Three of four incumbents not seeking terms

Ida Flores, Martha W. McDonald and Julie Fuentes Molano have filed for election and three of the four incumbents in the Brackettville City Council and Brackett ISD School Board of Trustees May 1 elections will not seek re-election.

As of early Wednesday morning, Michael D. Schuster, Ronnie Dean Hobbs and Henry Joseph Lutz were the only candidates to file to run for the Brackett ISD School Board. Two at-large positions will be filled in the election.

Wednesday at 5 p.m. was the deadline to file for a place on the ballot for the City Council and School Board elections. The deadline for write-in candidates to file for each election is Monday.

The positions currently held by Aldermen J.J. Guidry and Wes Robinson are up in the Brackettville City Council election. Each position has a two-year term.





Small town economies

We've been hearing for quite awhile now that America's economy is the best it has been in years. The stock market has moved into record territory. Investors have been making money hand over fist. In cities all across the country, businesses are booming, prices are low and things are just plain good.

But in the heartland of America, in the small rural towns that dot the map, the picture is not as rosy. In towns like Kermit and Sonora, where the success of the local economy depends on agriculture and/or oil, no one cheers when Dan Rather announces that gas prices are at a 10 year low.

No one cheers because for every penny they save at the gas pump, they know at least three oil workers who have lost their jobs. No one cheers because they know the devastating trickle effect the oil slump has on rural communities, and they realize the next job lost could be their own.

In towns like Uvalde and Pecos, where cotton is king, residents hear how well the economy is doing, but they don't see it. They hear about businesses that are booming all over the country. But they look out their window and see cotton farmers struggling to survive. They see low commodity prices that drive down profits.

It's hard to think the economy. is thriving when for every \$35 cotton shirt, the cotton farmer takes home 41 cents.

In his state of the union address, the president reported that the state of the union is good and our economy is strong. He's right, the economy is strong in cities like Chicago, Los Angeles and New York. But in farm and ranch country and in small Texas oil towns, it's like a whole other country.

Small town America is almost completely dependent on the success of these industries. We are looking at ways to provide help.

It's a place where problems in the agriculture and oil industries ripple throughout the community. When oil fields shut down, everyone in town is affected. When harsh weather ruins crops, and when commodity prices plummet, it's not just the farmers and ranchers who pay the price. And the problems don't end when the rains come.

Congress is working on legislation to help boost the oil and agriculture industries. Small town America is almost completely dependent on the success of these industries. We are looking at a variety of different ways to provide help, from disaster packages

to tax relief to crop insurance. We are working to make sure that when we talk about our thriving economy, we're not just talking about people in the big cities - we're also talking about the millions of Americans in small towns across the country.
