Commissioners to discuss new detention center

The Kinney County Commissioners Court will resume discussions about the new detention center tomorrow during a special meeting at 2 p.m.

County officials have approved a proposal from CiviGenics to construct and operate a 500-bed detention center here. The facility would house federal inmates.

The facility is proposed to be built on land owned by Joe York Jr., located on Highway 131, approximately 1.3 miles south of the Highway 90 intersection.

Bob Prince, marketing director with CiviGenics, said the facility will employee approximately 100 people with an annual payroll of about \$2.1 million.

County Judge Tommy Seargeant is expected to give an update on the project tomorrow.





Improved math performance a priority for school district

Improved math performance is the top priority for Brackett schools, according to the district improvement plan which was approved Monday night by the School Board of Trustees.

The first goal in the district improvement plan calls for all students taking the TAAS math test to score a minimum average of 80 percent. It also calls for improved algebra end-of-course scores and improved ACT test scores.


Officials to crack down on drivers who don't buckle up their children

During the week of Thanksgiving, over 5,000 law enforcement agencies in all 50 states will again participate in the Operation ABC Mobilization: America Buckles up Children.

It will mark the second national wave this year to protect children from the greatest risk they face - being unrestricted in a vehicle.

Traffic crashes are the leading killer of kids. More than 2,000 children die in crashes each year. Sixty percent of these children are totally unrestrained, and nearly half of them would be alive today if they had been properly buckled.

Traffic fatalities dropped by 35 percent during the last ABC Mobilization, which occurred the week prior to the Memorial Day holiday, according to officials.



With such a safe food supply, why are so many people getting sick? Well, the hazards have to do with how the food is prepared.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, the vast majority of food illnesses can be prevented. Proper handling, cooking and storage of food is essential. A few precautions will drastically reduce our chances of getting sick.

Here are some important food safety tips from the Centers for Disease Control. These tips won't keep all bacteria away, of course, but they certainly will reduce our chances of getting a nasty stomach flu, or a more serious illness from the food we eat. You may want to clip this out and tape it to your refrigerator for a reminder.

■ Wash your hands with soap and water before and after preparing food. It is especially important to wash your hands after handling raw chicken and other

■ After cutting raw meat, clean the cutting surface with soap and hot water before preparing other foods on that surface.

■ When barbecuing, use a different plate for cooked food than the one used for raw food. ■ Do not taste or eat raw, rare

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



Brackett and Navarro both were picked to finish last in their districts, and each had big turnarounds over last sea-
