City OKs move for Appraisal District

County, school officials to discuss request Monday

The Kinney County Appraisal District moved one step closer to a new building Monday as the Brackettville City Council voted to approve a request to purchase the Kreiger Insurance building.

According to Chief Appraiser Joyce Fuentes, three of the four taxing entities served by the Appraisal District must approve the request before the building can be purchased.

The Brackett and Spofford City Councils have approved the requests. The Kinney County Commissioners Court and the Brackett School Board will discuss the matter at special meetings on Monday.

The Kinney County Appraisal District Board of Directors voted earlier this month to pursue the purchase of the Kreiger Insurance building to house the district's office, which is currently located in the Las Moras Masonic Lodge building.



IRS has hands in kids pockets, too

Last week, thousands of bright, ambitious high school students from all over Texas traveled to Fort Worth to the state FFA Convention.

The annual meeting allows young agriculture leaders across the state to gather together to elect FFA officers and to participate in various contests.

Texas youth join the FFA to develop leadership skills and to get first-hand experience in many aspects of the business of farming and ranching. Many young Texans choose to raise and show steers for one of the many projects the FFA offers. Students learn the intricacies of beef cattle production by raising a steer, showing it and selling it.

Kids who choose to participate in this particular project have to be prepared for all sorts of challenges that come with this responsibility. Challenges from breaking a wild steer to figuring financial aspects, like feeding costs to knowing if a profit can be made.

But one challenge these ambitious young students are not prepared for is dealing with the IRS. No surprise, the IRS is waiting in the wings to jump out and take their tax bite. Kids who make a profit on their FFA projects are forced to fill out tax returns and give part of their hard-earned money to the federal government.

This is crazy. These hard working kids aren't running a business. They are focusing their efforts on something positive. They should be rewarded for that, not penalized. They start at very young ages and work very hard to develop leadership skills that will help them as they become young

Participation in FFA projects is not a business. It should not be taxed like one. It is an educational opportunity over 58,000 students alone are involved in. The money they make helps them further their education.

By taxing the learning youth of America, the federal government makes it harder for career oriented kids to save money for college.

The news these days reports a lot of stories on youth crime and violence. The kids who channel their activities into something positive get little recognition.

Members of the FFA spend hundreds of hours outside of school working on projects that will provide them with greater opportunity. They should be praised for that. They should not be forced to learn early lessons in filling out tax returns. That will come soon enough.

Homestead is where the heart is

Thomas Jefferson told a friend shortly before his death in 1826 that: "I believe the states can best govern our home concerns ..."

I'm not sure he had bankruptcy laws in mind when he said that, but with Congress proposing to reform federal bankruptcy laws in a way that could endanger the Texas "homestead exemption," I'm beginning to wonder.

There's no doubt we need bankruptcy reform. Congress should close loopholes in the law that allow irresponsible individuals to slide out from under what they lawfully owe. Too many people are taking advantage of current laws.

Many debtors have failed to make good on their of Bankruptcies throughout the United States." promises to creditors to repay debt by filing for bankruptcy. This raises costs for everyone, as businesses raise their prices to account for bad debts.

As Congress considers what to do about this, though, I will be working with my Texas colleagues from both parties to ensure that the Texas homestead exemption is not ignored.

The homestead exemption protects a family's home even if everything else is lost to bankruptcy. Specifically, the law protects a Texan's primary residence located on 200 acres of rural land or one acre in the city.

While several states have copied it, the idea was born in Texas. This basic protection grew out of the United States Panic of 1837 and subsequent depression in which many families lost their homes and farms through foreclosures. Business stagnated. Money was scarce. No one could obtain credit.

The idea had three purposes: to protect families, the basic unit of society; to give debtors a second chance after bankruptcy rather than force their families into becoming a public burden; and to preserve the individual freedoms that are critical to democ-

Congress has the authority under the U.S. Constitution to establish "uniform Laws on the subject

Federal lawmakers have used this authority more than once to streamline bankruptcy proceedings among the states. In the past, reforms were carefully crafted to avoided undoing state law.

But the bankruptcy reform bill now before Congress goes too far by trying to set one homestead exemption on all 50 states.

Texas' elected representatives, who are closer to the situation than federal officials, are well aware of the problem of bankruptcy abuse. But at the same time they appreciate something legislators from other states cannot: the history and values of our state.

The proposal in the Senate puts a \$100,000 cap on the amount that can be claimed under the homestead exemption. The Texas Constitution bases its fact that fire plugs were useless. exemption on acreage and not value, to protect the fire department with tank against inflated property values.

Our state law ensures that families will still have a home even if their property has grown in value over time and would otherwise be lost. I will work to see that protection is included in the federal law.
