



The marijuana was valued at \$88,400.

Friday, July 9, agents from the Eagle Pass Station seized 25.6 pounds of marijuana near the river approximatley 5 miles juana was valued at \$20,480.



sioners Court of Kinney County, Texas will hold a public hearing in the Kinney County Courthouse, 501 Ann Street in Brackettville, Texas, 78832, to consider an ordinance prohibiting the disposal of municipal solid waste in two areas of the County as shown on the attached maps and described in the proposed ordinance. The ordinance, if adopted, would limit the areas where municipal solid waste could be disposed of in Kinney County. The terms "municipal solid waste" and "disposal" are used as they are defined by the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act found in Chapter 631 of the Texas Health and Safety Code. Any interested person may attend and testify at the hearing.

The Kinney County Commissioners Court has conducted a Takings Impact Assessment concerning the proposed action. In summary, the Takings Impact Assessment resulted in the following determinations: (1) that the proposed action is a "covered action" as defined in the Private Real Property Rights Preservation Act because it consists of the adoption of an ordinance; (2) that no existing private property rights will be affected because no person who presently has the right to dispose of solid waste n specific areas will be affected by the ordinance; (3) that the proposed action is exempt from the Private Real Property Rights Preservation Act; and (4) that the proposed action will not reduce the market value of any property owners's property by more than 25%. A copy of the complete Takings Impact Assessment can be obtained from the Office of Kinney County Judge Herb Senne in the Kinney County Courthouse, 501 Ann Street, Brackettville, Texas, 78832, or by calling (830) 563-2401.

The proposed ordinance is attached. A copy of the proposed ordinance and the Takings Impact Assessment are available for public inspection during the normal office hours at the Office of the County Judge in the Kinney County Courthouse, 501 Ann Street, Brackettville, Texas. AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE DISPOSAL OF MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE

IN CERTAIN AREAS OF KIN-NEY COUNTY AND PROVIDING CIVIL AND

CRIMINAL PENALTIES Be it ordered and adopted by the Commission-

ers Court of Kinney County, Texas;

SECTION I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

WHEREAS, the Kinney County Commissioners Court has both the responsibility and the authority to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Kinney County, Texas;

WHEREAS, Section 364.012 of the Texas Health and Safety Code allows the Kinney County Commissioners Court to designate areas of the County in which solid waste disposal are allowed and not allowed; and

SAFETY CODE, specifically defines the terms economic impact region, including within Kin-"municipal solid waste", and "disposal" of solid ney County; and waste in Section 361.003 of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the regular collection and management of municipal solid waste materials attracts birds to a municipal solid waste disposal facility such as a landfill: and

WHEREAS, even without the location of facilities for the disposal of municipal solid wastes near the Spofford auxiliary air field, the Air Force has had to restrict its training activities and the flying of aircraft for training purposes due to the presence of birds; and

WHEREAS, the Air Force is planning to change its aircraft for training to one that is much more expensive but is still very susceptible to accidents resulting from collisions with birds: and

WHEREAS, since 1990, there have been at least 20,800 bird strikes involving U.S. Air Force aircraft worldwide in which 33 military personnel were killed; the cost of those bird SYCAMORE CREEK strikes was \$470.76 million; and (COUNTY LINE)



IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that municipal solid waste management, including disposal, by individual landowners or home owners, is not subject to this ordinance due to the insignificance of the risks associated with such management; and

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Commissioners Court of Kinney County reserves the right to designate at a later date other areas of the County as suitable and not suitable for municipal and other solid waste disposal based on the need to protect the health, safety and welfare of the County, and the lands and residents of the County, including the need to protect the limited surface and ground waters in the County.

SECTION 2. CIVIL REMEDIES AND PEN-ALTIES

(a) Any violation of this ordinance is subject to a civil penalty of \$10,000.00 for each violation. This penalty is to be forfeited to Kinney requirements of local, state or federal laws or County Texas. Each day that a violation con-

(b) The Commissioners Court of Kinney County, Texas may bring a legal action to enjoin violations of this ordinance and seek judgment for any civil penalties.

(a) Disposal of solid waste in violation of this ordinance constitutes a Class C misdemeanor

(b) Each day that a violation continues constitutes a separate offense under this ordinance.

SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY

If any portion of this ordinance is deemed to be in violation of the statutes or the constitution of this state or the United States by a court of competent jurisdiction, said portion shall be severed, and the remaining portion shall remain in full force and effect.



Among his suggestions: "Be sure all work surfaces and utensils are clean before preparing food. Don't use the same cutting board, platter or utensils for raw meat as for fresh or cooked foods. And don't cut up vegetables or fruits on the same board just used for raw meat or poultry.

"Use different cutting boards or thoroughly wash and sanitize the one used," McAndrew said. "A simple, inexpensive solution for sanitizing food preparation surfaces is one tablespoon household bleach in a gallon of water. And always wash your hands. Any bacteria in raw meat or juices can contaminate other left from raw meat and poultry. foods." It is the bacteria in raw meat, especially beef, and other foods that can lead to illness. In particular, E. coli 0157:H7 (formal name Escherichia coli 0157:H7) infections can cause severe diarrhea, nausea and cramps.

"We have seen an increase in confirmed E. coli cases recently," said David Bergmire-Sweat of the TDH Infectious Disease Epidemiology and Surveillance Division. He said that while the TDH Laboratory usually confirms one to two cases a week, 11 have been confirmed

Beef, veal and lamb steaks and roasts should be cooked to 145 degrees F, pork and ground beef to 155 degrees F. Poultry should reach food to check; don't guess. Juices should run clear. Hamburgers should be medium well to well done and brown in the middle. Poultry should have no pink to it." A special precaution both McAndrew and Bergmire-Sweat underscore: Don't put the cooked food back on the plate or in the pan that held raw meat or poultry. Cooked food can easily be contaminated by juices

meat and poultry before grilling so it cooks evenly. Use the refrigerator for slow, safe thawing. Microwave defrost only if the food will be placed on the grill immediately. Marinating -Always marinate food in the refrigerator, not on the counter. If some of the marinade is to be used as a sauce on the cooked foods, reserve a portion in a separate container before adding raw meat, poultry or seafood. Do not reuse marinade.


