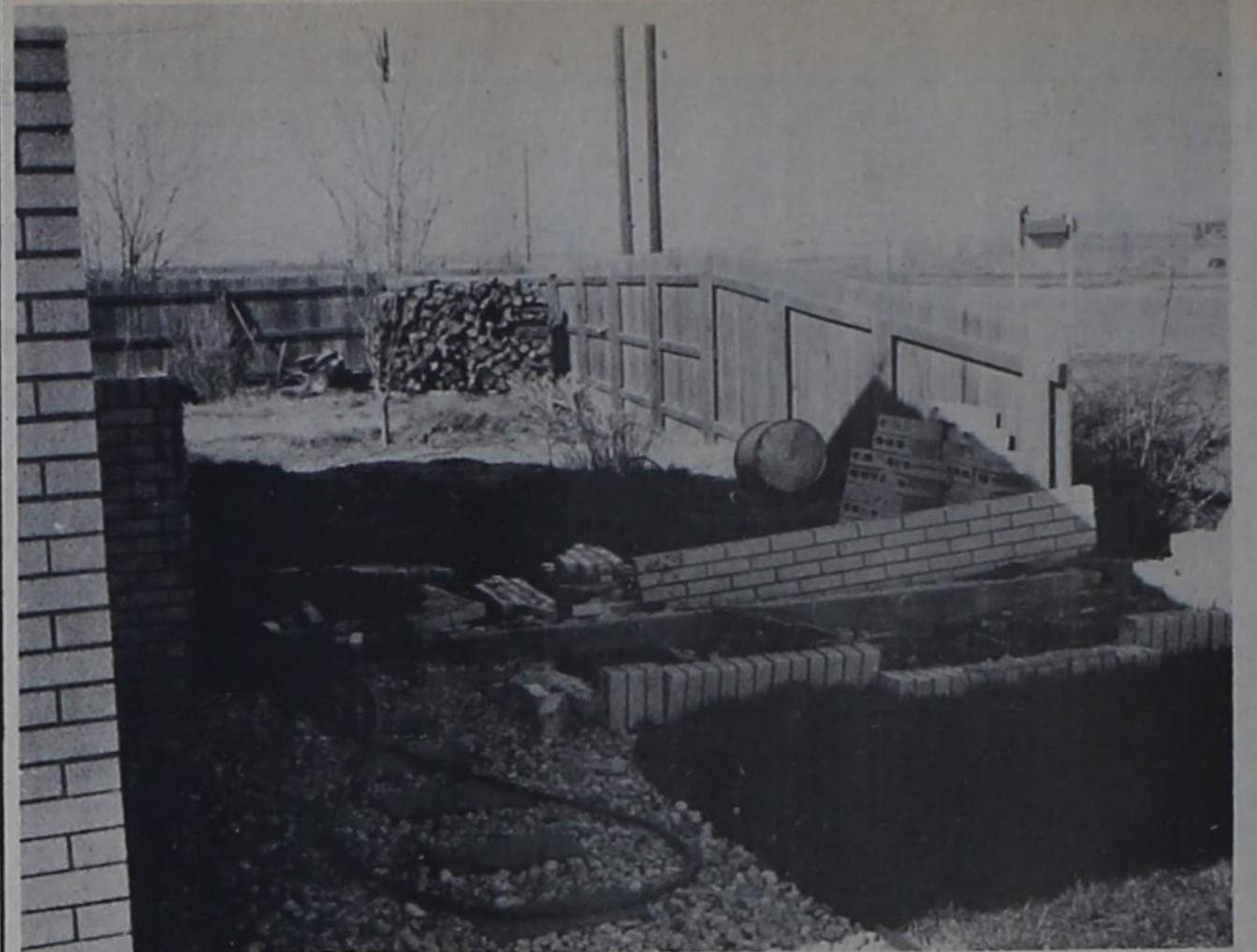
## BHS Golfers In 3-A Meet Mon. At Vega
