> The dams were built in 1962 by the Soil Conservation Service as part of the Las Moras Creek Project, sponsored by the City of Brackettville, the Kinney County Commissioners Court, and the West Nueces-Las Moras Soil and Water Conservation District.

> "Both structures caught an estimated 2,500 acre feet (more than 800 million gallons) of water last week and prevented hundreds of thousands of dollars in damages in the county," District Conservationist James Crumley said.

The dams hold back the floodwaters over a period of days. slowly letting the water out.

# County proposes raises for all elected officials

All of Kinney County's elected officials will receive at least 5 percent raises if the proposed budget for the 1998-99 fiscal year is approved.

The Commissioners Court voted Monday morning to advertise the notice of salary increases in the newspaper as required by law during a special meeting.

The largest proposed increase is for the constable, whose salary will be raised 7 percent from \$3,879.60 to \$4,151.17 if the budget is approved.

The county judge's salary is expected to be raised 5.5 percent, from \$26,552.40 to \$28,000, while the proposed budget calls for 5 percent raises for all other elected positions.





Israel Borrego, 26, died Saturday morning after being shot once in the abdomen when Rodriguez went to check his mother's house in

Brown has said Rodriguez thought there was an intruder in the house. He said Borrego was an acquaintance of the singer's and had not been invited to the home.

Rodriguez fired a single shot with a .357-caliber Magnum pistol and then called law enforcement officers.

The singer grew up and lives in Sabinal, about 60 miles east of

Brackettville. As a teenager, Rodriguez was in the Uvalde County Jail on a goattheft charge when Texas Ranger Joaquin Jackson paid his fine and took him to Alamo Village, where he met his eventual manager, Happy Shahan.

Rodriguez entertained tourists until a break took him to Nashville and a lucrative recording contract. More than a dozen of the singer's albums and singles landed in the Top 10.

There are some cheap locks that are good. Imported locks tend to be low quality.

Locksmiths speak of the "tolerance" of a lock. Low tolerance means that the lock doesn't provide much security. After a while, a cheap lock will start giving trouble. When this happens, you should replace it before you find it won't work at all.

The lock cylinder can be replaced to upgrade and make it more secure.

Safes offer high security. An open safe is relatively easy to service. However, if it is closed it can be very difficult.

A few safes are electronic at this time. In 10 years, Probasco Photo by Eric McMaster expects all will be made that way. To open an electronic safe, one touches numbers shown

Batteries operate an electronic safe, and when they start needing replacement, they beep. Probasco warned that you should get the new batteries before you remove the old ones. Memory is short lived. If you leave the safe without batteries, it may have a lapse of memory.
