A Little on the Wildlife Side Henry Lutz

dance with a hundred fluttering butterflies, stately woods play host to birds of every color, hidden ponds shelter swimming tadpoles and curious toads...if this sounds like rural wilderness, think again. It could be your to walk on the wild side.

By providing food, water and shelter, the basics of wildlife habitat, the urban gardener can transform his property from a pretty but sterile landscape into a beautiful haven for wildlife. This is increasingly important for wildlife in a state where concrete and cropland are replacing much of the native habitat. For those who have the desire, but lack understanding of the specific steps and tools needed for the job, take heart.

The new book Texas Wildscapes: Gardening for Wildlife by Noreen Damude and Kelly Bender, provides information needed to arrange native plants and simple structures to create habitat for wildlife.

The full-color volume includes descriptions of Texas' ecoregions, lists of native plants (and their wildlife value) and animals, a step-by-step guide to Wildscape design, tips for gardening troubles (shady spots, wet areas, and deer-prone sites), highlights of some of the animals you might expect to find, and even an illustrated guide to building a pond.

"The plants we choose can benefit wildlife by providing food and shelter, said Damude, co-author, former TPW wildlife specialist and director of conservation with Texas Audubon.
