

Appraisal District agrees to buy Kreiger building





Late last year, the Environmental Protection Agency was all up in arms about the plight of the Devils River Minnow.

Federal bureaucrats all but velled "Save the minnows" as they worked feverishly to get the fish added to the Endangered Species

Granted, the number of Devils River Minnows was low according to numbers the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service obtained a year ago. But more recent research shows that there are plenty of the fish in other West Texas and Mexican waterways.

One reason for the lower number of the minnows actually in the Devils River was that small mouth bass in that same river found the minnows to be quite a tasty meal.

So, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service was gearing up to add the Devils River Minnow to the list of endangered species.

We all know what would have happened next. The federal government would send its bureaucrats down to West Texas to save the minnows the only way they know how -- by stepping on the rights of private property owners in Texas. Ranchers living along the Devils River would have been restricted in how they could use their own land.

Texans know best how to form a plan that protects wildlife along the Devils River and throughout Texas. That point was made clear in a letter to Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt regarding the plight of the Devils River Minnow.

Researchers recognized an increasing number of Devils River Minnows in creeks adjacent to the Devils River. Landowners near the Devils River continue to work to increase the minnow population. Some of the minnows were taken from the creeks for captive breeding.

The increasing number of Devils River Minnows is good news on many fronts. It's good news for the Devils River Minnows -a growing, healthy population. It's good news for the small mouth bass -- more tasty treats. And best of all, it's good news for West Texans -- they've shown the federal government they can handle the situation themselves, using common sense, not red tape.

Americans don't need federal bureaucrats stomping on their private property rights in botched attempts to accomplish what we can do ourselves.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service should take note of the success of West Texans. The federal government could learn a lot from these folks.

Just when you thought it was safe to turn on the TV, politics has once again taken over the airwaves. Most Texans have yet to give a thought to the November elections, but the politicians are already out there, promising (among other things) to protect patients and "fix" health care.

But which politicians are really trying to expand your health care choices, and which ones are trying to elbow their way into your doctor's exam room? A quick look reveals most have their elbows out,

but some are backing consumer-friendly reforms. Texas Democrats have proposed what they call a "patient bill of rights," which they claim will allow

consumers to choose their own doctor. Sounds good. Consumers like having choices, such as the ability to choose their doctor.

What consumers don't like is having someone else -- especially government -- calling the shots. And that's where the Democrat's plan falls on its face. It would expand your choices as much as the IRS expands your income.

Rather than give you more choices, the Democrats' plan would require you to buy health coverage that includes the more expensive option of being able to choose a doctor outside your plan (called a "point of service" option).

This is classic "tax and spend" big government, only instead of taxing you directly to pay for what the government wants, government is forcing you to pay through a hidden tax that increases your health premiums. If this sounds familiar, it should. Remember that in 1994, the Clinton Administration and its secretive health care task force tried to take over the health care system with all manner of mandates, restrictions and hidden taxes?

Congressman David Bonior, D-Michigan, was quoted last month saying that if Democrats take back the House, "We may actually get back to the whole (national) health care debate in the next Congress."

The recent wave of new state and federal health care mandates (so-called "patient protections") are hidden taxes which threaten Texans' access to quality health care benefits at an affordable cost.

Texas doesn't need higher health care taxes. We need to put patients back in the driver's seat -- so they can tell employers and government bureaucrats to take a hike. That's the idea behind one promising proposal, backed by Republican Congressman Bill Archer, chairman of the House's tax-writing com-

Congressman Archer's proposal would put you back in control of your health care by giving you a tax break for health insurance, which is why nearly two-thirds of Americans have their health benefits dictated to them by their employer.

For most families, this tax break would cut the cost of health insurance by almost 25 percent. No more accepting whatever coverage your employer gives you. No more discussing sensitive medical information with the boss. No more worrying about losing coverage because you leave your job. You set the coverage levels. You set the deductibles. You decide between plans that let you see any doctor you wish and those that cost less but require you to see one of their doctors. The choice is yours.

Prince said the company is proposing to build the facility on Joe York's property, east of Fort Clark Springs, but the Commissioners Court has not yet discussed the location of the facility.

According to the request for proposals, "The financing proposal shall provide for lease-purchase of the facility by the county, with an option to purchase and transfer of title upon payment of all lease payments."

"It will be the revenue of the facility itself that will make the payments on the facility," Bristow said. "Then, once the facility is paid for, it will be turned over to the county. If all goes well and it is occupied for the term, then it becomes an asset of the county."

The request for proposals also says, "The county shall have no liability or cost for the facility financing except to the extent of prisoner housing contract revenues actually generated by the facility."

"A pre-condition of the proposal was that any financial obligation had to be self-supported by the facility and that no tax money or taxpayer obligation would be a part of the underlying financing of the project," Bristow added.

The commissioners are expected to resume discussions of the proposal on Friday. Officials discussed calling a special meeting on Monday.

"Our primary concern is money," O'Rourke said. "If we can't make any money, then we wouldn't want to do it. Right now, I couldn't vote for it because I don't know what's going on."

"We just need more information,"

Frerich added.
